Ogden, Utah, Oct. 16.—This city being the junction point of the Union Pacific and the Southern Pacific as well as a connecting point of these two Harriman lines with the Oregon Short Lines of the same railroad system gives it an important position in the present strike of the federated shompen.

Miners Strike Against I. C.

New Orleans, La., Oct. 16.—Five hundred men employed in the Illinois Central mines at Deverson, La., struck partly out of sympathy with the shopmen already out because of their own grievances which the company refused to redress.
