

That Y. M. C. A. Advertising

The rawest thing that has appeared in all the history of capitalist philanthropy is the advertising of the Young Men's Christian Association of Chicago in its effort to raise a million-dollar endowment. Whether this advertising is the work of some shrewd Socialist who is "double-crossing" his employers, or simply of some green advertising agent who does not know any more than to tell the truth or not we have no means of knowing.

At any rate, that advertising is a gem. It is a straight appeal to the capitalist to give to his victims BECAUSE THEY ARE HIS VICTIMS. It is fearfully, terribly true. It is almost the first time that an appeal for charity was based on the truth.

Here is a sentence from one of these advertisements describing the "boy who plays after dark," and for whom the Y. M. C. A. is supposed to be caring: "He is a pitiful human cog in the wheel that is turning his BOYHOOD'S PROMISE into your MAN-HOOD'S PROFIT." (The capitals are in the original.)

Yes, that is exactly what is being done. The children who work in the sweatshops that manufacture the clothing sold by J. V. Farwell, the little cash boys in the establishment of Marshall Field & Co., the boys and girls who are wading in filth and blood in the packing houses of Ogden Armour, are turning their "boyhood's promise" into the "manhood's profit" of the owners of these plants who are the donors to the Y. M. C. A. fund.

The Socialist is not quarreling with the Y. M. C. A. While capitalism lasts it is one of the functions of those who profit by its existence to dispense a portion of their gains in the form of charity. While the battle rages on the industrial field we shall not criticise those among the exploiters who spend a portion of their time and money in courtplaster for the wounded.

In fact, it is decidedly encouraging to see the mask of hypocrisy torn aside and to see a recognition of the fact that those who furnish the courtplaster are the ones who gave the wounds.

But the Socialist also sees that the supply of courtplaster is pitiably short and its effects tragically inadequate to the need. The great multitude of those whose "boyhood's promise" is turned into "manhood's profits" will never enter the halls of the Y. M. C. A. They would be strangely out of place there, even though there should be still another outburst of charity to reduce the at present insurmountable fees.

But of these things the Socialist is not complaining. His indicament goes deeper than this. He sees no reason why that boy should be deprived of his "boyhood's promise" in the first place. There are natural resources enough in this land to provide for the realization of that promise for every boy. There are instruments of production so perfect that every boy and man can produce more than enough to supply himself with far greafer privileges than those offered by any Y. M. C. A.

THE SOCIALIST DOES NOT BELIEVE THAT IT IS NECESSARY TO FIRST TURN THE "BOYHOOD'S PROM-ISE" INTO "MANHOOD'S PROFIT" AND THEN RECEIVE A PORTION OF THAT PROFIT BACK IN THE FORM OF CHARITY. THE SOCIALIST WOULD HAVE THE BOY KEEP THAT PROMISE AND PROFIT AND ENJOY IT HIM-SELF AND LET THE FELLOW THAT NOW RECEIVES A PROFIT GO TO WORK AND DO THE SAME.

Today this sort of talk is seldom met with. The first lesson of the Socialist primer has been painfully learned, and the very same men who were so strongly opposed to "politics in the unions" are now declaring that only through "political action" can the unions
