

CHINA AND THE MILLENNIUM

If the press dispatches are to be believed, China is to make an immediate stride in economic reform which will at once place her

at the head of the progressive nations of the world.

Dr. Sun Yat Sen, a Chinese reformer, who has taken an imporant part in the political revolution that has dethroned the Manchu lynasty, it is stated, announces himself as about to commence "the greatest social revolution in the world's history." He proclaims nself an ardent follower of Henry George and declares that the ingle Tax system will be at once adopted. George's ideas, he asserts, are practicable in China, though not in Europe or the United States,

Out of the sea rises a perpendicu-larly sharp high rock. Upon and advantage of us Socialists in propounding a definite "plan" for future society. The Single Tax philosophy takes little account of historical and economic evolution. It is quite simple. All that is needed is to discover the "plan" and then apply it. This seems to be Sun Yat Sen's idea. The plan apparently does not have to be submitted to the people of China, but that is of no moment, after over its victim with its wings spread out. all, for if it were they would at once see that it was so good a thing that they would instantly agree to its adoption. If Sun Yat Sen is correct in his belief that the capitalists of the United States and Europe will not permit the establishment of the Single Tax in those countries, then they are not going to per-mit it in China either. Sun Yat Sen is considerable of an individual, to be sure, but he isn't quite big enough to constitute the deus ex machina of "the greatest revolution in the world's history." There are forces in Chinese society that take little account of any individual, however apparently great, and these forces have not originated in Chinese ciety at present, but are thrust into it from outside; they are, in

short, the forces of world capitalism.

The best that Dr. Sun Yat Sen can do is to help in the struggle against them, and into that position he will be forced by them sooner or later. But he is not going to engineer the "greatest revo-lution in the history of the world," whether for Single Tax or Socialism or anything else, without taking them into account. Revolutions are not made by individuals, never were, and never will be The heathen Chinee may be "peculiar" in many ways, but in this par-ticular respect he isn't different from any one else.

We Socialists have been told millions of times that if we would

only work out some definite "plan" of society we would receive more consideration and our movement progress so much faster when everybody knew exactly every detail of what we proposed to do. Our Single Tax friends have such a "plan" and can, and do, recite it in great detail, but we notice that it hasn't helped them to any appreciable extent. Without any insistence on a "plan," we have throughout the world a thousand active Socialists for one apostle of Single Tax.

And Dr. Sun Yat Sen is bound to make the discovery that while a plan may be ultimately indispensable, it is not the first in dispensable. Power to make the change takes precedence of the change itself, and the necessity of acquiring power connotes class conflict at the very start. Dr. Sun Yat Sen, without realizing it, is going headlong into the great world-wide class struggle, and Russia. Types like a Konopitannikova, once arrived there, will perforce have to lay aside his "plans" tem-
