As a survey of the present status of the Socialist party, its principles, tactical position, organization, propaganda and literature, Miss Hughan's book may be commended to the consideration of both the friends and foes of Socialism.

BUSINESS: THE HEART OF THE NATION, by Charles Edward Russell. Same publishers. Cloth, \$1.50 net.

Any book by Charles Edward Russell commands attention because of his eminent position as a writer and his forceful use of the English language.

In "Business: The Heart of the Nation," Russell has given a powerful and searching analysis of the empire of business, showing it as a determining factor in the life and institutions of the world today.

Viewing business with its blessings and its curses in the nature of development of economic laws, the author not much amusement from the attempt of quacks to apply Dr. Sherman's celebrated anti-rust specific or the view of these efforts to curb business is, in Russell's hands, a history of stupid statesmanship.

Russell's Socialist conclusions are, of course, well known. The book is one of the most powerful arguments it has been our pleasure to read.
