

FRANCE FACES A SERIOUS CRISIS

Strike Enforces the Fact That It Is Struggling With Great Economic Problem

Montpellier, France, June 27.—(Via Frontier.)—Southern France is today in the throes of a political convulsion strikingly analogous to that which obtained throughout the south in the United States in 1900. It is also struggling with the most modern economic problem, the trust.

Many lives have been lost, thousands of dollars of damage resulted, thousands more have been lost by the government in unpaid taxes and the political machinery of four departments has been paralyzed. Administration papers tell Parisians that the movement of the southern wine growers has collapsed. The statement is a falsehood. The situation could not be worse.

Suppressing the Truth.

Elliott said that he sat in the seat behind Orchard, who during the ride introduced himself as Thomas Hogan. He further said that their destination, according to the witness, Hogan declared that he was formerly a member of the Western Federation of Miners, but that he left the union two years previously and had entered the employ of the Mine Owners' association as a "spotter."

Referring to the Cripple Creek strike,

Hogan asserted that the miners lost out there and that they would lose out everywhere and that their employment association had perfected plans whereby the Western Federation of Miners would shortly be driven out of existence and that their destination would be followed by the annihilation of organized labor generally all over the United States.

Elliott said he asked Hogan how it was possible to accomplish that, and that their destination would be followed by the annihilation of organized labor generally all over the United States.

Hogan, he said, asserted that the mine owners were going to begin immediately and that within thirty days something would happen in southern Idaho that would shock the state and result in the dismemberment of the miners' union.

The witness stated that Hogan further said that there was nothing to the Western Federation of Miners except the leaders, and that when they were out of the way the organization would go to pieces.

NEW COMPANY IN TELEGRAPH FIELD

Western Union and Postal Men Agitated by Report of an Independent Concern

Considerable agitation was caused among the officials of the Western Union and the Postal Telegraph companies when a rumor spread through the offices that a new telegraph company is planned by Chicago brokers and others leasing wires from the present companies.

The leased wires, it is said, will serve as a nucleus for a new telegraph system.

In view of the fact that Chicago brokers have been friendly all along to the striking telegraphers and several firms donated large sums to the strike fund, the declaration that these companies will unite with the men and form a new telegraph system is taken seriously and is causing much alarm among the companies concerned by the present strike. It was said that the brokers here are growing tired of the overbearing of the telegraph companies, their unwarranted treatment of the operators which forces them to strike and greatly affect the business of the country thereby.

At the office of the Commercial Telegraphers' union the project of starting a new company was declared to be quite practicable and that such a project bids fair to succeed, as all who deal with the present companies seem tired of the treatment they receive.

A sentiment prevails that there is too much of a monopoly in the telegraph business.

ACTIVE UNDER NOSE OF RUSS' MINISTRY

"Illegal" Literature Seized in the Department of War; Consternation

St. Petersburg, June 27.—Great consternation reigns in official circles as a result of the discovery, made yesterday, that revolutionary groups had their headquarters in the department of the war ministry, under the very nose of government officials.

The department was searched and great quantities of "illegal" literature was seized.

From St. Petersburg was received this fifty officers of the army were arrested for spreading revolutionary propaganda among their soldiers. Similar cases on a smaller scale are reported from every part of Russia.

Try to Stop Proclamation.

It was learned that one of these proclamations, which contains the most vigorous denunciation of the czar, was printed surreptitiously on the presses of the Official Messenger, the organ of the government. Gendarmes and secret service men are moving heaven and earth to find out how revolutionists managed to get their printing done in the office of the government's printer, which resembles more an armed camp than a printing office.

Touch a Bank.

WIRE MEN SEE VICTORY; CHICAGO STRIKE NEXT

Hypocrisy of the Postal Company Stuns—Paralysis of Great System Sets in When Few Experts "Lay Off"

From all quarters reports came today that promise victory for the Commercial Telegraphers, who are in combat with two of the lawless and contract breaking monopolies.

There are no strike breakers available, and only here and there is found an operator so ignorant and so lost to honor as to desert his friends and fellows of the working class.

It will only be a course of time until the companies must give in, according to those familiar with the situation.

Both the Postal and Western Union now, with only a few men out, are hard hit.

Chicago is to be the scene of the next walkout of telegraphers. This is official and comes from a prominent telegrapher.

Give Friends Time.

Just how soon the strike here will be called the telegrapher would not say, but he stated positively that the next blow will be dealt simultaneously in Chicago and New York.

Portugese Hunted Like Rabbits—Soldiers Mutiny

Lisbon, Portugal, June 27.—Fired on by the troops, hunted down like rabbits through the narrow streets, and finally pursued by cavalry which rode down men, women and children indiscriminately, over 100 persons are dead and fully 600 wounded as the outcome of violent street demonstrations against the government in the three northern towns of Braga, Villa Real and Viana do Castelo.

Further troubles are expected. The mobs paraded the streets shouting, "Down with absolutism," and deifying King Carlos for his attempt to rule the country without parliament.

Hot Water for Soldiers.

Soldiers sent to disperse the rioters were attacked by stones, bricks and other missiles. They replied with volleys which stretched scores of the rioters in the streets.

This did not quell the mob entirely, however. Persons in houses continued to bombard the troops with stones, while hot water was poured on them.

No big teams are allowed there; in fact, the asphalt is so smooth that it offers an inviting opportunity for that healthful outdoor sport roller skating.

But the strong arm of the law has intervened and people have been warned to keep off with their cheap roller skates.

The reason is not stated, but it is supposed to be a fear that some of the tax-dodging aristocracy of Chicago will spin over the asphalt by roller skating children of the poor, the tots who want some amusement and have resorted to this form of outdoor sport.

Of course, the owners of the automobiles pay all the taxes—nit. The daily press is just now devoting much attention to the fact that the tax-dodging harvester trust has evaded listing \$150,000,000 worth of property in Chicago for taxation.

Yet, keep little ones and adults off the sacred asphalt while roller skating is fine. If you don't, one of the policemen, directed by Big Biz and his cohorts, will jug you.

King Faces Ruin.

Every day the situation is becoming more dangerous. Possible bankruptcy faces the country. Treasury receipts indicate a deficit of \$10,000 and the gold reserve is only \$6,250,000. There is little likelihood that a loan can be made unless railway interest is paid, and it is impossible to increase taxes, as they have already been boosted as high as the people can stand.
