INSPECTOR DENOUNCED AS MENACE TO MINERS' LIVES; CHARGES MADE

Some Delegates to State Convention Will Take Case to Springfield

RECALL CHERRY HORROR Little Is Official Made Target of Grave Accusations by Unions

Peoria, Ill., Feb. 21.—Stedman is addressing the miners on "Laws Affecting Labor." Charges of neglect will be filed against Inspector Hudson.

Peoria, Ill., Feb. 21.—Part of the Illinois convention of the United Mine Workers, in session here, is to move on Springfield next week to give evidence against State Mine Inspector Thomas Little of the tenth inspection district, who has been charged with incompetency and willful neglect of duty.

Threatening to expose a political scandal in which the federation and "some of our own brothers" are engaged, President McDonald wielded the sword with effect in a denunciation of Walker's efforts to defeat his recommendation.

"What has the State Federation of Labor done for us?" he continued. "It takes our money every year, it's true; we give \$7,200 into the federation, but what are its benefits? We have hardly enough representation in that body to speak of under the present conditions of affiliation. The federation has given absolutely no assistance in matters of legislation which we have attempted to secure. I am convinced that for political reasons only do we pay this money into the federation, with little or no return. I am not willing to stand idly by and see the miners of this state pay out their money to keep some fellows from working. I don't propose to watch the federation of labor carry on their high handed business any longer, no matter what the interests of Delegate Walker or any others that are there may be."

Warning the convention that the time is coming when every cent in the treasury will be needed and pleading with them to keep in mind the possibility of a strike in the coal fields on April 1, officers of the United Mine Workers of Illinois were endeavoring at noon today to defeat a resolution providing for the payment of delegates' expenses to the state convention from the state treasury. Both President-elect Walker and Secretary Hayes in strong talks attempted to show the convention that such a measure would not only work an injustice to some of the locals, but that it would mean a depletion of the state treasury, which they intimated might be needed in the near future in case of threatened strike following refusal of the Illinois miners to meet the state operators except in interstate convention. At noon the question was still under debate and was held over for settlement until the afternoon session.

The original resolution provided that delegates be paid from the state fund, each to be allowed \$3.50 per day, \$1.50 for hotel and railway fare. The resolution was amended in the text of the resolution. An amendment introduced by Delegate Walker provided that where a local has 500 members the state pay the expenses of one delegate, membership over 500 of two delegates, and over 1,000 of three, was carried, as was another amendment that all paid officers of the state organization

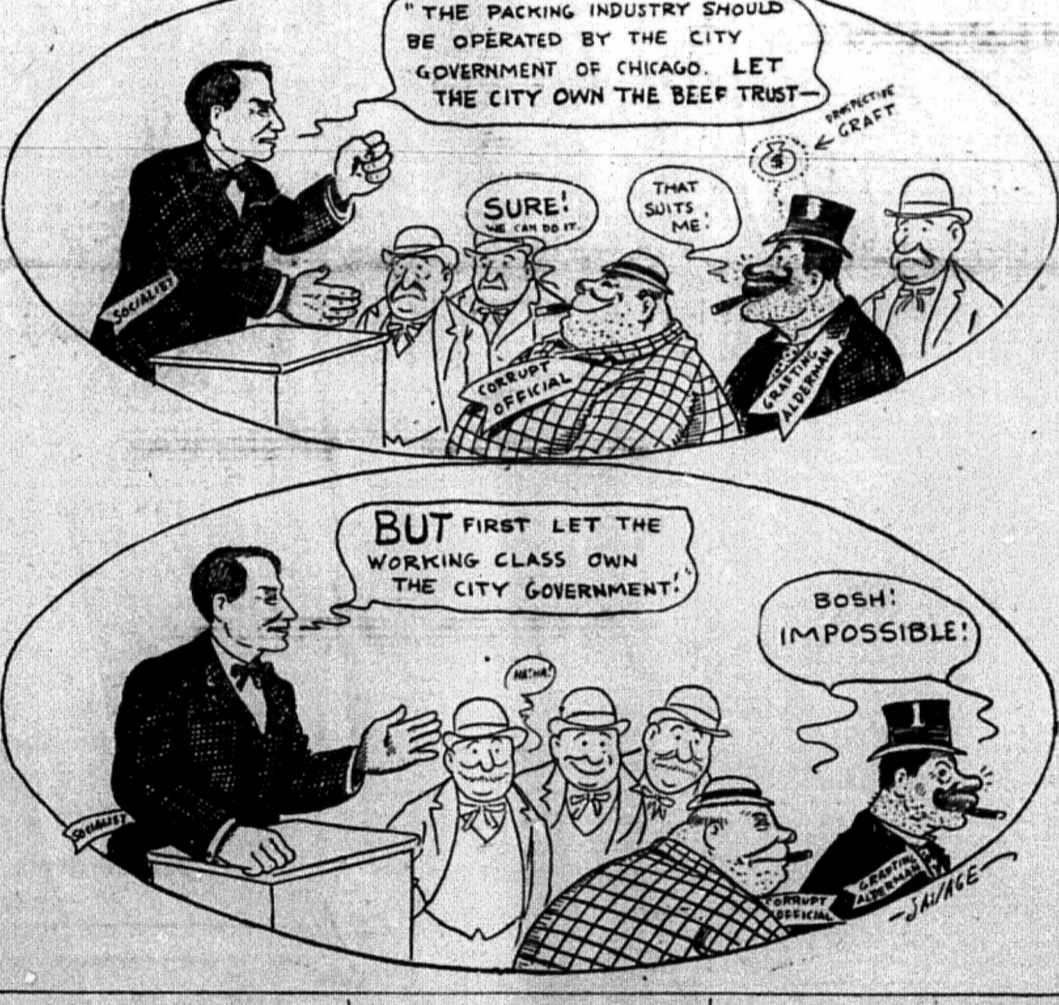

FAKE BILL ON INJECTION IS UP AT CAPITAL Moon Measure Has Same Old "Irreparable Injury" Clause Injunction Petitions Now Have

Washington, D. C., Feb. 21.—President Taft has a real "weedleum-pweedleum" injunction bill that he has introduced into the house of representatives by R. O. Moon, a Republican of Pennsylvania. It is said to embody the president's views exactly. Mr. Moon is chairman of the committee on revision of the laws and he recently conferred with Mr. Taft on anti-injunction legislation.

The bill says that injunctions cannot be issued without a hearing, and then goes on to say that they may be issued where "irreparable injury" is likely to ensue if it were not issued. It will not be very difficult for employers to show that they will be "irreparably injured" in case of a strike in presenting their case to a capitalist court.

Will Be Studied The phraseology of this particular bill is expected to be given careful scrutiny. It deals with a subject in which the president has been deeply interested and one which he has been anxious to see enacted into law, in careful form that would redress the wrongs of his party on the subject and at the same time constitute no drastic innovation in legal procedure.

The bill is a brief one, covering a single typewritten sheet. In effect, it provides that no injunction, whether interlocutory or permanent, shall be issued by any federal court or judge without previous notice and an opportunity to be heard on behalf of the parties enjoined.

But, it says further, if there appears a probability that "immediate and irreparable injury" is likely to ensue, the court may issue a temporary restraining order without notice. It is required that every such order shall define the injury, state why it is irreparable, and why granted without notice, and shall not extend more than seven days from the time the notice is served.

Moon Explains In explaining his bill Mr. Moon said: "There are radical differences between the Moon bill and any other bill on this important subject that has been heretofore introduced. My bill defines accurately the distinction between the various phases of the injunctive process. It divides injunctions proper into two comprehensive classes—interlocutory injunctions and final injunctions—and prohibits absolutely the issuance of such injunctions without notice, and without an opportunity of the defendant to be heard."

"It then provides for what is sometimes, in present practice, indefinitely termed a 'preliminary or temporary injunction,' but which is designated in the bill by its appropriate title of 'restraining orders.'"

"An important feature of the bill is that it accurately and definitely defines the two essential prerequisites of a restraining order without notice. First, by 'irreparable injury,' and second, the additional requirement that the giving of notice or the delay incident thereto would prevent the doing of the act sought to be restrained before notice could be given."
