Capitalist Politicians Plan to Discredit Socialist Candidate For Mayor

Attempt to Hamper Socialist Campaign

Capitalist Politicians Use Park Board as Tools to Prevent **Great Advance of Socialists** -- Looks Like Very Dirty Work.

Stephen J. Mahoney, Socialist candidate for Mayor of the City, of Buffalo was arrested yesterday noon at Lafayette Square, on the excuse that the Square was park property.

When Mahoney, accompanied by Joseph Pelon, organizer of the Socialist Party, and Samuel Leary arrived at the Square they were informed very politely that they would not be allowed to speak at that place, by orders which were supposed to eminate from the Superdent of parks.

Mahoney fully understood that it was within his rights to speak at that place and knew that the scheme had been contemplated for some time incorder to stop the inroads of the Socialists on the campaign for mayor. The fact that the affair was well planned is assured when one of our daily papers is known to have put an article in type on that subject but for some reason did not publish it.

The Socialists knew well the methods of the capitalist class, and decided that the fight for free speech might as well be started at this time, as later in the campaign, and Mahoney took the stand, and was arrested and taken to Police Station No. 3, charged with disorderly conduct. As usual the gang was in wrong on the charge and after due consideration the charge was changed.

Mahoney got in touch with his attorney and was released on his own cognizance. He appeared before Judge Noonan at 2:30 and remanded till next Monday.

That the Park Commission is being used as the goat in the arrest of Stephen J. Mahoney is the amusing factor in the stopping of the Socialists meetings at Lafayette Square. It is evident that the politicians were afraid to do the job direct, as it would hurt Fuhrmann in his campaign, and after the mayor and the chief of police con-sidered well the consequences, they decided to hand it to the Park Commission to do the dirty work.
