It is also a well documented fact that women earn substantially less per hour than men, and that women are concentrated in work areas related to cleaning, caring or servicing, direct extensions of the work they are usually expected to do at home.

LEGISLATION

Since the early seventies and the passing of the Equal Pay Act and the Sex Discrimination Act, womens' struggles for better pay have often been geared to comparing themselves with the men that they work with, or with men who do similar jobs. This is an irrelevance, as by and large women do jobs that men do not do.

LONG TERM AIMS

As socialists we do not feel that the best way to work out these problems is, in the long term to use legislation, which merely ends up in a wrangle about the value placed on different types of work. We feel that women should organise in their Trade Unions to fight against a system of work which places less value on women and at the same time fosters male prejudice in order to be able to get away with it.

OBSTACLES

This is of course easier said than done, as the very reason that forces women into the low paid/part-time ghetto is also the reason s that stop them from being Trade Unionists. Namely, they have another full-time job: the home and children. So telling a woman to improve her position by getting out their and going for it is asking her to do a TRIPLE SHIFT. Home, work, meetings etc. How many hours are there in a day?? How many women are able to be active?? Clearly there is much that Trade Unionists can do to smooth the way, by bargaining for work time meetings and being willing to bear with people unfamiliar with the often complex Trade Union structures, but as any active Trade Unionist well knows, most of

SOLUTIONS

How this equation is worked out will no doubt be personally painful to many people, as women make demands which will free them from domestic drudgery. BUT if, as trends show, women are becoming a more and more significant proportion of the workforce changes must occur or women will remian poorly organised and inactive; then not just women will be the losers, but the working class as a whole.



As Red Action goes to press, the dock-workers have called a national strike over the use of scab labour to break support for the miners' strike. It must be obvious to all by now that the Coal Board and the Steel Board are taking their orders direct from central government whenever any major decision has to be made. British Steel must have consulted the government before provoking another dock strike. Socialists must draw the lessons from this co-operation amongst our "rulers', if we are to have any chance of reversing their attacks upon the working class. Below we take stock of Thatcherism and Jack whilst exporting our suggest how we will beat it.

IN THEIR COURT

The miners' strike is now in a critical phase. The failure of the so-called "back to movement" has obviously surprised McGregor who has now begun muttering darkly about "bullying pickets" and the use of the Courts to stop them, and the arrest of the "men behind them". Meanwhile, numerous articles, in the papers that our bosses read, suggest that imprisoning NUM leaders and provoking a generalised strike - if not a General Strike has been the aim of Thatcher and her Class since McGregor blatantly provoked the miners' strike. Our common enemy has a common plan. The Left, on the other hand, is in dissarray. One mistake made is to assume that Thatcher and her ilk just hate the miners for what they have done to the Tories in the past. No, Thatcher is a brutally logical political agent of the bosses and her "plan" is to smash US so that the Rich can go onliving as they have been doing. Another great mistake is the belief that the Labour Party can smash Thatcherism. It can't.

THE THATCHER PLAN

OF DESTRUCTION EFFECTIVE TRADE UNI-ONISM. Effective tradeunionism is called Scargillism at the moment. It comes about when workers do a good job of defending their interests by effective picketing etc.

In Thatcher's brave new world, which she hopes will see investment flooding back to Britain, picketing will be a thing of the past. That is why the Tories provoked the present strike and why they keep ignoring Labour Party pleas for a "compromise peace formula". The only kind of trade unionism envisaged in the brave new world is the type supported by right wing labourites like Terry Duffy who is busy signing "no strike no disruption" agreements with the Japanese.

2. MASS UNEMPLOYMENT AND POVERTY WAGES. The Thatcher Plan has

already decimated heavy industry like ship building and steel. The priority in the future will be the highly profitable micro-electronics industry, whilst where mass production does continue it will be in non-unionised workplaces or areas where the unions are hand in hand with the company. 3. HEALTH AND EDUCA-TION ACCORDING TO WEALTH. Here, the Thatcher plan involves a return to the pre-1945 era, with minimal "pauper" health care and education for most of us. Those who can afford insurance and private school fees, however, will enjoy luxury facilities, pretty much as in

the USA today. 4. THE LONG ARM OF THE LAW. The police violence and restriction on movement seen today in mining communities, in the riots of 81, and against black people generally, are the beginnings of an identity card carrying surveillance system, if the rich get their way. The repression in the occupsix counties of Ireland today is, in almost every detail, our own future staring us in the face. Its aim - to keep the "have nots" down while

The thirty Red Action members and friends who went to Belfast for the anti-internment demonstration this year were able to experience for themselves exactly what life is like for those that oppose British rule in their country. The actions of the RUC during the incident when one man was killed and dozens injured have been reported around the world. Much of the reporting, especially in the British press has been distorted to try and excuse the RUC. Here one of the Red Action party, Barney of the band interviewed on the opposite page, gives his impression of what it was really like.

The thousands of participants on the anti-internment march - apart from the smartly uniformed teenage flute bands - were no different from those that we pass in the streets each day. Just normal people, young and old, a whole community from its skinheads to its grandmas out together in a peaceful act of protest.

Up every turning from the main route of the march stood armoured cars and armour plated landrovers with soldiers and R.U.C. positioned near them, holding SLRs and sub machine guns.

The march ended at a large shopping square where everyone sat or stood to listen to speeches from various organisations. Then the army and R.U.C. cordoned off the entire area, their mass pres-

down when her father, with another daughter rushed through the doorway. He was obviously relieved to see his other child safe, but seething with rage, cursing the "security forces" outside. It was then that I found out that the little girl was seven years old.

Leaving the girl with her father, I went into the back room, where a man was sitting quivering with shock. He was holding a tissue to his badly swollen head. Just behind the ear it was bleeding. Another wound caused by a plastic bullet.

The man later tried to refuse to go to hospital. The reson, I discovered later to be true, was that anyone treated for plastic bullet injuries would be reported and later charged by the R.U.C. with riotous behaviour.

ence quite unnerving. I was stood some 150 metres from the right of the speakers platform, unable to hear them because of an overhead helicopter. I was standing with a few friends looking across a peaceful attentive crowd, when suddenly, amid the deafening crack of plastic bullets being fired, everybody started to panic, People everywhere dived to the groung or ran for cover. The army and the R.U.C. had opened up on us. I ran towards a small bookshop, but couldn't get in because of a rush of people ahead of me with the same idea, so I had to get my head down behind a small wall in front of the doorway. Nearby, on my left, still in the open, stood a small girl crying, too young and confused to understand the situation. As I put my arm up and grabbed hold of her, a rebounding plastic bullet smashed into her knee, knocking the skin away and making it bleed. The next few seconds are very hazy. I remember feeling very vulnerable and fearing a baton charge. I can't remember how, but me and the little girl managed to get into the

The shop was packed with frightened people and several children were crying. I was trying to calm the little girl

A thick steel mesh across the front of the shop window made the place plastic bullet proof. Outside I could see people who had been caught in the open huddled together in fear on the ground. Those who tried to run were fired on with plastic bullets and the R.U.C. were beating some one on the ground with bat-

Our first attempt to leave the shop resulted in more bullets being fired. However when we finally got out, I, along with two friends and a fifteen year old Irish boy, showered were with fragments of broken glass.

A nearby R.U.C. man had brought his truncheon down on a lemonade bottle in the top of a waste bin.

It was walking along in the open that was the most frightening, totally at the mercy of the army and the R.U.C. who had shown that they didn't need provoking to fire on us.

As everyone walked away from the area, we were passed by several R.U.C. landrovers whose occupants were flicking the 'V'.

A short time later an army landrover passed us. One of 'our brave soldiers' provocatively aimed his rifle at me and sniggered.



BELFAST

Over 30 Red Action members, supporters and friends travelled to Belfast to take part in the annual march to commemorate the introduction of internment. Like last year we were billeted with local people in West Belfast, new friendships were made and old ones renewed. On Saturday we were invited to attend a meeting organised by the IRSP. There were speakers from relatives for justice on the current campaign against the "super-grass" trials, as well as a recently released POW who spoke on conditions inside. The meeting was instructive and educational. Early Sunday morning a Red Action member staying in the Divis flats heard the familiar sounds of a tremendous battle going on outside, he cautiously approached the window and in a quivering voice asked his host if it was the "Brits". He was informed that it was probably only a wee domestic row. Suitably chastened he took to his bed. On Sunday Red Action attended the march to Andersonstown where the well-publicised murder of Sean Downe took place. Even local people were shocked by the unprovoked violence of the RUC and British Army and later watched with weary cynicism as the media ground into gear and invented a riot to support the RUC story. As a small gesture of solidarity most of the Red Action delegation stayed over to attend the black flag march which took place in defiance of a ban by the RUC. There was a general agreement that for Socialists and sympathisers the trip in invaluable, as nothing clarifies or reviews your support for the armed struggle better than having a "Brit" shove a gun in your gut,

MINERS GIGS

Red Action members helped the miners support group in Welwyn Garden City to organise a benefit gig featuring the Astronauts and the Redskins, which raised 300 pounds for the miners. This was one of a series of gigs that we have arranged for this cause.

ACTION

Red Action was formed in 1981 when a number of working class socialists were expelled from the organisation that they had belonged to. Various reasons were given for this, but it all semed to boil down to the intellectual leadership showing their distaste for the raucous manners, and undisviplined behaviour or their working class members. We believe that we can organise ourselves as red workers on our own, without any interference from middle class intellectuals. We intend to avoid at all costs, becoming like so many other left groups, with their patronizing attitude towards the working class. We reject the idea that a socialist organisation, has the right to demand unquestioning obedience from its members at all times. Discipline when necessary must be based on respect for, and trust in, those making the decisions, and not blind servile obedience. We believe that socialism belongs to the working class, and that a socialist organisation, while it must be able to give a lead to the class, must also be able to reflect the spirit and consciousness of the class. We in Red Action will strive to this end. To justify our existence before the most cynical audience of all - the working class - and present socialist politics in a way that they can identify with, in their life, their work, and their leisure. We draw great inspiration from the Republican movement in Ireland, from the courageous and principled manner in which they conduct their struggle, and from the way that they have integrated class and cultural expression into their political movement. We unconditionally support the right of their revolutionary armies, the Irish Republican Army, and the Irish National Liberation Army, to engage in armed struggle to free their country from British Rule. We will work in co-operation with all and any groups that support the same aims as us. We do not reject any ideas tactics or strategies just because we did not think of them our-

The symbolic route of the march past DHSS H.Q. and several union head offices - summed up the message of the day: that the miners fight is everybody's fight. It was great to see so many women on the street demonstrating their solidarity. I wish it happened more often!

Saturday 18 August Red Action attended a Troops Out march of about 3000 people through central London to Jubilee Gardens. The Fascists were noticeable by their absence, but a whisper of some "snipers" in Waterloo Station caused the Red Action "pest control unit" to be mobilized. Sadly the quarry had fled, visibly dejected the Red Action contingent wandered aimlessly away.

for the class not the party What kind of society do you want? That was the major ques-

tion facing the workers and peasants in Russia after the revolutions there in 1917. And a good clue to what they eventually decided upon can be gained by looking at the new Soviet constitution of 1918. The word "soviet" by the way is the Russian word for a council of workers or peasants. Now, a new Soviet consti-

tution was drawn up in July 1918 and it agreed, amongst other things, that all peasants and workers should have freedom of speech, and that there should be no censorship of the Press or suppression of Trade Unions. This was agreed in articles 13, 14. 15 and 16 of the Constitution. Articles 22 and 23 sought to prevent the allocation of special priveleges to any one particular political Party either in the workplace or within the armed forces. The only people deprived of rights were those who exploited the labour of others, or those who lived on unearned income.

SLAUGHTER

Read through the above points again, and then ask yourself why it is that in March 1921, the Bolsheviks · who now were effectively "in charge" - butchered a naval garrison near Petrograd for raising exactly the same demands as the ones laid down in the Soviet Constitution of 1918. The naval base was called Kronstadt and some socialists believe that the smashing of Kronstadt by the Bolsheviks marked the beginning of the end of the revolution and the start of the slide into Dictatorship.

CRISIS AND ISOLATION

It is important to remember, of course, that Russia in 1921 was in the grip of a severe famine. A three year civil war against the reactionary White Guards and their allies had just ended with the Red Army returning victorious but having suffered heavy casualites. Russia was surrounded by hostile nations and the long hoped for revolution in Germany had been smashed - effectively by the German Labour Party who moved against the Spartakus uprising in Berlin in 1919. These are the excuses which all socialists seem to use when asked about KRON-STADT.

The Kronstadt sailors and their supporters rose up AFTER a wave of strikes



began, in February 1921, in nearby Petrograd (LENIN-GRAD); ending with the massive PUTILOV works coming out on Strike, Bolshevik representatives at several factories were refused permission to address the workers and thousands left the Communist Party which Boisheviks controlled. Some socialists do not like to admit that this strike wave took place, but it did, and the demands it raised were for the release of all political prisoners, free speech for workers and peasants and for a "Third Revolution of the toilers". The Kronstadt sailors, naturally enough, sent a delegation to Petrograd to find out what was going on and found that a state of siege had been imposed along with an 11 o'clock curfew. The strike leaders had been arrested and the militia - at first mainly student guards - patrolled the streets.

THE KRONSTADT PROG-RAMME

Inspired by their comrades in Petrograd, the Kronstadters drew up a fifteen point programme, again with demands similar to the Constitution of 1918, but which also included demands for peasants to be able to work their own soil as long as they did not "exploit" anyone else. An end to Bolshevik priveleges and manipulation of the Red Army along with a call for the equalisation of rations except for those doing heavy Trotsky was busy in 1921 or dangerous jobs and, impor- massacre-ing the very people the Soviets. FOR THE SOVIETS NOT THE PARTY!

On the second March 1921, Communist Party members at Kronstadt, set up "provisional" C.P. Their first proclamation was: "Long live the power of the

Soviets. Long live international working class unity."

A declaration was issued from C.P. members at the "Rif" Fort: ". . many greedy careerists have flocked to our Party. This has given rise to bureaucracy and has gravely hampered the struggle for economic reconstruction." The first proclamation of the rebel Kronstadt Soviet the White Guards don't forget - reads as follows: "We are concerned to avoid bloodshed. Our aim is to create through the joint efforts of Town and Fortress the proper conditions for regular and honest elections to the new Soviets.
