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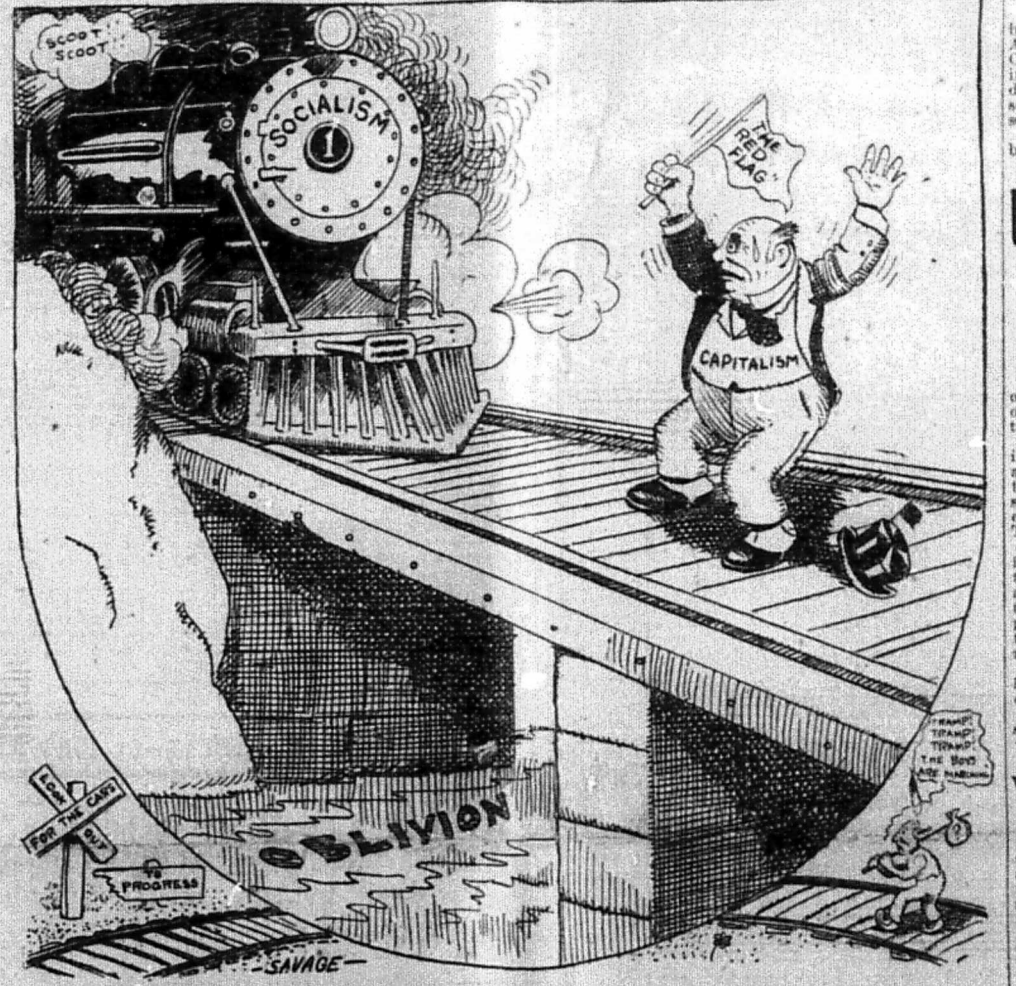


Table with 2 columns: REPUBLICAN and DEMOCRATIC. Lists names and numbers for various states.

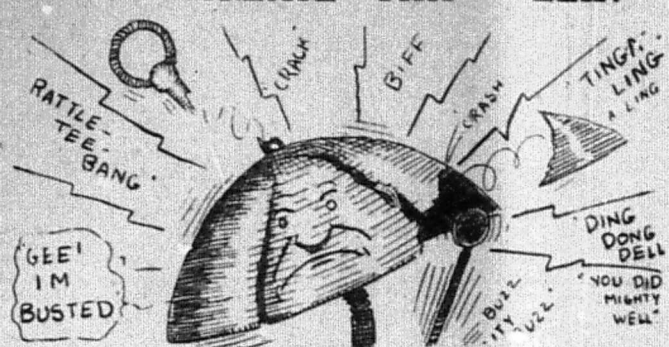

Labor and Injunctions

Next Sunday the trade unions of the United States will be holding thousands of meetings to protest against "government by injunction."

Few people realize how suddenly this method of fighting Labor has been developed, or just how it originated.

Here is how the injunction grew up. A court has always had power to preserve order while any matter was before it.

Out of this simple affair has grown up a practice that is overturning long-established principles of justice and abolishing rights for which whole generations of men fought and died.

Judges have decided that they can make rules governing the actions of PERSONS OUTSIDE THEIR COURT as well as in it.

In other words, the judge MAKES A SPECIAL LAW to fit the particular case under consideration.

"Special legislation" has always been considered as something so flagrantly unjust that it is forbidden by the constitutions of practically every state in the union.

But the judge does not stop with having issued the injunction and making a whole new legal code to fit this particular case.

In the old days when a man insulted the court, or interfered with its procedure, his offense was so flagrant and open that the judge was permitted to inflict the small punishments considered suitable to such occasions without the intervention of a jury.

Those who are accused of any such violations are brought before the judge who made the law and are charged with CONTEMPT OF COURT.

In short, "government by injunction" means unrestrained special legislation for private purposes by a legislator who was not elected as a lawmaker, and who has strong class interests at stake in the matter legislated upon.

Here is the place where only political action is of any avail. The strike will not help. The boycott will accomplish nothing.

"The third thing is to beautify the place wherein she lives, whether it is one room or a spacious home. Weed out the useless things; rearrange the others, and force her dwelling place to express in some way her own feelings of what is beautiful and true.

"No matter how circumscribed her life, these three steps toward the betterment of the world are within every woman's reach.

"She may not be able to take part in great civic movements. The circle of her influence may be a small one. Yet, if there is in her an ideal of beauty, which finds its expression in the steadfast improvement of her home, her health and her dress, she is doing artistic work with regard to all progress begin with and work out through the individual."

The above is certainly a daring incitement to women to improve their lot and the general condition of the world. A woman may be without the proper reason for fighting the injustice that she sees about her; but let her patronize Mrs. Burghman's beauty parlor, and all will yet be well. Maybe, in this life of marvellous machinery, she is still plowing with a stick; let her be amiable while she is about it.
