President Wanted Secretary to Save \$55,510 He Had in Gotham Bank—Poured in Government's Cash

New York, Jan. 16.—When the Knickerbocker Trust company closed its doors it found President Roosevelt a depositor to the extent of \$55,510, the amount being carried in the name of a member of his family. The president immediately dispatched Secretary of the Treasury Cortelyou to New York with instructions to save the tottering institution by peering government funds into it.

BLACK HAND THREATENS LIFE OF A MAYOR

Reading, Pa., Jan. 15.—Mayor Gerber has received a "black hand" letter in which not only his life but the lives of the entire police force of Reading are threatened. The note, which is decorated with a crudely drawn skull and crossbones, conveys the information that the "black hand" agents will pursue their destructive tactics if any harm comes to the two Italians under arrest, charged with the murder of State Trooper Kelleher. The note is signed, "1901, Chief of the Society."

BOY KILLED IN BIG STORE; PAPERS SUPPRESS NEWS

Sixteen-Year-Old Worker Loses Life in Elevator Shaft—Conflicting Stories as to Who Is to Blame for the Tragedy

INSANE ASYLUM TO BE PROBED

Some of the complaints relate to the new hydrotherapeutic treatment of insanity, which is said to have caused a number of deaths.

GRAND JURY INDICTS GOTHAM BANK PRESIDENT

New York, Jan. 15.—The special grand jury which was sworn in to investigate the conduct of certain banks in New York county returned two indictments against William E. Montgomery, president of the Hamilton bank. The charges, involving overdrafts and overcertification, have to do, however, with acts alleged to have been committed by Montgomery while he was vice president of the institution.
