RESOLVED, that we hereby urge upon the president and congress of the United States the immediate passage of such laws governing the operation and rulings of the civil service commission...

Electors in Maine.—Harry T. Mahan heads the Socialist ticket in the municipal election that will be held at Portland, Maine, Dec. 7. Protest Against War.—Socialists in Montevideo, the capital city of Uruguay, held a monster mass meeting protesting against the war in Europe.

It will mean a host of mayors, councilmen, judges, sheriffs, etc. It will mean a flood of enthusiasm which will carry the Socialist Party to a speedy victory.

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where Socialism is comparatively a new idea it was foolish to start by distributing 'Join the Party'.

THIRD.—your literature distribution in order to be truly effective must be SYSTEMATIC. Some locals distribute a leaflet once or twice a year.

LEAFLET DISTRIBUTION IN ORDER TO BE MOST EFFECTIVE SHOULD BE CARRIED ON THROUGHOUT THE YEAR AND THE DISTRIBUTIONS SHOULD BE NO MORE THAN A MONTH APART.

IN a city, when it is impossible to cover the whole city, the local should select the most promising wards, or even precincts, and bill these SYMPATHETICALLY.

FIRST DISTRIBUTION.—We have found it an excellent plan to start distribution with a leaflet that says little or nothing about Socialism but draws attention to the present evil conditions.

CHILDREN OF THE POOR, WHAT CONGRESS OUGHT TO DO, MUNICIPAL OWNERSHIP, THE BOYTONS RAILROAD AND MADAM HOW WILL YOU FEED YOUR FAMILY are excellent for this purpose.

IF the community has a strong labor union movement THE GUNMEN OF INDUSTRY will be found especially effective.

SECOND DISTRIBUTION.—For the second distribution, we do not know of anything that fits the bill quite as well as THE BOMBHELL THAT HENRY FORD FIRED.

THIRD DISTRIBUTION.—For the third distribution we recommend either of the following: FRANCIS E. WILLARD ON SOCIALISM and ELIZABETH CADY STANTON ON SOCIALISM.

TENTH DISTRIBUTION.—WHAT CONGRESS OUGHT TO DO. This is one of our very best leaflets. Do not neglect to distribute this.

ELEVENTH DISTRIBUTION.—In states in which the women have not yet secured the ballot use one or more of the following: VOTES FOR WORKING-WOMEN, WOMAN'S NEED OF EQUAL RIGHTS, THE SOCIALIST PARTY AND WOMAN SUFFRAGE AND WAGE EARNING WOMEN AND THE BALLOT.

IF the women already have the suffrage in your state use one or more of the following: TO WIVES OF TOLLERS, TO THE UNION MAN'S WIFE, WOMAN COMRADE AND EQUAL WOMAN AIN'T GOT NO KICK, TO THE WORKING WOMAN, WOMAN WHY WILL YOU DO WITH YOUR BALLOT? WHY THE PROFESSIONAL WOMAN SHOULD BE A SOCIALIST AND WHY YOU SHOULD BE A SOCIALIST.

THESE leaflets lend themselves admirably for the converting of women to Socialism in non-suffrage states as well.

TWELFTH DISTRIBUTION.—If there are negroes in your community you should make it a point to reach every one of them with: WHY THE NEGRO SHOULD VOTE THE SOCIALIST TICKET.

IF your community is strongly labor union, distribute TRADE UNIONS AND THE SOCIAL CRISIS.
