

FORCE ALL UNFAIR MEN FROM JURY

This Results in War on Notoriously Prejudiced McNamara Judge.

By United Press. Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 29.—Determined to force jurors Frampton and Winter from the box without being compelled to waste peremptory challenges, the defense in the McNamara trial renewed its efforts when court reconvened today to compel Judge Bordwell to recognize scruples against inflicting the death penalty on circumstantial evidence.

Would Impeach Venetian
Attorney Darrow and associates held a conference before court opened and decided that if Bordwell refused to entertain such a challenge they would later try to impeach both men.

They have witnesses who will swear that both frequently expressed the opinion that the defendant was guilty.

The real reason the state is willing to accept both men has become known. District Attorney Fredericks and his associates realize that, in the present trial, they are only laying the foundation for the trial of John J. McNamara. Because of the latter's prominent position in the labor world and from the fact that prominent labor men are on record as declaring John McNamara innocent, it is alleged that his conviction is extremely desired by the interests which are said to be defraying the enormous expenses of the Burns Detective Agency in working up the evidence in this case.

See Death Blow
It is considered certain by the Merchants and Manufacturers Association here and by the National Association of Manufacturers, who for years has been fighting the American Federation of Labor, that the conviction of John J. McNamara would be almost a death blow, because of the openly expressed confidence in him by all of the big labor officials of the country.

So it is understood that word has been passed to Fredericks that conviction of James B. McNamara must be secured at any cost.

Therefore Fredericks is satisfied to accept jurors who are willing to believe the state's case, even though they would, in finding James McNamara guilty, recommend only that life imprisonment and not death be the penalty.

The California law provides that where a jury convicts of first degree murder it can fix the penalty at life imprisonment. If it does not, then the court must sentence the convicted person to be hanged.

Attorneys at Odds
Feeling between the attorneys in the case is intense and Attorney Darrow's open criticism of Judge Bordwell, quoting the answers given during the interrogation by jurors Winter and Frampton as proof, greatly displeased Judge Bordwell and Fredericks.

The latter declared Darrow's criticism entirely uncalled for and added that an action of Darrow in separating a certain small portion of the record and quoting it as "sharp practice," in a statement, Fredericks said the entire record absolutely proved that both men were equally minded and impartial and could be depended on to give both sides a square deal. He insisted that the code only provides for a "fair not a safe jury."

May Rite for Contempt
It is rumored that Bordwell, exercised over Darrow's action, is considering the advisability of citing him for contempt and forcing him to explain.

The court, however, refuses to comment in any case outside the courtroom, intimating that anything he may do will be done in the courtroom and nowhere else.

Both sides are admittedly concerned over the Indianapolis proceedings. Fredericks is extremely confident and his intimates have already been assured that the evidence there will be brought here in plenty of time for use.

Darrow says he doesn't care and professes to wonder whether, if the state had the extremely strong case Detective Burns has been boasting of, it is as anxious for all of this outside matter and is fighting so bitterly to compel the defendant to accept opinionated jurors as final arbiters.

SOCIALISTS IN BELGIUM SCORE GREAT VICTORY

Belgian Socialists, combining with the Liberals in the municipal election just held, have administered a crushing defeat to the clerical party.

The city of Brussels was carried by the Socialist-Liberal candidates by a vote of 25,277 against 13,153. M. Schollaert, the father of the clerical school boys was overwhelmingly defeated at Louvain.

In Antwerp the Socialist-Liberal cartel received 24,774 votes and the clerical ticket 24,670. Among the other cities in which the Socialists were victorious are Liege, Namur, Charleroi, Mons, Antwerp, Bruges, Ghent, Veeriers and Louvain.

Le Peuple, the organ of the Belgian Socialists, in reviewing the list of the clerical leaders retired by this election, says that it is a veritable ocean.

The fight for universal suffrage at the age of 21 is occupying the attention of the Belgian Socialists. It is upon this ground that they combined with the Liberals to defeat the clerical party.

WAGE INCREASE DENIED
The packing house teamsters roundly denounced the award of the arbitration committee which decided that the wages of the teamsters will not be increased and that the wage scale which has been in effect for the last eight years will be the wage scale for the next two years.

CATHOLICS DON'T TAKE POSITION ON SOCIALISM

Joshua Wanhope Draws Statement from Bishop; Replies to 'Charges.'

New York, Oct. 29.—Joshua Wanhope, associate editor of the New York Call, addressed 1,000 persons late Wednesday night in the City Hall at Syracuse, N. Y., in reply to the charges of the Syracuse labor politicians that he had turned the recent McNamara protest meeting in that city into a propaganda meeting, and had been guilty of blasphemy and sacrilege and atheism in making a disrespectful allusion to Noah's ark and in referring to a proposed revival movement as being financed by J. Pierpont Morgan.

Catholic Bishop Replies
The major portion of the audience was made up of union men, and when Wanhope finished his address he was cheered to the echo.

The Roman Catholic bishop of the diocese, Bishop Ludden, was asked to be present and to participate in the discussion. The bishop declined the invitation, stating that illness prevented.

Bishop Ludden gave out a statement, however, which read:
"Officially the Catholic church has taken no stand for or against Socialism, nor will it. I am, however, in no position to talk on the subject, as I know nothing about Socialism."

"I do not know what the end is that the Socialists desire. The Socialists must work out their own salvation. The church takes no cognizance of it nor does it take a stand in the matter any more than it does on politics or any social movement."

Wanhope Scores Fakers
Wanhope declared he had no intention of offending the religiously inclined, and scored labor politicians.

HAINES GIVES INTERESTING LECTURE ON ASTRONOMY

Another I. C. Bluff
"If the city authorities at Fulton, Ky., have actually called in militia, as the morning papers say, it's merely another example of the game of bluff which the Illinois Central has been putting up since the beginning of the strike," said Kline.

"I have no official information that any troops were called in, but I do know that the men there have been as peaceful as any others along the line, and that means that they haven't done a single thing which would warrant the officers in calling in state militia."

"Why, Fulton is such a small place anyway that not more than 40 men at most were ever employed in the shops there, and it would be a sorry police force which couldn't handle 40 peaceable men."

"No, it's simply another instance of the Illinois Central taking advantage of the fact that it owns, body and soul, the officials of many of the towns along the line in order to intimidate the strikers by calling for state militia and injuring the cause of the strikers among the public generally by creating the impression that the shopmen are violent and that it requires an army to keep them in check."

Talks to Ministers
By invitation of the Methodist ministers of the city J. W. Kline addressed the Methodist Ministerial association this morning at 10:45 o'clock to give a correct account of the strike from the time the shopmen first asked for a recognition of the system federation.

The ministers, realizing that the capitalist newspapers are giving only one side of the question and badly falsifying even that one side, asked Kline to give a detailed account of the fight. Kline has announced he is willing to speak at any time, before any body of men, in order to correct the false impression which the newspapers, at the crack of the company's lash, have sought to create.

20,000 MORE MEN TO JOIN RAIL STRIKE

War of Shopmen to Spread, Is Belief of President Kline.

"I wouldn't be surprised to hear of the shopmen going out on strike on the Texas Pacific and other Pacifics in a short time," said J. W. Kline, president of the International Brotherhood of Blacksmiths and Helpers, today.

"It begins to look now as if the strike would spread to many other roads on which there seemed to be no cause for trouble when the shopmen began their fight against the Illinois Central and Southern and Union Pacifics."

Strike Inevitable
"The shopmen of the Texas Pacific issued an ultimatum to the president of the road, demanding a recognition of their system federation some time ago, and when they were refused I understand they went before the directors and were by them, also, refused."

"Hence a strike on the Texas Pacific is inevitable unless the company backs down in the next few days, because it's a certainty that our men will strike rather than give up the idea of a system federation."

It seems today that nothing can prevent the strike from spreading to the Rock Island and other roads west of Chicago, making a complete tie-up of several of the most important roads of the country.

Reject Wage Scale
It is known that the Rock Island system federation has rejected, by an overwhelming majority, the best wage scale the company would offer, and that a strike within the next two weeks is practically certain.

The result of the referendum vote will not be made public until the officials of the different crafts have had a conference, but all admit that the men defeated the company's proposal.

After the vote has been ascertained, the officials will seek another conference with the company. In case they can not get the conference or the company refuses to make a better wage offer the officials will order a referendum vote on the question whether the men wish to submit or go out on strike to enforce their demands. It is universally conceded that the men will vote in favor of a strike unless the company backs down.

In case a strike is called on the Rock Island and Texas Pacific, between 15,000 and 20,000 men will be involved in addition to the more than 35,000 already on strike.

NATIONAL MINE SAFETY MEET IS OPENED AT PITTSBURGH
Pittsburgh, Pa., Oct. 30.—Thousands of expert mining engineers, representatives of mine and mining interests, and spectators attended the opening of the National Mine Safety and First Aid demonstration here today. The assembly is said to be the first of its kind ever held in the world and there is wide interest direct.

The exhibition consist of experiments as to the cause of explosions in mines, the force and effects of explosions caused by fine coal dust, gases, blown out shot and other things, the means used by rescuers in going to the aid of miners following accidents in mines and the "first aid" administered to the men after being brought to the surface.

PRES. TAFT HAS BUSY DAY; HE LEAVES TONIGHT

President Taft filled a less strenuous day here today than the two preceding ones. He will leave Chicago tonight at 5:30 p. m. for Pittsburgh over the Pennsylvania railroad.

At 9:30 this morning, Taft and his party, having finished breakfast, entered automobiles and were driven to the stockyards, where Taft spoke at the national dairy show.

An hour later he had the corner stone of the Hamilton Club building, Dearborn street near Madison. The President then retired to the La Salle hotel, where he dined as the guest of the Hamilton Club.

Incidentally the President found time today to issue the annual Thanksgiving Day proclamation, setting aside Thursday, November 30, as a day of "thanksgiving and prayer."

Taft quibbled much about "peace" yesterday. He did not neglect his religious duties, either, for he went to church. Speaking at Orchestra hall, Taft spoke of disarmament and treaties. He advocated the speedy establishment of a high joint peace tribunal and condemned members of Congress who opposed the treaties with Great Britain and France.

The President declared with emphasis that the United States should take the initiative in declaring for world-wide peace and disarmament.

MAKE DESPERATE ATTACK ON ITALIANS IN TRIPOLI
By United Press. Constantinople, Oct. 29.—In a desperate attack upon the Italian cordon surrounding Tripoli Saturday the Turks drove the former into the city in disorder, according to a dispatch to the newspapers Sabah today.

The masses said 300 Italians were killed and 700 wounded. They are said to be penned in the city now, and in imminent danger of annihilation.

CALLS IT "FROST"

St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 30.—Characterizing President Taft's coming around the circle as a "frost" and a "vain attempt to gain political prestige," Senator Jeff Davis of Arkansas, who, with his bride, is stopping here on their honeymoon, today asserted that the chief executive's long jaunt had entirely failed in its purpose, and that Taft would return to Washington less liked generally than he was before he started.

BRITISHERS IN SQUABBLE OVER WORKERS' BILL

London, Oct. 29.—When Parliament opened last week a chaotic condition reigned in the ranks of laborites.

This condition was caused by Lloyd-George's workmen's insurance bill, which the capitalist members contended will take \$85,000,000 annually from the rich and give the money to the poor.

It is felt in the ranks of the workingmen that George's bill is simply a sop thrown at them for political reasons, the paramount one of which is to increase the political prestige of Lloyd-George.

Many Charges in Bill

The insurance bill has been changed many times. Each time to suit some self-seeking interest. Sixteen clauses of the bill have been amended so that there are hardly three lines of the original bill unaltered.

Churchill Loses Prestige

Another change is that of Winston Churchill from the commonsense to the navy. As secretary, Churchill was obliged, at the instance of the government, to call out the troops against the strikers in the recent railway strike. This action created a strong feeling against Churchill, and lost for him the support of the workingmen.

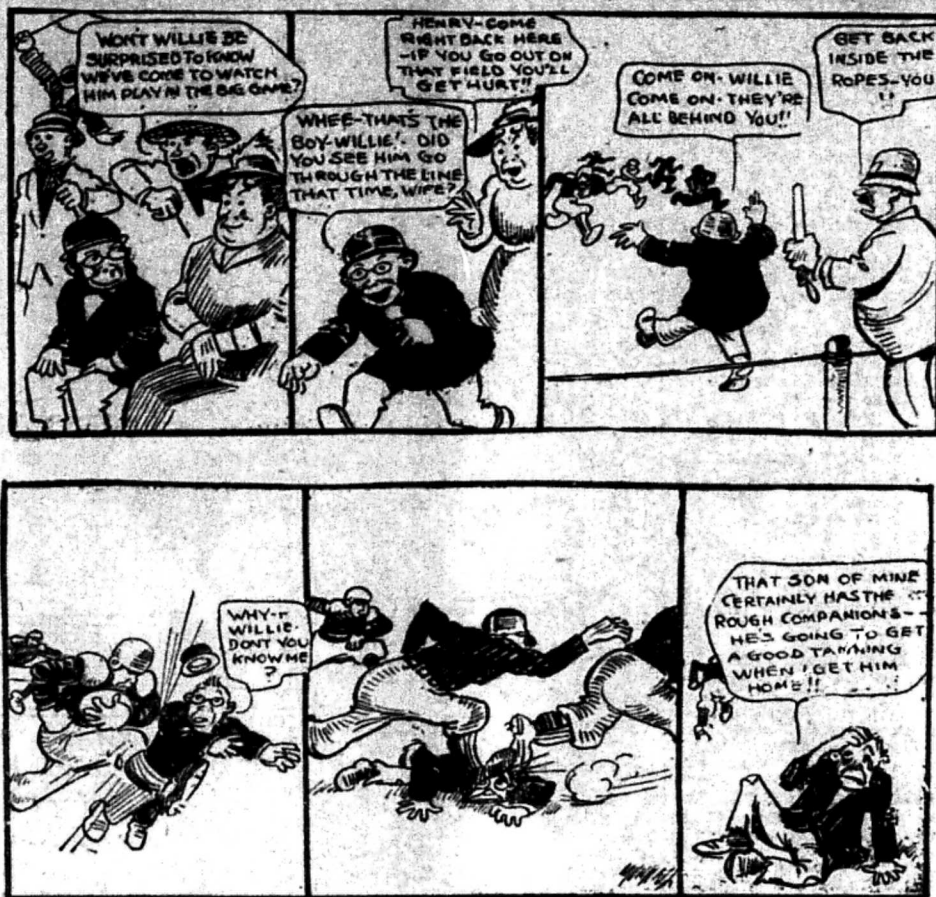
