COURT STRESSES LAW AT SCHENECTADY'S ICE PLANT

Socialist Mayor Defeats Object of Capitalist Court

By Charles E. Mullen. (Commissioner of Public Works). Schenectady, N. Y.—Again has the judicial ermine demonstrated that it is greater than the people who are supposed to be the creators of all civil institutions.

The municipal ice industry, established to give the people ice minus an enormous profit margin, has been cut out of business by the supreme court.

At one fell swoosh of the pen the judge decreed that the 1,000 customers who were depending on the city delivery for their ice supply should go without ice, while 2,000 tons of it that the people owned as members of the city may melt under the sun.

The enemy reckoned without their host. No sooner had the injunction been served on Mayor Lunn and myself, Comptroller Meyer and Treasurer Andrus, than a lesson was taught.

At 7:30 o'clock a high power towing car left the city to secure the "tail timber" for ice. This car carried the mayor, the commissioner of public works and the superintendent of wa-

from doing. They are selling ice to all who want it at 25 cents per 100 pounds in chunks of 10 pounds or

1,000 thereof. Not one of the 1,000 customers who were on the city books will get one day without ice.

When the blow fell and the city officials realized what it meant, a subscription was started at once, and enough money gotten to take care of immediate needs.

The injunction has been issued just or unjust we must obey it and we will. But the sale of ice to the citizens of Schenectady at 25 cents per 100 will go on just the same even if the people can not use their own city government to do things for themselves.

It was thought that this court order would flatter the Socialists out completely, and that their customers would be left to suffer for having bought ice of their own city government, or beg to be put back on the previous rationing lists.

Some citizens rather than buy private ice after what has happened. However, none of this deprivation will be necessary for the reason that Mayor Lunn has already assurances of the financial back-up of all the people in his attempt to serve them.

Nobody knows these facts better than those who are scheming to get an army post established in Buffalo. The soldier is essentially the same sort of man as his brother workman who has not yet been driven to the point where he is willing to carry a pin against his fellow-workman for a sin. He is a menace to the young girls of a city—not because of any special natural viciousness; but simply because he cannot master the fact that he wears a uniform does not prevent his having the same passions that other men have.

These things will not weigh in the balance against a few dollars in the eyes of the ruling class—simply because the profits will be theirs, while the victims will come entirely from the ranks of the working class.
