125,000 GARMENT WORKERS STRIKE IN NEW YORK CITY

Clothing Trade Completely Tied Up — 10,000 Pickets Guard Against Strike Breakers — Socialists Take Active Part.

About 125,000 tailors and garment workers are on strike in New York City. All branches of the trade are closed, and it is a general strike. Big mass meetings are being held by the men and women workers, and all are filled with the spirit of solidarity.

At the big mass meeting held at the Hippodrome on Sunday, the police, as usual, were on the scene to drive the workers from one door to another at the command of Manager Sullivan of the theatre who said "I don't think I want to have anything to do with the Jews anyway." 15,000 CITY EMPLOYEES' WAGES CUT 20 PER CENT

CHICAGO.—The salaries of 15,000 city employees were cut 20 per cent by the City Council today, says the New York Call.

All municipal employees except the Mayor and executive heads, whose salaries are fixed by the statute, and laborers whose wages are fixed by contract, are affected by the cut.

55 HOURS A WEEK FOR FEMALE WORKERS

Notice was served to the cotton and woolen manufacturers of the province of Quebec that starting from the first of January next, the government would enforce the statute limiting 48 1/2 hours per week the working time of all female workers in their mills. The statute was adopted at the last session of the legislature.

SOCIALISM AND CULTURE

Socialism is not merely or chiefly a destroyer, it is a builder and uplifter. It does not intend to destroy anything that is useful or beautiful, anything that is good and true, anything that makes for advancement, for the preservation of human life, for the improvement of social conditions. It does not intend, and has no inherent tendency whatever, to destroy anything that makes the burdens of life lighter for any useful human being, anything that helps to enlighten man as to the purpose of his existence, anything that may assist him in getting rid of degrading prejudices and weakening fears. It does not intend by any means to destroy wealth, or the means by which wealth is produced, or any property fit to serve some useful purpose.

It does not intend and will not destroy the bond of friendship between man and man, the bond of love between man and woman, the bond of affection between parents and children.

But Socialism will destroy such institutions as bring poverty and misery, grief and despair upon human beings. It will destroy those social conditions which corrupt all human relations with the poison of narrow self-interest, greed, avarice, envy, and hatred. It will destroy such rights as imply violation or negation of the natural birth-right of every man, woman and child to a decent living and the opportunity to make the best of his natural faculties.

It will destroy slavery in every form—economic, political, intellectual and spiritual—every social post which degrades, humiliates, dishonors man and enables a class of people to thrive on the ignorance of the masses.

Socialism will preserve and make use of every element of our modern civilization that is fit to live without the support of class-rule, class-justice and wholesale and retail robbery, deception and fraud.

It will not destroy the law which bids every man to earn his own living, but it will establish institutions that will enable every man to obey this law and enjoy the full benefit of its fulfillment.

It will not discriminate against one class in favor of another, but it will abolish class distinctions. It will not deprive learning, science, and art; it will do away with those obstacles that today prevent the masses of the people from acquiring knowledge and make them familiar with the results of scientific study and research, and introduce artistic tendencies into every human life.

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WORKERS FORGET THE STRUGGLE IN NOIS OF MERRY MASQUERADE

Big Broadway Arsenal Jammed by Socialists and Sympathizers, Who Join Hands in Greeting a New Year of Achievements of Which the Affair is a Good Omen.

In striking contrast with the wild, drunken orgies of the rich which characterized the New Year's Eve celebration at the local hotels, a great throng of Socialists made merry at the Broadway Arsenal on the last night of 1912. The celebration was enjoyable; but there was none of the rowdiness and revolting license which is so often present when the key-keeping class "takes off the lid."

LAST SESSION CITY CONVENTION

Delegates Meet to Discuss Matters Dealing With Welfare of Party in Buffalo.

The second session of the city convention of Local Buffalo, Socialist Party, was held at the headquarters, Franklin Hall, last Saturday evening.

The organizer presented a detailed report of work done during past campaign and made a number of recommendations.

The Propaganda Committee recommended that the Central Committee make arrangements for five lectures to be delivered by Comrade Haller on the "Class Struggle."

A committee was elected to prepare a pamphlet setting forth the Socialist philosophy as applied to government and society along these lines.

Each Branch was directed to elect an agent for the Buffalo Socialist, whose duty it shall be to secure new subscriptions for the Buffalo Socialist, look after the circulation of the paper in a general way and assist himself in the welfare of the party.

The Sunday School committee reported that the Sunday School, held under the patronage of Branch One, is very successful.

Eleven comrades were elected as members of the Building Committee. This committee is to prepare plans for the raising of funds for the purchase of a building to be owned by the Socialists of Buffalo.

A resolution was adopted calling for the formation of a committee to study municipal affairs. This committee is to be composed of one delegate from each branch.

Under the head of social and welfare work, delegates took the floor and expressed themselves on many phases of the movement.

BRANCH ONE WILL HAVE STUDY COURSE. Branch No. 1 will begin a class in economics on the second Monday in January.

BRANCH 3 DEBATE. Next Sunday, December 12, Branch 3 will hold a debate; the question will be "Resolved: That we should fight for Economic Equality."

BRANCH 8 CHANGES TIME OF MEETING. Commencing Friday, January 17, Branch 8 will meet at Frying's Hall every Friday instead of Sunday.

SPEAKER'S CLUB. On Monday evening, Jan. 13, Comrades Joe Ball and Fred Stanley are scheduled to deliver the addresses of the speakers.

Very shortly Comrade Atkinson, teacher of the club, is planning to divide the club membership into propaganda teams who will be sent out to patrol branches and to neighboring locals to gain the experience needed for the development of real Socialist speakers.

The public is invited to attend the sessions of the club which are held in Franklin Hall every Monday evening.

A CARRION FEAST

With the howling ferocity of slave-drivers who have caught a victim in the act of striking back, the capitalist press, press and public forum have fallen upon the manacled "labor leaders" at Indianapolis, and feeling safe to vent their spite upon them, have taken full advantage of their opportunity. Of the two classes, we do not hesitate to say the more innocent, which is not improbable, they with the poor, ignorant, half-baked victims condemned to prison, than to be with the fat, corrupt, over-fed lackeys of the rich who are delighting in the feast upon their carcasses.

The fact that not a single one of the condemned labor leaders is a Socialist has nothing to do with the fact that many of them, including John T. Butler of Buffalo, had frequently fulminated against the Socialists as being "too radical," has nothing to do with it; the fact that they insisted upon butting their heads against the stone wall, and ignoring the convenient gate of political class action, has nothing to do with it.

Two facts stand out bright and clear: First, that if they were guilty, which is by no means established to the satisfaction of the working class, they had merely done to certain powerful members of the capitalist class what the capitalist class has been doing to them for ages. Second, if they were innocent, which is not improbable, they merely added a few more to the long list of working class leaders who have fallen a prey to the vengeance of their hereditary enemies.

THE TRUTH SHALL MAKE YOU FREE

The masses of the people will never be free of their destiny unless they learn to think and act for themselves and cheerfully accept the responsibility for their own actions. No really intelligent and well-informed social class that acts on its own thinking has ever been oppressed for any length of time; for oppression is not merely a matter of force and economics, it is also a matter of a higher degree, a matter of knowledge and intelligence.

HUMAN NATURE AND SOCIALISM

You cannot change human nature, we are told, by the Socialists who imply anything of the kind. We never dreamed of changing the nature of man; on the contrary, we believe that human nature is not to be changed, but all its wonderful possibilities, will exert itself to the utmost, ridding itself of the conventional lies which today veil it and cripple it.

Nearly everybody else in Buffalo, to say nothing of the country at large, has known for three weeks that the official Socialist vote was a shade over 910,000. A month or more ago, the Associated Press printed a cunning scheme of the Socialist vote, with the seven largest states missing, showing the vote, it said, to be some 673,000.

Last week, the Express had occasion to refer to the great gain made by the Socialist party and unblinking voted, as the total Socialist vote, the correct figures are even in the almanacs, to say the least, of newspapers.

The moral is: If you see it in the Express, don't gamble on its being either very new or very accurate.

HE DEPID A KING

A desperate effort is being made by the Anglo-American and Anglo-French diplomats who so dearly love a lord, to keep out of the country Edward Mylius, an English journalist who dared to do his duty in the face of the British glimmers of light upon the personal history of King George. It appears that Mylius exposed one of the king's intrigues with a woman of humble origin. The thing is not new, but it is not so much what was said about his talents as a charmer of the fair sex; but when it comes to the fact that he is a Socialist, even a woman not of royal rank then his royal ribs blew out a cylinder head and ordered Mylius pinched.

Mylius is not a Socialist, but probably because the French people do not consider that it is their business to go head-bumping for English kings. Not so in the mind of the "free" world. Mylius was promptly held up at Ellis Island and the chances are that he will be shipped back to Europe.

It is, therefore, absolutely necessary for the workers to make themselves acquainted with the facts of social life, to study—as far as their time and means will permit—the phenomena of society, to master those things which they must know in order to become the masters of their own fate. In short, the intellectual education of the working class must keep pace with its economic and political education and organize its own power.

The race is to the strong, but the foundation of that strength, which is the decisive factor in civilized society, is knowledge, intelligence and wisdom, maintained with vigor and resolute determination.

It is, indeed, not human nature; it is your power, your privileges, your profits, its you are endangered by Socialism, and rightly so.
