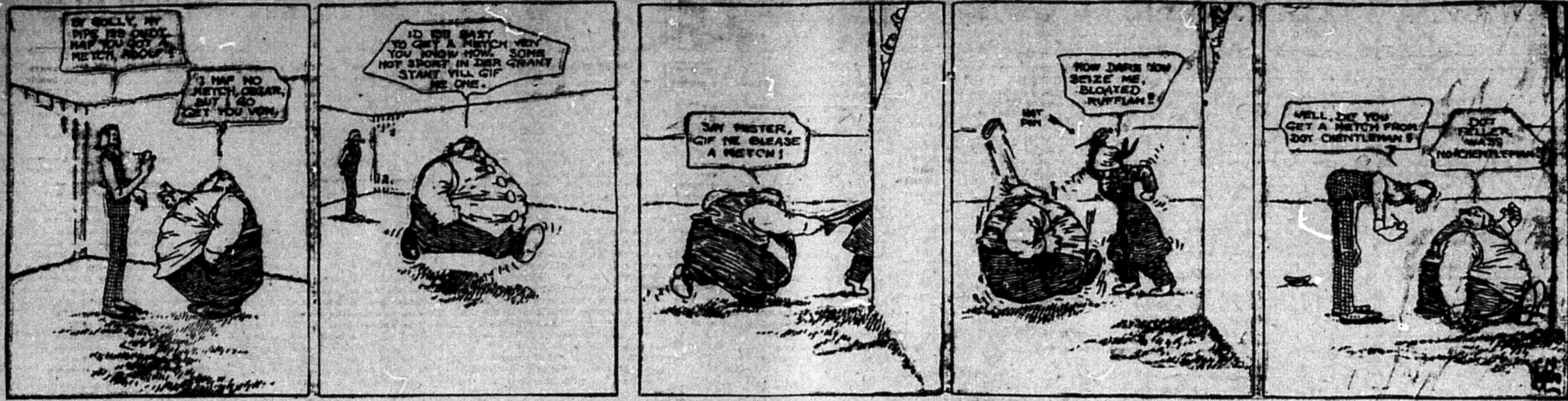

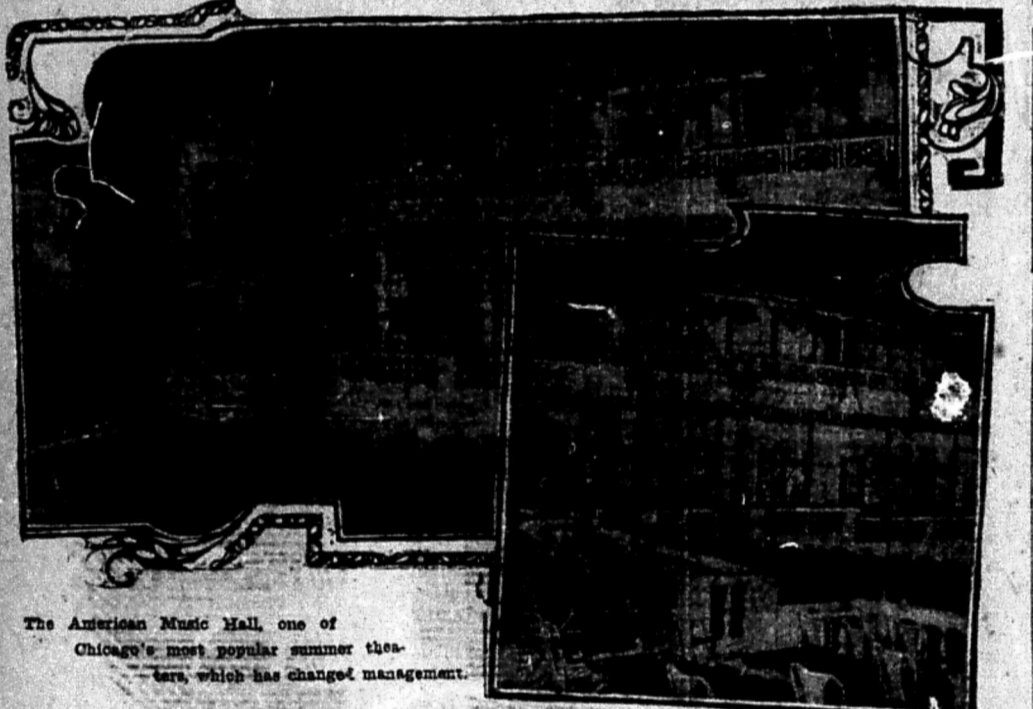

There Is a Reason Why the Associate Press Prints What It Does About Milwaukee

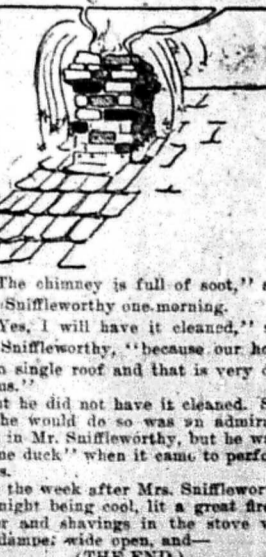
