

THE PRICE OF A VOTE

BUFFALO NEWS REFUSES TO ACCEPT AN AD FOR SOCIALIST MEETING

Mr. Butler "Does Not Want to do Anything that Will Fill Halls for Socialists" — Very Peevish Because of Exposures by Buffalo Socialist.

Anything to down Socialism? The full power of the press by its policy of alliance in the news column and vicious lies in editorial. With cold chills running up and down its spine, the bloated animal 'capitalism looks with alarm at the increase in the power of the Socialist vote. Violence, it can subdue and use in forcing reaction against the rising working class, but before a campaign of education and truth, it stands helpless.

Socialist meetings, attended by thousands of enthusiastic citizens, receive not a line in the Capitalist press. That they fear Socialism, that they fear the TRUTH, was shown in a most convincing manner yesterday, when Mr. Butler of the News, remembering the Husted Mill Scandal, refused to admit a notice of a Socialist meeting to his advertising columns.

When a representative of the Buffalo Socialist submitted copy for an announcement of a meeting of the working people of the city, he was informed that Mr. Butler had said "No advertising is to be received from the Socialist party. I do not intend to give space to any organization that attacks me." The fact that that organization represents the majority of the people of the globe in their daily struggle for the means of life, does not strike him as of any importance.

What Mr. Butler is really afraid of is that he might in some way increase the number of enlightened people in the city and that this would reflect itself in an increased circulation of the Buffalo Socialist; the paper that is going to show to the people of this city, how its "first citizens" collect money for their next and then convert the same to their own purposes.

SOCIALIST VICTORY IN ITALY

With New Manhood Suffrage, Lawful Strength of Red is Shown.

"It's a dream! It will never come. You Socialists are a bunch who has swept Italy like a cyclone, the workers have awakened from their lethargy and are throwing off the yoke of oppression."

A special wire to the Buffalo Socialist announces that fifty-eight Socialist Deputies have been returned to Parliament and that a probable fifteen more will result from a recount of the vote in the doubtful districts.

The Socialists are now second in power, showing an increase of 30 per cent. over their last election. The Republicans returned but seven deputies and the Radicals, formerly powerful, succeeded in electing only 42 to power.

An enormous vote was polled, even in districts where the Socialists lost. Italy appears to be fairly saturated with the spirit of revolution, which is only held down by the limitations of the Italian election laws. With just representation the party will gain in power at the next election.

The government will control, due to force of numbers, with its 138 deputies, but that the working class will force many reform measures, as has in Germany, goes without saying.

The local Italian comrades are particularly jubilant over the fact that Comrade A. Carotti, a former A. F. of L. organizer, who spoke in Buffalo recently, will probably be elected. Comrade Turati shows his power by going to office with a plurality of fifteen thousand votes.

GENERAL STRIKE THREATENED IN COLORADO

Denver, Col., Oct. 29.—Martial law has been declared throughout the Southern Colorado coal fields, and 1,000 state troops are there to see that it is enforced.

For the past few weeks the people in the southern portion of the state have been living in a reign of terror. Hundreds of gun men and their most desperate characters in the West and Middle West, imported soon after the strike was declared to force the miners back to work. Nothing is sacred with them. Women and children dare not venture from their homes alone. To protect themselves and their families it was necessary for the miners to carry arms.

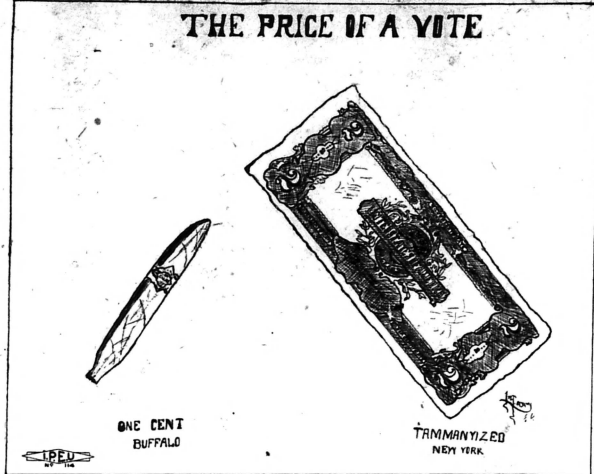
A state-wide strike of all workers in the state of Colorado may be called unless the mine barons agree to treat with the strikers, according to Frank Hayes, International vice-president of the United Mine Workers, who is in general charge of the situation. Over 8,000 miners are on strike.

John D. Rockefeller and 260 Broadway own the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company, and have refused to negotiate for a settlement.

5000 CLAYWORKERS STRIKE IN OHIO

Unable to make both ends meet in their daily struggle for bread, the workers in 35 potteries located at East Liverpool, Ohio, have left their work, demanding at least the means of subsistence in return for the wealth they are producing for their masters.

Here is but one more sample of the sorry plight of the working class. Once the owners of the tools, with plenty to eat and possessing the full value of their labor, they have allowed a few men to get control of their means of life and are reduced to a condition that is worse than any slavery experienced by the black man. So they will remain until, through enlightenment by the coming of Socialism, they will rise and in the full realization of their power, remove forever the necessity of fighting for their life.



WHAT IS THE PRICE OF YOUR VOTE?

Nearly everything in this world has a value or a price. And almost everything in this world has an equivalent value for which it may be exchanged. So it is with your vote.

No Bowery bum will come through with his vote for less than that. Two dollars is the price. And the politician buying the vote must be darned nice about it or otherwise the Bowery hoodlum will go to his competitor for the municipal graft and sell his vote to him. And the competitor would only be tickled to death to get that price.

In Buffalo a cheap "3 for 5" cigar or a two dollar bill and a policeman's club thrown into the bargain when you go out on strike, it merely proves that you got all that you wanted. Nothing more. Nothing less.

Your vote has a value. You ought to get something for it.

The Socialist voter does not cast his vote for nothing. He expects something in return. What you get in return for your vote is determined entirely by you.

Your vote is your birthright. It is your manhood. It represents everything that you have, all that you expect, all that you hope for, all that you dream and long for. If you give this birthright away for a stinking rope, then this is all your vote represents.

The Socialist voter prizes his vote and values it as something sacred. It represents his manhood, his fatherhood. He votes for the welfare of himself, his family and his fellow-man. He votes for economic security. He votes for life, for health, for prosperity and human well-being. The Socialist voter knows what his vote represents. That is the reason why he will not trade it for a cigar, for a two dollar bill, for a politician's handshake or pleasant smile.

POLICE THANKED FOR SERVICES DURING HOTEL WORKERS STRIKE

Police Report Shows Letter to Police Chief Thanking Him for Aid During Strike — Shows Where Democrat Administration Stands with Workers.

How well the police department obeyed the orders of the capitalist class during the hotel workers' strike about a year ago is shown by the letter of the Statter Hotel, thanking the Chief for his assistance in breaking the strike.

This letter is published in the report of the Police Department and is signed by Frank W. Hinkley as manager of the Hotel Statter, and reads as follows:

HOTEL STATTER, SUPERINTENDENT OF POLICE.

BUFFALO, N. Y., NOV. 12, '13.

MY DEAR CHIEF:—WE WISH TO THANK YOU FOR THE MANY FAVORABLE SERVICES WHICH YOU RENDERED TO US DURING THE RECENT STRIKE LABOR DISPUTATION. CAPTAIN FOREMEREY, AND HIS MEN, KEPT US CLOSE TOGETHER WITH THE CITY AND WERE VERY HELPFUL IN GRANTING US ASSISTANCE IN CASE ANY WAS NEEDED. WE AGAIN THANKING YOU, WE REMAIN,

LABOR REPRESENTATIVE WILL ARRIVE IN BUFFALO ON FRIDAY EVENING

James H. Maurer, President of Pennsylvania State Federation of Labor Will Arrive Early for Socialist Demonstration — Kirkpatrick, Noted Orator Here Saturday Morning — Will Receive Friends on Saturday Morning.

All arrangements are completed for the parade and demonstration of the Socialist Party Saturday evening.

James H. Maurer, who will be one of the speakers, writes from Harrisburg that he will arrive in the city Friday evening. Saturday morning will be spent renewing old acquaintances among the union men of Buffalo. George R. Kirkpatrick will arrive in the city about noon Saturday, coming direct from New York.

Can Be Heard Anywhere in Hall.

The speakers' platform and the seats at the Broadway Auditorium will be so arranged that everybody can hear. All the orators have exceptionally strong voices. A few reserved seats are still left. They can be procured at Post Mutual Life Building, or 165 Broadway.

There will be music and red fire decorations in the parade. Saint's Band has been engaged to furnish the music and thousands of Socialist pennants have been ordered.

The "Reds" Will Lead.

The position of honor in the procession has been given to those Socialists who are fortunate enough to be blessed with red hair. Eight have already come forward, who will march with uncovered heads. The parade will form on the Eagle street side of City Hall. Promptly at 7:45 the "forward march" order will be given by City Marshal Jos. Pelon. The line of march will be Franklin to Swan, to Main, to Broadway, to Auditorium, arriving at the hall about 8 o'clock.

Suppress News of Meeting.

Every effort is being made by the big Socialist demonstration from the workers of Buffalo, advertisements are being refused and boys who distribute advertising matter are being intimidated. But the Socialists of this city are not to be bulldozed; they are all on the job working to make this meeting the greatest the city has yet seen.

NEWS UPHOLDS FUGITIVE SLAVE LAW

The News is having fits over the LaFollette Seaman's Bill. The International Seaman's Union has been sending to Washington for the past 25 years their officers to fight for legislation for the freeing of the American sailor, and for the protection of lives at sea.

Under the present law a sailor cannot quit his ship without the consent of the captain, and if he does he is arrested and sent to jail under a penalty similar to the Fugitive Slave Law. The News says that the law is all right for the ocean, but it should not apply to the lake as it means that the crews on the boats will be increased 200 per cent. Well, what of it? It is a safe bet that when Mr. Butler travels on the water he sees to it that he has a sent in the lifeboat with competent seamen if it is necessary. But to put more able seamen on a ship so that in case of accident the common herd may have a chance, is not right, for he it known, Mr. Butler is a large stockholder in shipping, and the employment of more men means less profits, and besides if there is no one drowned, what chance has he to get the rake off, a \$100,000 bill.

This bill has already passed the Senate and comes up today in Congress. All the unions in the country are flooding Congress with telegrams demanding its immediate passage, and every reader of this paper is urged to write a letter at once to Speaker Clark, and their Congressman, demanding the passage of the Seaman's Bill.

of this strike," said Hayet. "They have refused even seriously to consider the offers we made through Governor Ammons. The reason is that they are determined to crush unionism in Colorado by crushing the strongest union in the state, the United Mine Workers.

"We do not propose to sit by and let them carry out any such program. We will retaliate with a State-wide strike that will tie up every industry in Colorado unless the operators change their attitude.

"If 26 Broadway is determined to crush unionism, we are ready to fight to a finish."

POSTAL CHAUFFEURS HAVE SERVICE TIED UP

New York, Oct. 29.—The delivery of mail in this city is practically at a standstill, due to the strike of chauffeurs employed by the Postal Transfer Service Company.

With mail accumulating at all the mail stations below 45th street, with incompetent chauffeurs rushing the heavy wagons through the city, endangering lives and limbs of pedestrians and with the strikers determined to win their demands, the Federal authorities stepped into the mail drivers' strike yesterday in an effort to help the Postal Transfer Service Company break the solidarity of the workers.

It was admitted in official circles that the Federal authorities have no jurisdiction in the matter, as the struggle is between a private concern and its employees, yet the interference of the Federal officials is nothing short of an effort to intimidate the strikers by enforcing a Federal law against them.

"So far as we are concerned, the fight has just begun," said Michael Cashel, first vice-president of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, Chauffeurs, Stablemen and Helpers' Union, of the A. F. of L. last night, speaking of the lockout of the 135 chauffeurs and drivers employed by the Postal Transfer Company. "We are willing to meet the firm for a settlement, but will stick to our demands. I want this affair to be considered a lockout and not a strike, as the demands were submitted to the firm, and they started the lockout by discriminating against members of the union."

It is estimated that more than fifty gangsters and gunmen, all members of notorious West Side gangs, are guarding the garages of the company in West 25th street. A cordon of policemen and a score of detectives are also on the job.

Every trick that left the garage yesterday was closely guarded by police, as the scab chauffeurs have been having trouble. The chauffeur of each small truck and wagon was accompanied by a solitary policeman and several officers served on the larger ones.

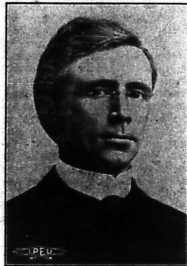
