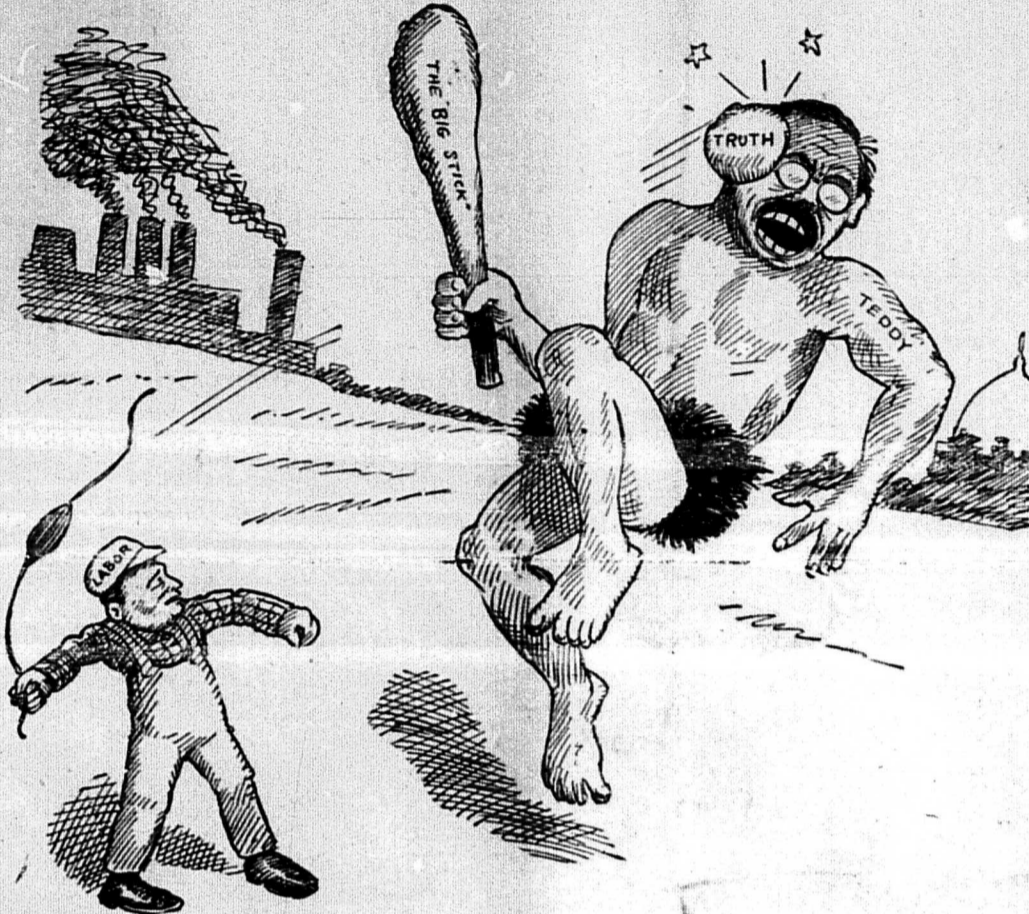

REPRESENTATIVES OF 200,000 NEW YORK CITIZENS SHOW TEDDY LIES

New York, April 25.—Representatives of more than 200,000 workers which compose the Moyer and Haywood committee met last night and discussed a plan of action in view of the second attack of President Roosevelt on Moyer and Haywood.

The committee would not divulge its plan of action, but made public the following statement which expresses its sentiments on the president's letter.

"The reply of President Roosevelt is a direct insult to every man who has interested himself in the defense of Moyer and Haywood. It is an insult and a warning that will never be forgotten by intelligent men.

Nothing else that he has done has so clearly revealed the spirit, the character and the merely rudimentary sense of justice of the man, Theodore Roosevelt.

NEWS FOR UNIONISTS

The party: Mrs. Roosevelt, Miss Roosevelt, Archie and Quantin, the young Roosevelt boys; Justice Moody, Secretary Loeb, Assistant Secretary Bacon and Mrs. Bacon, Mrs. Ralph Cross Johnson, Assistant Secretary Latty, Dr. Ohnesorg, U. S. N., and the military and naval attaches; Capt. Lee, U. S. A.; Lieut. Commander Key, U. S. N., and Lieut. Commander Long, U. S. N.
