"A new page of human history lies open before us. Upon it must be written the full message and meaning of Socialism - democracy, internationalism and peace. NO GREATER, NO-BLER TASK HAS EVER APPEAL-ED TO MAN.

With firm, unfaltering faith in the future of our Cause and the ultimate triumph of these principles, we call upon all who love justice and peace and human progress to join with us in this our effort to build a higher and nobler civilization."

In this crucial hour we summon all the forces" of labor, "For an aggressive and uncompromising opposition to the whole capitalist system, and to every form of its most deadly fruits-miltarism and war; to strengthen the bonds of working class solidarity; to deepen the currents of conscious internationalism, and to proclaim to the world a constructive program leading towards permanent peace.'

STAND OF SOCIALIST PARTY.

O OTHER political party has declared its position on war and militarism, althe the nation is eager to know how and where they stand. Only the Socialist Party has taken all the people into its confidence and boldly declared its stand. The Anti-War Manifesto and Peace Program of the Socialist Party of the United States is our challenge to the powers that make war and breed militarism.

This declaration, bulwarked by the peace aspirations of American Socialism, as a measure to prevent war, demands disarmament — universal- disarmament as speedily as possible.

Pending complete disarmament, it declares for the abolition of the manufacture of arms and munitions for private profit, and prohibition of exportation of arms, war equipment and supplies from one country to another. It stands against an increase in existing armaments under any circumstances; against all appropriations for military and naval purposes. We pro-claim, "NOT ONE DOLLAR FOR MILI-TARISM AND MURDER!"

* * * * INSPIRED BY AWAKENED LABOR.

THAT is the stand of the Socialist Party as the jingoes and war mongers continue their siege of the nation's capital. That stand is not taken in any twilight zone of uncertainty. It did not get its inspiration from the money lenders of Wall Street; neither from the war-profiteers who guide the manufacture of death in the munition mills of the new Bethlehem, in Pennsylvania, and in the arms plants of Connecticut; nor does it spring from the hate born of narrow nationalism and prejudice fostered by ignorance. This peace message of Socialism springs from the ambitions for humanity cherished by enlightened labor.

We have proclaimed our Socialist peace message to all who would listen, during the 15 black months of war, thru millions of leaflets and from thousands of platforms. To be sure, the national administration, thru the democratic party, has issued no manifesto outlining its program. The capitalist press, however, from time to time has been allowed to inflame the public mind, aided and abetted by those in power in Washington. THERE-FORE WE KNOW THEIR INTENTIONS. The Socialist Party alone, of all the political parties, has stood uncompromisingly for peace and against all war and mili-tarism. ALONE WE FACE A UNITED FOE. BENT ON PLUNGING THE NA-TION INTO WAR!

The powers of plunder, the profiteers that prey upon the people, the Czars of Exploitation, seated upon the money thrones of the nation, do not want disarmament. So they order their satellites in the seats of government to speak for them. The secretary of the navy and the secretary of war, the President, nearly all the members of congress and other officials in

high places, these have all heard the demand of the masters for increased armaments, instead of disarmament, and they have declared for military expenditures next year and the years that are to immediately follow, that will rob the nation of billions of wealth, unless the mad race for armaments is immediately halted.

In support of this gigantic program of preparation to engage in wholesale slaughter, a national propaganda of unlimited proportions is now being carried on thru every conceivable channel of publicity. Leagues for the propagation of the desire to kill, from the Navy League that sits close to the machinery of government in Washington to the National Security League—more truly dubbed the "Hysteria League"—that spreads its tentacles out over the land, are being fed to fatness with the gold that comes from the coffers of those interests that profit by international slaughter. The capitalist jingo press is unanimous in its efforts to arouse the nation to a blood fury that will lead it straight down the crimson road to certain'destruction.

* * * * BLOOD VS. BROTHERHOOD.

AGAINST this almost deafening cry for blood we raise our plea for brotherhood. We must halt the imperialistic desires of those who would force the nation into disastrous conflict with the peoples of other lands. There is no sane reason why this nation should go to war with the conqueror of. Europe. There is no just cause for conflict with the people of Japan, despite the yellow-peril howls of the militarists. The United States is trying to bring peace to Mexico, and we can find no excuse for making war on any other country of this western world. The desire to conquer must not usurp the place of the nation's exalted desire for peace.

A disarmed United States will remain

a peaceful United States. An armed nation, with wealth untold being continually expended for increased armaments, will mean a nation always on the brink of war, finally to be precipitated into the slaughter abyss, perhaps during the present generation, perhaps not until the children of today have grown to manhood and womanhood, only to inherit the harvest of suffering, sorrow and death that the war mongers of today would prepare for them.

The issue between disarmament and armaments claims the attention of the nation as congress prepares to meet. SO-CIALISTS OF THE NATION! RALLY IN THE WAR AGAINST ARMAMENTS!

ABOLISH WAR PROFITS.

WITH the grip of the munition makers daily growing stronger as their profits mount higher and higher, our demand for the abolition of the manufacture of arms and munitions of war for, private profit calls for the best efforts of all believers in peace and humanity.

No one seeks to deny that the munition makers and the money lenders, the builders of dreadnaughts and the financiers of murder, the Schwabs, the Carnegies, the Rockefellers and the Morgans, have not reaped huge profits as they defrauded the government, while both democrats and republicans, in both houses of congress, stood idly by and winked at the robbery.

There has already been an untold amount of graft in the "preparation for war" expenditures of the nation. In spite of the fact that the United States has been spending more for "preparedness" than the militarist nations of Europe, we are now told that the navy is fit only to be scraped as old iron, while the army would prove poor fodder for one ravenous can-

Be not deceived! The navy is there and the army is there. They got us into the senseless war with Spain. They almost started the nation on a conquering expedition into Mexico. If we keep them or let them grow, they will not only get us into war, but they will continually serve as a great source of profit for the war profiteers. * * * *

WORRY ONLY ABOUT PROFITS.

THE Schwabs, the Carnegies and the Morgans are not worrying about the United States, which consists right now of one hundred million men, women and children, nearly every one of them of the working class, who have nothing to gain by war. These gentlemen are worrying about their profits. If they can frighten the people into believing they have no navy and no army, then they hope to force the people into permitting congress to vote huge sums to create an army and navy.

The war profiteers want a big navy and a big army because that means big profits. We Socialists demand that PRIVATE PROFIT be taken out of the manufacture of war munitions. We demand that the

immediately. We demand that if the United States must have the tools of slaughter, in spite of our opposition, that it manufacture them itself; that there shall be no profit for Schwab or Carnegie or Rockefeller or Morgan. We demand this because we know that when PRIVATE PROFIT has been eliminated from the manufacture of the instruments of death, then the greatest incentive for their production will have been abolished.

There is no clouding the issue between the war profiteers, who want war because it brings them profits: and those who demand that the nation manufacture its own war munitions, eliminating all profits.

FORCE EMBARGO ON ARMS.

THE national democratic administration has risked plunging this nation into the European gulf of blood by enforcing its demand that the war profiteers be permitted to export arms, war equipment and supplies to the warring nations. It has aided and abetted the making of a huge loan to the Allies by the House of Mor-

we have demanded the prohibition of the exportation of arms, war equipment and supplies from one country to another as an anti-war measure.

· We do not know which side is going to win. We do know, however, that victory for either side cannot bring back to life the millions of dead; cannot restore the thousands of shattered firesides, cannot heal the wounds of an outraged civilization and return to humanity the wasted wealth lost for all time in this universal slaughter.

We know that Germany victorious may demand a burdensome indemnity from the United States for the mass of war munitions the profiteers are sending across the sea, for the money its bankers have been allowed to contribute to bolster up one side in this uncalled-for strife.

Before the war was a month old, the Socialists of America issued and distributed one and one-half million copies of a leaf-let, "STARVE THE WAR AND FEED AMERICA!" It declared that:

"We must stop the shipping of all supplies into the war zone.

"Not a penny for loans, not an ounce of food should leave these shores to prolong this terrible shedding of blood.

"This is the only honest and complete neutrality. In no other way can we be sure of keeping this nation out of that fearful whirlpool.

We reiterate that declaration today. It is reiterated in the Anti-War Manifesto of American Socialists. Congress will next month be called upon to endorse the continued exportation of arms, war equipment and supplies from this country to the warring countries. We must stop congress from lending its sanction to this means of profiting by the slaughter in Europe.

OPPOSE AGITATION FOR WAR.

AT THIS HOUR, therefore, when congress is about to meet, when all the powers that make for war are actively at work, it is well to repeat part of the appeal issued by the Socialist Party to the people of the United States shortly after the sinking of the Lusitania last May. It is as follows:

"The insidious propaganda of American militarism has received a powerful impetus thru the destruction of American lives as a result of the war operations in Europe. The jingo press of the country is busily engaged in reckless efforts to turn the cries of natural indignation of the people into a savage howl for revenge. Shortsighted 'patriots' and professional militarists are inflaming the minds and blinding the reason of their fellow-citizens by appealing to national vanity. The sinister influences of the armament ring work thru thousands of hidden channels to stimulate a war sentiment, which to it means business and profits.

"In this grave hour of national crisis, the Socialist Party of the United States raises its voice in solemn and emphatic protest against this dangerous and criminal agitation, and proclaims its undying opposition to militarism and war. No disaster, however appalling; no crime, however revolting, justifies the slaughter of nations and the devastation of countries.

"Strong armaments and military preparations inevitably and irresistibly lead to war, as the tragic example of the nations of Europe has conclusively demonstrated.

"We call upon the people of the United States to profit by the lesson of our unfortunate brothers on the other side of the Atlantic Ocean, and to throttle all efforts to draw this country into the dangerous paths of international quarrels, imperialism, militarism and war.

'We call particularly upon the workers of America to oppose war and all agitation for war by the exercise of all the power in their command, for it is their class who pays the awful cost of warfare, without receiving any of its rewards. It is the workers who primarily furnish the soldiers on the battlefield and give their limbs and lives in the senseless quarrels of their masters.

"Let us proclaim in tones of unmistakable determination: 'Not a worker's arm shall be lifted for the slaying of a fellow-worker of another country. nor turned for the production of mankilling implements or war supplies! Down with war! Forward to international peace and the world-wide solidarity of all workers!'


