Dear Professor Lamb:

Thank you for your letter and the enclosures as well as the listing of your works. The University of Manchester brings fond memories. Way back (I believe it was 1959) the Philosophy Department there, invited me to talk on "The Theory of Alienation: Marx's Debt to Hegel". Since the 1950s was hardly the period in the U.S. when Marxist-Humanists were welcomed to speak on university campuses, I was especially happy to have had that opportunity for a dialogue with colleagues. It took all the way to 1974 before the Hegel Society of America had me deliver a paper on "Hegel's Absolute Idea as New Beginning." Do you have Art and Logic in Hegel's Philosophy (the papers delivered at that session)?

Naturally I will look forward to your review of Philosophy and Revolution. However, I wondered why you did not mention my latest work, Rosa Luxemburg, Women's Liberation and Marx's Philosophy of Revolution. I had the impression that Harvester Press has not emphasized that they, together with Humanities Press here, had published all three of my major works for the Marx Centenary. (Let me enclose one of the brochures Humanities Press issued.)

As an Hegelian Marxist, I was most happy to learn that Britain now had an Hegelian Society, and as you must know, I rushed to join it at once. Greetings to all.
