Columbus, O., Feb. 3.—Denis O'Sullivan, the famous Irish actor, died in Grant hospital today. He had been operated on for appendicitis.

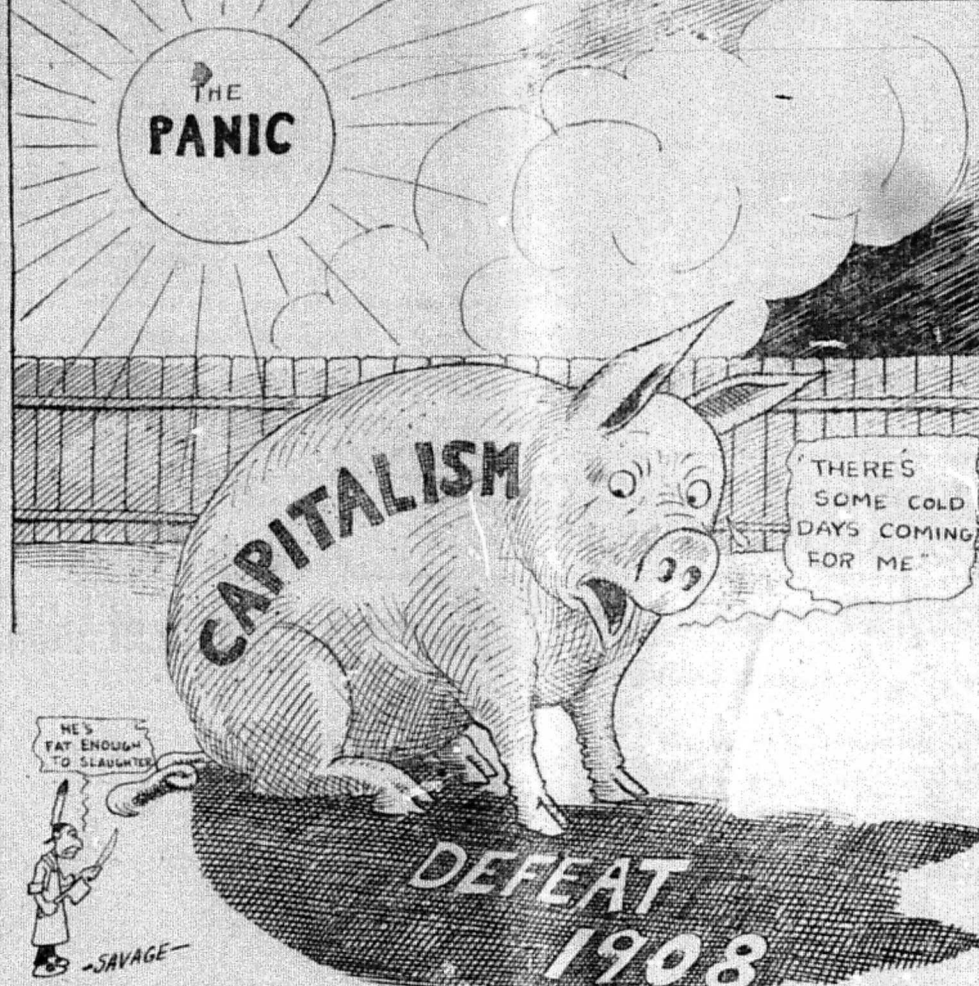
O'Sullivan recently played an engagement at McVicker's theater here in "Peggy Macree," a play written by his wife.

Guthrie, Okla., Feb. 2.—Organized labor was "downed" once more by the house of representatives by its failure to take final action on the Bryan bill, which was for the creation of a state boiler inspector, and the Brook bill for an eight-hour day for train dispatchers and operators engaged in the movement of trains.

The labor lobby had been working especially hard to have these two bills passed (and) consider the actions of "the house" unfair.

REVOLUTION NOW ON, SAYS GAYLORD IN HIS LECTURE

"The Present Revolution" was the subject of W. R. Gaylord's lecture Sunday at Odd Fellows' hall, Sixty-third street and Yale avenue, to which the lecture series had been transferred from the Madison theater.

A synopsis of his lecture is as follows:

"Because the Socialist party is made up of men who are willing to face the facts, it speaks frankly and honestly of revolution.

"But revolution we do not mean that thing which the capitalist class really fear least of all, i. e., mere violence and destruction of property. The Chicago police force are much more ready for unmeaning violence than are the Socialists.

What Revolution Means

"We mean by revolution the transfer of the governing power from the hands of the capitalist class to the hands of the class who work with hand and brain in the socially necessary class.

"We believe that this kind of revolution is necessary if we are to perpetuate our civilization. We believe that this revolution which is to bring to Socialism will also introduce the next epoch of civilization.

"And we believe that this revolution is being compelled—that the masses of the people will be ready to carry it out in self-defense once they understand the Socialist aim and method.

Old Order Is Gone

"The social and industrial order under which our fathers and grandfathers grew up has disappeared. In its place has arisen an entirely different method of life and labor, in which the individual has not as great a degree of liberty and hope of success as he had formerly.

Punta Arenas, Strait of Magellan, Feb. 3.—The fleet of Rear Admiral Evans is anchored here. The average running time from Rio Janeiro to Cape Horn averaged 237 hours a day.

JAPAN GUARDING ITS COAST LINE

Tokio, Feb. 3.—At a sectional committee meeting of the diet M. Oishi asked against whom were Japan's military preparations directed. Gen. War Minister Tanaka replied, saying that they were not directed against any single nation, but against eventualities on the Pacific, where Japan has a long coast line from Sakhalin to Formosa.

Since the receipt from Washington of the last reply to the Japanese memorandum of Dec. 31 on the emigration question, the Japanese government has been busy attending to interior affairs arising from the attack on the cabinet and the bombardments of interpellations in the diet.

The storm is apparently over and the foreign office will now give prompt attention to the American negotiations.

The Oglesby direct primary law will have no effect upon the aldermanic primaries next Saturday. There seems to be some misapprehension as to this. These primaries will be held in the usual manner and at the usual places.

News for Unionists

The Iowa Central railroad has announced that when the nine-hour law takes effect March 1 it will reduce the wages of its telegraphers at stations where more than one operator is required.

It has been decided that a referendum vote by the Cigar-makers' union will be required to effect a merger with the stock makers. The referendum has been ordered.

Denver employers of ironmolders and coremakers threaten the open shop unless their employees accept a reduction of 50 cents a day.

The Brotherhood of Railway Clerks has nearly completed the organization of clerks on the New York, New Haven & Hartford, Boston & Maine and the Boston & Albany roads.

During the last quarter of 1907 the American Federation of Labor issued 69 charters - one to a state branch, 44 to central unions, 22 to local unions and three to federal labor unions.

The United States grand jury at Parkersburg, W. Va., has indicted Captain William M. Hall, United States engineer, charging him with a violation of the eight-hour law, while employing workmen on the Ohio river between Parkersburg and Wheeling.

Central Labor union of Cincinnati has adopted a resolution declaring that the universal success of the prohibition movement would be detrimental to business and consequently to labor.

Store mounters at Belleville, Ill., about 200 in number, have struck against a 5 per cent reduction in wages.

LOCAL LABOR

Women to Give Ball. Woman's auxiliary of Typographical union No. 16 has announced its fourth annual reception and ball to be given at Illinois hall, Madison street and Ogden avenue, Wednesday evening, Feb. 26.

Strike Is Not Settled. Chicago machinists say that the reported settlement of the strike on the Erie railroad and other well-known strikes, they say, is still in effect. The report, they believe, is sent out for the purpose of getting some of the old machinists back.

Cigarmakers Plan Ball. Cigarmakers' union No. 14 of Chicago will give its 30th annual masquerade ball at Casino, Wash. avenue and Peck court, Saturday, Feb. 8.

Besides \$100 in cash to be given away as prizes for groups and costumes, various unions have donated articles from industries on which members of these unions themselves work at.

Will Have Button Day. Chicago Local No. 1, Commercial Telegraphers' union, which took the lead in the organization work of the union, is preparing to have another "button" day, when every one will wear the union emblem as they last spring, to show their strength and defy the companies. Chicago telegraphers say everything is working out well and under cover. They are encouraged by the reports of a new company starting soon.

New Elevator Agreement. On the 14th of February the five-year agreement entered into between the Chicago Elevator Conductors and Stuffers' union and the Building Managers' association will expire.

It will then be necessary to either negotiate and obtain a new agreement with the association or with the individual buildings in order to maintain the advantages gained under the old agreement.

The union is sending out letters to both union and nonunion conductors calling their attention to conditions prevailing now as compared with what they were five and a half years ago, and asking for support and co-operation.

"Wages paid five years ago," said Agent McAndrews, "were \$40, \$45 and \$50 a month for 10, 11 and 12 hours and \$70 a month for 12 1/2 hours a day."

Only the coolness of Miss Jackson, the principal, prevented a disastrous panic as a passerby hearing the young woman's cry, turned in an alarm.
