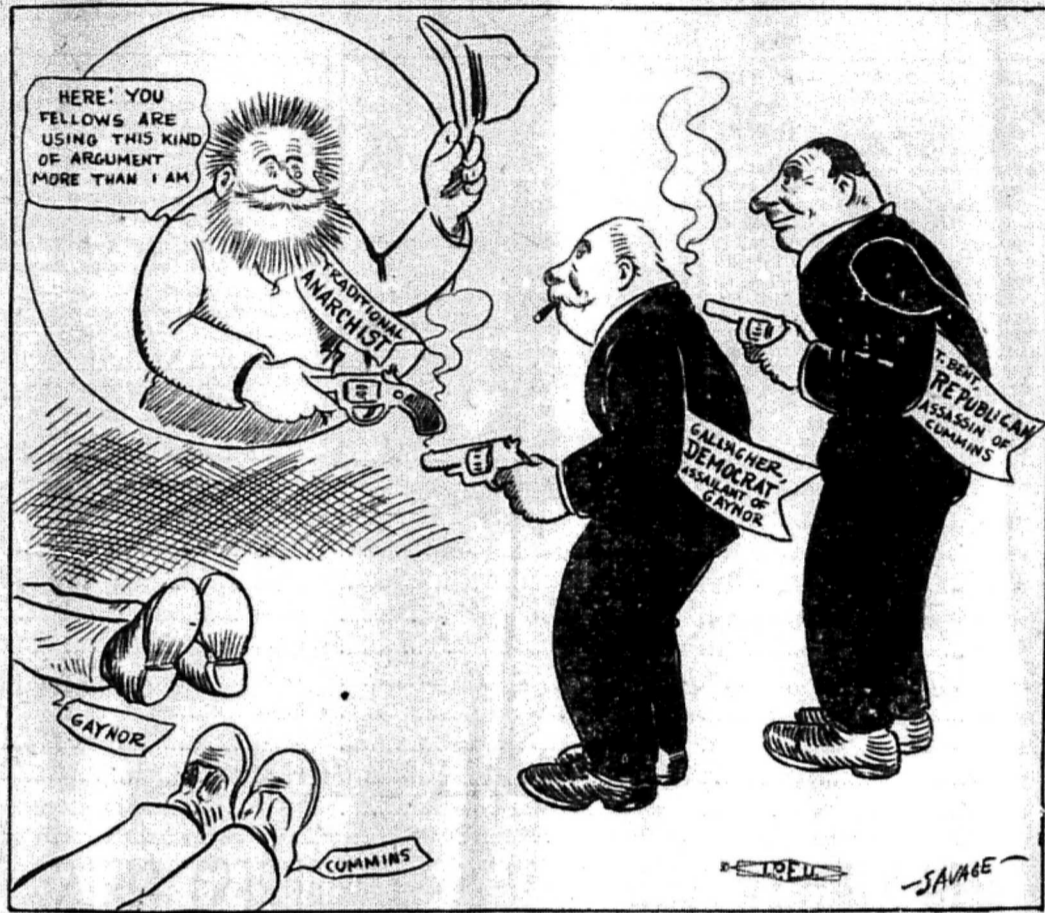
CHINESE TO MAKE THIRD DEMAND FOR AN ASSEMBLY

CONVENTION STANDS FOR ILLINOIS FIGHT

Delegates in Indianapolis Will Indorse Demands of the Striking Miners

Indianapolis, Ind., Aug. 18.—Mitchell declared in a heated debate that the executive action with reference to the settlement of the coal strike in Illinois was a violation of the principle that each district should have local self-government.

Indianapolis, Aug. 18.—The opinion prevails that a settlement of the Illinois question will be reached shortly by the miners' convention. A day of wrangling brought the prolonged discussion of the Illinois situation within sight of a close.

Great Enthusiasm Prevails

Tumultuous disorder broke out in the convention this morning when President Lewis attempted to speak from the chair in reply to Secretary McDonald of Illinois. Cries of "Put Hayes in the chair," "Hayes, Hayes, Hayes," "Let go of the gravel," came from both sides of the house.

Duncan Renews Charges

District Secretary Duncan McDonald renewed his charges that President Lewis had circulated slanderous statements about the Illinois official in violation of Section 10 of the U. M. W. of A. constitution.

Refer Question to Committee

Shortly before noon District President Walker asked that the whole Illinois situation be referred to the special committee of twenty-three and that the convention stand adjourned pending the committee's report.

Indianapolis, Ind., Aug. 18.—Mitchell declared in a heated debate that the executive action with reference to the settlement of the coal strike in Illinois was a violation of the principle that each district should have local self-government.

Former President Mitchell sprung a sensation by asking whether the international executive board had "ever, of its own motion, modified or amended a wage scale adopted by a district convention, or had ever made a wage scale for any district?"

President Lewis and Board Member Smith cited instances of action taken by the executive board during Mitchell's term of office, but none of the cases cited seemed to cover the point raised by Mitchell.

Compers Is Present

A diversion was created by the entrance of Samuel Compers, president of the American Federation of Labor, during the afternoon session.

President Compers said, in part: "I am not fully informed as to the matters at issue in your convention and would not feel justified in expressing any opinion thereon did I have one. It is for you, miners, to settle your own internal differences absolutely for yourselves."

Praises Convention

"I regret the newspaper stories as to scenes of disorder in this convention. No body of twelve hundred men, representing a constituency such as yours, and discussing weighty questions, could be found in which there was more decency or fairness."

Illinois Will Be Indorsed

It is almost certain that the convention will indorse the Illinois strike before adjourning.
