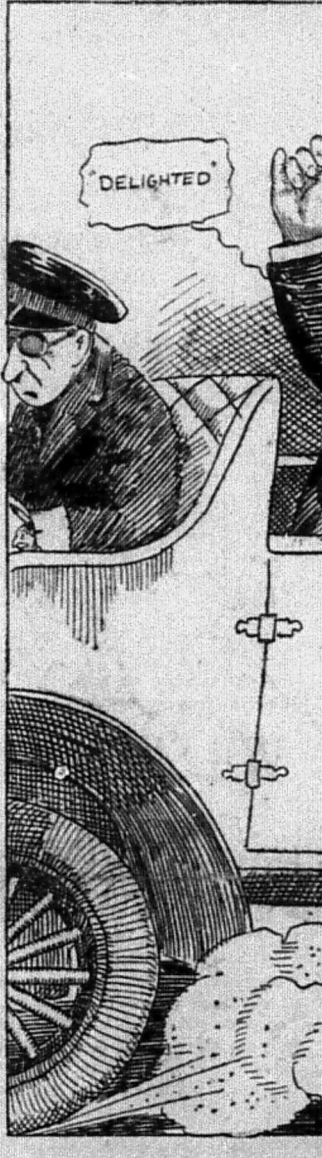

SOCIALIST HAS NEW INVENTION

Designs Electric Battery in Which Feature Is Thermal Action

(Special to the Daily Socialist.) Kansas City, Mo., April 21.—Forbes Garvey, an electrical engineer of this place, and a Socialist, claims to have made some recent discoveries and inventions which will be of great importance to the electrical world.

An improved electric battery, the current for which is generated by thermal action, and the improvement of the process for making liquid air—an important substance used in connection with the battery—are the most important of these inventions. He expects to make it possible to obtain liquid air as easily and cheaply as gasoline is at present.

Long in Shape. "The battery consists of a tank thermopile," the inventor said, "is a great departure from all other methods of generating electricity, for, though the principle has long been known, it has not been in shape for practical use until now."

Garvey Explains Process. Garvey explains his new process for manufacturing liquid air as follows: "In the old way of making liquid air the atmosphere was compressed several times, cooled by water after each compression and then released, part of the air being liquefied and the remainder escaping to the open air."

Has Auto Invention. A simple device for equalizing the power of an automobile while going around a curve is another of his inventions. A separate series wound motor is used on each side, but the armature of each is connected in series with the field of the other motor.
