Detectives Sent in Reply to Message—All Clues Unearthed by Daily Socialist Point to White Slave Plot

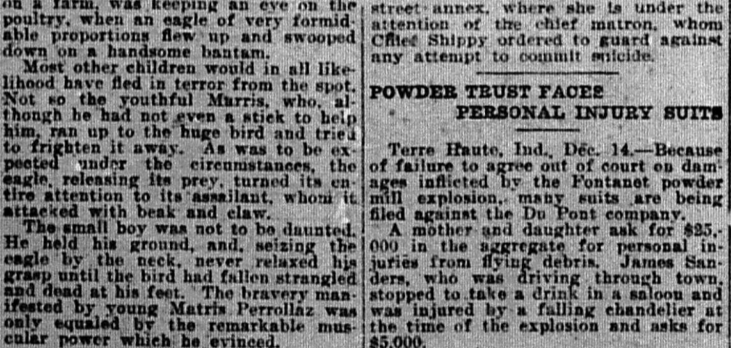

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CITY STINGY IN FIGHTING DEATH

Dr. W. A. Evans, commissioner of health, is again talking. His latest statement is that Chicago is spending a disgracefully small appropriation for the city's health, and by so doing is courted disease.

He dealt with the question of housing the people, and asserted that three ought to be 35 inspectors on horses instead of only 11.

"Do you know," he asked, "that during the last year there were more than 7,500 deaths resulting from consumption and pneumonia?"

The commissioner stated that he intended applying to the finance committee with recommendations for more money to be directed in the following lines: More inspectors, a contagious disease hospital, eight more men for food inspecting, more clerks for the city laboratory.
