Sartre's Search
"A Search for a Method to Undermine Marxism" is a chapter in my projected work, tentatively entitled Philosophy and Revolution, which I have been sending around to colleagues for their criticism. One friend has suggested that I send it to your journal, as he felt that the current issue of Sartrean type of Marxism made the piece topical for separate publication. The thought intrigued me also because I may have an opportunity to stop off in Honolulu in Spring-Summer, either on my way to, or on my return from, Japan, where I am to lecture on my work Marxism and Freedom, which has been translated into Japanese under the title of Alienation and Revolution.

I trust that the views of a Marxist-Humanist are philosophically "legitimate" in a critique of Jean-Paul Sartre, now that the philosopher of existentialism claims that his philosophy is but an "enclave" in the Marxist philosophy.
