

There are 68,000 wage workers in Buffalo Reason enough why that class should be represented in the city council. More than that: The wage workers have interests peculiar to their class, while the Poles, as the representatives of any other of the various nationalities making up the population of this community, have no such special interests. Yet none of the three parties that stand for capitalist exploitation pays the least attention to the claim of the working class for recognition, and they are justified in this attitude by the fact that they cannot represent the interests of the master class and those of the wage workers at the same time.

No political party, any more than an individual, can serve two masters.

The reason consons workers are fully awars of this; they never expected the control of fighting their own political battles, and forming a party of their own. They do not ask favors from the political agents of their employers, but are determined to secure what they know to be their rights by their own strength and power.

And the sooner the masses of the ware workers come to under-

And the sooner the masses of the wage workers come to under-And the sooner the masses of the wage workers come to understand the real condition of things in polities, the sooner they awake to the fact that they are only deceiving themselves by expecting capitalist politicians to take care of working class interests the sooner they will join their own party, and make it powerful enough to smash capitalist class-rule in city, state and nation.

It is the Socialist party that represents the toilers everywhere, and if the 68,000 wage workers of Buffalo ever hope of seeing their class interests take care of in public legislation and administration, they must themselves realize this hope by adhering to their own party, identifying themselves with it, and working and voting for it on election day.

Every vote east for Socialism is a protest against capitalist class ile, political corruption, and the subordination of public intertsts private profit-hunting.

What has become of the prospecity of which capitalist news-papers had so much to say a little while ago? The workers have not as yet caught sight of it. It is invisible to them. The masters have collared it and keep it for themselves for fear the wage workers might abuse it. Next Tuesday you will have an opportunity to tell the monopolizers of that prosperity what you think of their scheme. Don't miss it.

It takes time to build up a political party, especially a party, the object of which is not merely a change of government, but a radical change of the economic foundations of the existing social order, yet no time and effort is wasted that serves a great and noble purpose. Nothing of real value can be accomplished without hard labor and endurance. Ask the farmer how much labor he has to put into the woll before the crops are ready for the reaper.

THEY CALL THAT A BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

We agree with the "Buffalo Courier" when it says, that with the rapid growth of the city the expenditure for improvements and main-

But we fail to see that any rate of growth of a city in population and industrial and commercial importance will ever justify the
reckless squandering of public money. The question is not, how
much money have you spent, but how did you spend it? To what
purpose did you spend it? What did you get for it?

Our local rulers have wasted millions upon millions on new
water works, pretending to supply pure water to the citizens. But
part of those works lie in ruins, and the fluid furnished must be
boiled in order to render it fit for domestic use. This proves that
the millions spent for that purpose were not wisely spent but wasted.

Our city administration spends fortunes upon fortunes on pavements and street repair, but our streets are always out of repair,
and wherever you go you find signs put up by the department of
streets bearing the very cheerful legend that the street in question
has been condemned on account of the dangerous condition of the
pavement, which is usually nothing else but an almost endless chain
of holes

They have repeatedly raised the salaries of the guardian angels of law and order, but to say that they have become more efficient thereby, would be telling a falsehood. Vice and crime flourish, impostors and swindlers of all kinds infest the city, and citizens are waylaid, attacked, robbed, and even shot in the public streets. Read the capitalist newspapers, if you need any documentary proofs of this.

. The public school facilities are hopelessly inadequate, the street ting in some districts of the city is miserable; we have miles of ter front, but not one decent city dock, and our public sewerage o poor that after a heavy rain streets and cellars are formidable

lakes. These are some of the results of our city administration, and they certainly are no recommendation for it. They may prove many things, but they do not prove the one thing that is rarely in need of proofs, namely, the assertion that the money of the taxpayers has been well spent. No private business concern would stand for such a management of its affairs; why, then should the community stand for it!
