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STATE POLICE NOTIOUS, COURT RECORDS SHOW

“Steel Trust vs. Free Press and Solidarity” Trial Shows Facts

New Castle, Pa., June 16.—The attorneys for the defense in the trial of the “Commonwealth of Pennsylvania,” meaning the United States Steel Corporation, against the publishers of “The Free Press and Solidarity,” on the charge of seditious libel, are today fighting every inch of the way, laying the blame for the disorders during the tin plate strike here squarely on the state constabulary, which, as at Bethlehem, committed outrages on defenseless citizens. The prosecution yesterday thought that it had made a coup when it secured a ruling from the judge allowing the reading of the cases which had arisen during the strike, and which had grown out of the alleged violence. The defense objected, but upon being overruled, entered a motion, which was granted, calling on the prosecutor to read the full record of the cases.

FLOOD SLAYS MANY HUNDREDS

Servia, Switzerland, Hungary Pay Toll to Swollen River; Many Periled

Belgrade, June 16.—(United Press Cable.) Dispatches received today from King Peter, who is personally conducting the relief work in the flooded Morava river valley, indicate that between 300 and 400 persons have lost their lives and that at least twenty towns have suffered heavy loss besides incalculable damage in the rural districts.

Swiss Menaced

Berne, June 16.—All the lowlands of western Switzerland are now submerged. The towns of Aillard, Zurich, Lucerne, Stans and Aarau are partially under water and a number of buildings have collapsed. A factory at Aillard collapsed killing eleven employees, mostly children.

Eighty Die in Flood

Buda Pest, June 16.—Eighty persons have been drowned in the overflowing of the Hungarian river Nera, according to dispatches received here.

LABOR AND CHURCH

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Action of United Presbyterians

The general assembly of the United Presbyterian church of North America, at its fifty-second annual meeting in Philadelphia, May 25 to June 2, 1910, took the following action, which was published in the church paper, "The United Presbyterian," Pittsburgh, Pa., June 9:

"The committee on industrial conditions recommended prompt action by the churches in social work. The Rev. Charles Stoetzel, superintendent of the department of church and labor of the Presbyterian church, addressed the commissioners, and eloquently seconded the recommendation of the committee, laying emphasis upon the aggressive campaign of the Socialists among laboring men.

Mr. Stoetzel's speech impressed the assembly, and the report of the committee on industrial conditions was unanimously adopted. Some of its most important utterances follow:

"We deplore and condemn the grave evils of overcapitalization and combination, whereby the cost of the necessities of life become greater for both laborer and consumer.

"We urge such an economical administration of the financial affairs of our churches that self-respecting workingmen shall find a church home possible to him.

"We recognize that present industrial conditions have created a wide-spread antagonism between the laboring classes and their employers, and that many laboring people believe that the sympathy of the churches is chiefly with the employing class, which belief has created among laboring people a serious antagonism to the church.

"The church of Christ must promote peace on earth, never espousing the cause of a class, but ever upholding the right.

Present industrial conditions open up a great field for Christian effort in securing for the laborer a more equitable share in the rewards of industry, safer and more sanitary conditions of employment, the protection of women and children from the hard conditions of industrial life, and in making clear to employers the Christian obligations of sympathy and brotherhood between employer and employed."
