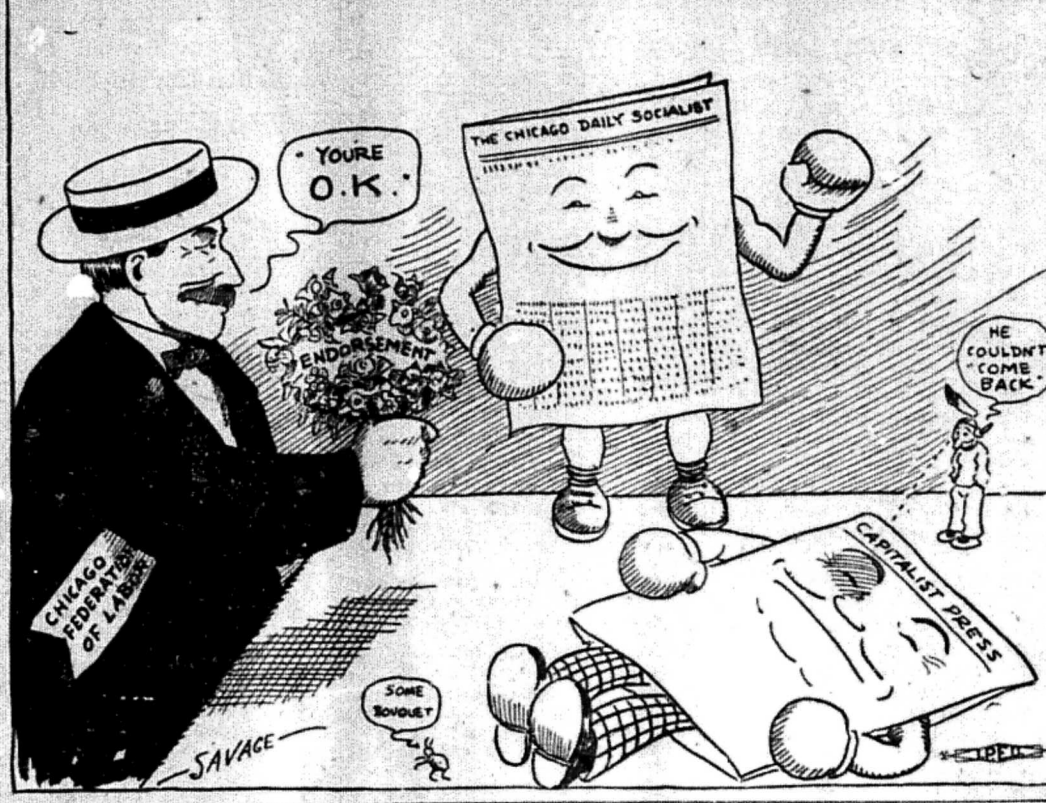

The city of Berlin is divided into six election districts. On June 14, the Socialists of each of these districts elected delegates to the Copenhagen congress.

Each district delegation, save the sixth, chose one representative and one alternate. The sixth because of its size was entitled to two.
