

The funeral of O. Jorgenson, one of the oldest Socialists in Illinois, was held at Peotone yesterday. It was a real Socialist funeral. According to the wishes of the deceased a few pussages from "The Age of Reason." by Thomas Paine, were read by J. O. Bentall, who also gave a brief summary of the high ideals held by this ploneer Socialist and his passionate devotion to the emancipating principles of Socialism. The pail bearers wore red flags pinned to their coats with the inturnational Socialist party button. This emblem of universal brotherhood was placed on the casket at the close of the simple service.

The people who came to the funeral stood aghast at the absence of form and ceremony. Only a few realized that a deeper and truer religious and humanitarian spirit pervaded the whole service than is the case where ecclesiasticsm holds sway.

For many years Jorgenson was the only Socialist in Peotone. From the time the first copy of "The Coming Nation," now "The Appeal to Reason," was published he has never falled to read and distribute the paper among his neighbors. He lived with a daily message in his life and on his lips in favor of the suslaved and the oppressed. He knew for some time that he must soon die and said: "I don't mind to die—that's all right—but I would like to live till after election to see how many votes Debs gets. I want to know how far along we are on the way to freedom."

"Jan Pouren, a Russian refugee, is confined in the Tombs since last January, pending the outcome of extradition proceedings instituted by the Russian government. This is a test case involving the most important issue of the right of political asylum in our country. The Pouren Defense Conference, organized for the maintenance of that right, is conducting a vigorous campaign all over the country. An ever increasing number of large jublic meetings spread the agitation.

"Many thousands of petition blanks are being circulated for signatures. Hundreds of organizations are passing trong resolutions of protest and forwarding them to the president and to the department of state at Washington. The press is beginning to take up the case for discussion to the tent.

Dr. G. M. Price Tells of Significant Things at the Tuberculosis Congress

The following account of the tuber-culosis congress at Washington was written by Dr. G. M. Price, a Socialist, for the New York Cati.

The International Congress on Tuber-culosis is of paramount interest to the working men. A large number of dele-gates from foreign countries are pres-ent, as well as representatives of med-ical, social and philanthropic bodies from various parts of the United States,

The exhibits are very interesting, especially those of New York and Massachusetts. They show the baneful influences of various industries, kinds of dust, the influence of insanitary housing, congestion of population, and the usual evils of the present capitalistic system. It is of interest to note that in all the work of the congress, in all the many hundreds of various scientific papers that have been read and are yet to be read, very little

A most eloquent and impassioned as well as scientific, paper read yesterday by Dr. Frederic L. Hoffman, statistician of the Frudential Insurance company of Newark, gave the results of an investigation of 20,000 cases, proving that tuberculosis is an industrial disease, due to insanitary conditions in factories and workshops: conditions for factories and workshops; conditions for which employers are responsible, and which are due to the greed and inhumanity of the property owners' callous neglect of ventilation and other means of prevention. There is, he said, an annual loss of some 77,000 lives of wage workers in the United States due to tuberculosis contracted needleasty. Dr. Hoffman positively stated that as a result of his investigations he had concluded that adverse industrial conditions are responsible for the prevalence of tuberculosis. It cannot be prevented unless the causes are removed.

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ORGANIZATION OF LABOR

The organization of labor is the universal vital problem of all ages. It is old as civilization, and it is the sphinx riddle of social organization.

It is a problem that has never yet been solved, and for thatreason more than any other the societies of the past have ended in ruin and chaos Do not think I mean trade union organization. Trade unions are merely

temporary militant brotherhoods fighting to stave off human slavery. The true organization of labor comprehends every purpose of civilized

We live together in order that we may provide food, clothing, shelter, and the other necessaries of life for each and all of us. Society today is, as all societies of the past have been, an attempt to organize labor ou some permanent and peaceful basis.

The priests of Egypt triedto organize labor and failed. The oligarchs of Greece and Rome tried to organize labor and failed. Slavery was an attempt to rganize labor. Berfdom was another attempt to organize labor.

Priests, kings, emperors, military dictators, all attempted to organize labor, and all failed.

The capitalism of today is the modern attempt to organize labor. The chief capitalists have been called captains of industry, because it was their purpose to regiment and organize labor.

For nearly a hundred years they have been engaged in this gigantic undertaking. Millions of toilers abandoned agriculture to flock into the industrial centers to work at the great machines and to produce the wealth of the world. They have asked in return some security in life, some assurance of constant emplcyment, a modest allowance of food and clothing, and such places as may serve

Yet again and again during the rule of the modern capitalist civilized society has been brought to a point of ruin. Men willing to labor have had factory gates closed against them. Millions of roving, starving idlers have had to beg for the necessaries of life. Famine has raged in the midst of plenty, and workingmen, women andchildren have Seen thrown from their very tenements to be-

come vagrants, or to be herded in the public jails and workhouses. Instead of organizing labor so that it could continuously and plentifully supply the wants of the world, industry have become a vertiable warfare. One band of labor has fought another band of labor yor the chance to work. Women

have fought with men, children with their parents, in the degrading and tragic struggle to get jobs. Civilized society has again and again been wellnigh torn and rent asunder by this inter-labor warfare. This sphinx riddle of the universe, this vital problem of all ages, this crying

need of labor organization, REMAINS UNSOLVED. Even the captains of industry wring their hands in despair. Their factories are idle, their capital unproductive, and their regiments of toil on the brink of

rain and madness At this moment the problem presses upon us with a grave and terrible

And yet who talks of this problem, or who offers a solution for this problem?

Does Mr. Bryan? Does Mr. Taft? Does Mr. Rouseveit? Does Mr. Hearst? Or any other great political leader offer the slightest excuse for a solution of this

Do the ordinary labor leaders offer a solution? Do the preachers, the nnipersity presidents, the leaders of thought and of intellect, offer any solution for YET IT MUST BE SOLVED. And if we cannot solve it this republic will

go the way of past civilizations. It will become exhausted and prostrate and lie

Was there ever such a problem as this, the more appealing, the more worthy of commanding all our energies, our intellects and our devotien?

To organize labor, to humanize society, to feed and clothe and shelter every man, woman and child, to guide these vital forces so that they may intelligently feed themselves; to bring together under common guidance the natural forces of the earth, the artificial forces of capital, and the human forces of labor—was there ever such a problem as this for the mind of man to dwell upon and so, ee?
