The regular meeting of the Central Labor Council of Buffalo and vicinity, held on July 19th, had a very large attendance.

Several new unions sent their delegates to the Council, including the Granite Cutters, Polish Hood carriers, Shoe Clerks, Stone Pavers and Wood Carriers.

While a statement of the unions belonging to the Allied Printing Trades has joined the New Council, Typographical Union No. 9, at its last meeting laid the matter over for its next meeting.

Reports of committees were received including the constitution committee, which reported that it was making progress, but had not finished its work. A board of arbitration is to be elected, which will take up all matters in dispute between the unions and employers.

# CONDUCTORS AND TRAINMEN DELAY STRIKE CALL

The expected strike of the Conductors' and Trainmen's Brotherhoods, which involves about 80,000 men employed on 45 Eastern railroads, has been temporarily postponed in order to allow representatives of the Unions and Railroad to meet President Wilson at Washington, in an effort to bring the railroads into arbitration.

So far the companies have refused to arbitrate claiming that the present law which provides for only three men on the arbitration board places too much responsibility on one man, the third arbitrator.

It is claimed that if the conductors and trainmen go on strike that it will not prevent the engineers and firemen from working, a peculiar situation to allow, which will make the men on the front of the train break the strike, of those on the cars.

# NEW BRAND OF STRIKE BREAKERS

# DO YOU WANT A DAILY SOCIALIST?

The Board of Directors of the Buffalo Socialist held an important meeting at the office of the Buffalo Socialist last Friday evening. One of the subjects discussed was the publication of a daily paper. It was agreed to publish a daily Socialist paper in Buffalo beginning September first if the financial condition of the publishing company is such that at that time to permit such a radical step.

Whether we shall have a daily Socialist paper during the campaign or not depends on the readers of the Buffalo Socialist. The principal reason of most papers is from advertisements. This is not true however of this or most Socialist papers. We carry less advertising now than before the series of strikes.

Our circulation is greater but we have less advertising, and why? Siegrist & Fray's is an example. Before the clerks' strike occasionally this firm would give us a \$25.00 ad. During the strike we said some things about the conditions in Siegrist & Fray's stores and now of course they no longer advertise with us. This is only one of several cases. Other persons are prevented by intimidation from advertising in the Buffalo Socialist.

The weekly edition of the Buffalo Socialist is published at a deficit and before we can publish a daily we must first place the weekly edition upon a sound basis. That is the problem. During the next six weeks the weekly edition is made financially secure a daily will be published. How can this be done? This is the plan.

We have organized a Free Security League. The league will bear the same relation to the Buffalo Socialist that the Appeal Army does to the Appeal to Reason. The league is composed

# TUGMEN FORCED TO WORK 36 HOURS AT STRETCH IN VIOLATION OF LAW

It seems that our government officials in this locality are very neglectful of their duties insofar as enforcing any law that benefits the workers.

The attention of the Buffalo Socialist has been called to what the worst conditions of labor that could possibly be imagined, as far as hours of labor are concerned—that is the men who work on the tugs in and about Buffalo.

According to information given at this office, which is reliable, the men working on the tugs practically work all the time. Think of a straight stretch of work lasting 36 hours. There is no duty again after 13 hours.

Talk about breaking up the home.

What enjoyment can a man take of his home after doing 36 hours consecutive work.

The wonder is how they stand it.

There is a law against it which is supposed to protect the men from such conditions as that, but our government officials are too busy looking out for the interests of the bosses to spend any time protecting the men.

In order that our readers may get a true idea of the conditions under which these men work we publish the following letter written by one of them.

Editor Buffalo Socialist:

Just a few lines pertaining to working conditions on the harbor towing tugs operated by the Hand & Johnson Company, a subsidiary of the Great Lakes Towing Co., or to be explicit the Tug Trust.

There is a government law which reads: "This vessel shall not be operated more than thirteen (13) hours out of any twenty-four (24) hours either written or printed on most of the certificates of Inspection certified by the signatures of the Local Inspectors.

There is no working or trade agreement between the Tugmen and the Company which is a violation of the law; as the men are compelled to work thirty-six (36) hours at a stretch if the company "So Will," or has the feeling to do. Then there is a period of thirteen hours off. Then back again for thirty-nine (39) continuous hours, and then get a rest of ten (10) hours. A lovely system as you can see by the following system of the agreement.

The capitalist class through their control of the government officials can nullify any law passed which interferes with their profits, simply by appointing men to office who will neglect to perform their duty.

On the other hand let some workman on a strike for enough to live on commit the slightest crime and all the officials and the capitalist pronounce upon him and demand that he be punished to the full extent of the law.

The Buffalo Socialist will make further investigation into the conditions of these men, and place its columns at their disposal.

# GENESEVO TOUGHS TRY TO DUCK SOCIALIST SPEAKER

Inflamed Gang Threaten to Give Speaker James J. Kelly a Bath—One Dozen Challenge Him to Fight—Work of Anti-Socialist Agitators.

Violence and slugging having been the tools of the frightened masters of all ages, it is surprising to learn of the little episode that occurred at Genesevo, N. Y., last Thursday evening in connection with the street lecture of Comrade James Kelly.

Comrade Kelly finished his talk without any interruption, which indicates clearly that what followed was the result of a preconceived plan. After the questions asked by the thinking members of the crowd had been answered the majority of the audience drifted away to their homes. A few remained behind to purchase literature and subscription cards to the Buffalo Socialist. Finally these, too, departed, leaving behind a little group of about a dozen who were violently there for an entirely different purpose.

Their leader approached Comrade Kelly and announced that he wanted to subscribe for the Menace, a well-known anti-Catholic paper. Comrade Kelly replied that he was soliciting subscribers only for Socialist papers and that neither he nor the Socialist paper had any connection with the Menace.

The thugs, however, had evidently been inflamed by the recent anti-Socialist speeches of David Goldstein and believed that, as good Catholics, they were in duty bound to follow the instructions given a short time ago by Father Belford in New York. Who said: "The Socialist is a poison that every Catholic should be shot down like a mad dog."

Their leader, named John O'Shaughlin, had gained some local notoriety as a pug-nut, declared that they were going to give him a "bath" and to that town in the fountain," and shouldered Comrade Kelly threateningly.

Kelly declined to be tempted into a controversy with the gang, however, and evaded the mob by the simple expedient of passing into a small ice cream parlor just by the door, reaching his hotel by a slight detour.

Inasmuch as people of this calibre do not think fast, it was nearly two hours later before the pug-nutty-dispersed that their intended victim had slipped away from them. In the meantime they had stood for all of that time before the door of the ice cream parlor "daring" Kelly to come out and fight the twelve of them "like a man."

Aside from the demonstration of the gang, a very fair spirit was shown by the few citizens of Genesevo and much good work was done for the cause of the working class. A number of indignant citizens of Genesevo urged Kelly to prosecute the ruffians, when they heard of the episode on the following morning Mr. Kelly declined to do so, however, realizing that this class of hoodlums is always the tool of those higher up.

Several citizens of Genesevo have volunteered to see to it that in future speakers of the Socialist Party are fully protected.

The next meeting will be held on July 21st, when permanent officers will be elected, and it is expected that the few unions not yet represented will fall in line.

# GLASS WORKERS HAVE FIRMS TIED UP

The strike of the Glaziers, Glass Cutters and Glass Handlers continues with renewed vigor. During the past week the strikers have been reinforced by the hordes of the men from the mirror departments of the struck shops. Among the firms involved are the Pittsburgh Plate Glass Company, better known as the Becker Glass and Paint Company, the Drelich Kaiser Company and the Buffalo Glass Company.

The bosses are meeting with poor success in securing sales. Men are being imported from Pennsylvania Monday evening six men, who had been brought to town not knowing a strike was on, quit and demanded their return fare. The men are holding firm and with a little more will win an easy victory. The readers of the Buffalo Socialist are urged not to purchase glass or have glazier work done without first ascertaining whether the men are union men.

For the purpose of raising funds a Grand Moonlight Excursion under the auspices of the strikers will be held Saturday evening, July 20th. The steamer Lottie Koerber will have the foot of Main Street at 8:30 P. M. A good time is assured to all. Come, enjoy yourself and help the strikers.

# SOCIALIST MAYOR REFUSES TO CALL MILITIA

Granite City, Ill.—The stand taken by M. E. Kirkpatrick, Socialist Mayor of Granite City, was the obstacle in the way of breaking the strike of telephone girls here recently. The Socialist Mayor, true to the principles of his party, refused to call in the militia to break the strike at the behest of the phone company.

All the strike operators in the Granite City exchange had gone out and their places were filled with men. These were work idle, while a large number of strike sympathizers, assembled outside. Someone cut the telephone cables running into the exchange, throwing the scales into panic. The Bell people immediately sought to have State officials prevail on Kirkpatrick to send in the militia "to preserve order and protect property."

The Mayor replied that he could handle the situation with the local police, and advised Manager Hiss of the company to get his armed guards out of the exchange in order that the organized labor in Granite City might not become further irritated.
