'BIG STICK' TO CAUSE A WAR WITH CASTRO?

Action of United States In Withdrawing Diplomats Held Deeply Significant

Washington, June 25.—President Roosevelt is preparing to swing the big stick on the head of President Castro in a manner which may cause war between the United States and Venezuela. The withdrawal of Jacob Slesper, the American charge d'affaires in Venezuela, is held to be deeply significant.

WILL FORCE ACTION

It will then be up to congress to go into the Venezuelan matter whether it finds it convenient or not, for the president will then have forcible means at his command of showing the undesirability of returning the diplomatic and consular officers to their various posts.

CAUSE OF THE TROUBLE

And Still They Suffer. Notwithstanding this fact, the people suffer in the hot weather. The reason for their suffering, perhaps, is that one bit of advice that they cannot follow, and that is WORRY.

Worry is a curse peculiar to working-men and is caused principally by lack of money.

FOR PARTY AND PRESS

There are two great forces used by the Socialists in their work. First and foremost, there is the party organization; second to that, but in the work of propaganda of equal importance, is the Socialist press.

The national organization cannot grant money directly to any Socialist paper. Yet, every one recognizes that in the midst of a campaign a large portion of the work must be done by the Socialist press.

At the present time the need for money in both party organization and press is most urgent. Never was the interest in Socialism so great as at this moment. The possibilities of accomplishments for the Socialist party during the coming months are limited by only one thing, and that is the willingness of the Socialists to work.

The growth of Socialism depends directly upon the number of persons who can be reached by this propaganda.
