The two Socialists in the Chicago city council remain. But this does not nearly describe the results of the election. While John C. Kennedy, from the 27th ward, held over for another year, William E. Rodriguez, in the 15th ward, was up for reelection and the Socialist forces overcame the opposition, capturing 56 per cent of the total

RESULTS IN MILWAUKEE.

Let us first review the Milwaukee results. Remember that the Socialist Party in Milwaukee had been effectually killed by the capitalist press at two succeeding elections, in 1912 and again in 1914. But still it came back, stronger than ever, in spite of the headless ballot and the "nonpartisan" election

The campaign was a battle royal between the organized exploiters, led by the powerful Milwaukee Electric Railway and Lighting Co., and the more enlightened among the exploited, organized into the Socialist Party. Dan Hoan, Socialist city attorney, valiant foe of all the local public utility corporations, was the candidate for mayor, against Bading, the "nonpartisan" executive.
