Yes; but what of the race, by protecting the female from the demoralizing and injurious hardships of the male and similar capitalist "moral platitudes." And "the new industries" where it is in the keeping of parasitic, childless, society women? of unmarried, police protection?

Enlargement of the textile industry during February, according to figures compiled by the Textile World Journal is of ever larger proportions than that announced for the first month of the year. New projects include four new cotton mills, six new woolen and worsted plants, twenty new knitting mills, seven new silk enterprises and six new miscellaneous mills. Of greater significance than the announced new additions to the industry is the large number of construction enlargements proposed and started by established concerns; this activity is not confined to any particular division of the industry. Projects of large cotton, woolen, and silk mills like those particularly noticeable in the silk branch. It is characterized not so much by increases of immense proportions as by the large number of small ones made by smaller mills. A recapitulation of figures for the first two months of the year shows a total of new enterprises announced comprised: Cotton, woollen, seven; silk, nine; knitting, twenty-three; wool, thirteen; miscellaneous, ten.

Even silk, worsted and dye mills in the New England States are on strike. In the South, workers are scabbing on the weavers. "Prosperity" never comes to those who are scabbing on those who are working.

For more wages, industrial action is the only way.

The March Bulletin of the New York State Industrial Commission contains the following:

The Glass Workers Of Coming

If any one doubts that there is a hell, let him just drop into Corning, New York, and he will be convinced once and for all, that there is such a hell as the religious fanatic pictures to us.

The Corning glass works are some of the largest in America, about three thousand workers are employed there, divided into two shifts, day and night. The unsanitary condition of the shops cannot be described in a single day in the month which there are a thousand and one varieties of smells. The unsafety and disregard for the workers' life and health, are the limit. Pieces of red hot glass by around the shop all day long, smelted as usual. Every worker's face or hands are burned, which causes no surprise among the workers, but is looked upon as a matter of course.

The speed of the workers is much greater than the machines in the factory. They have ten hours a day. If the worker wishes to go to the toilet he is discharged to start with that right. The hammering of the machine, the sighing and groaning of the human being, the speed of the machines and of the workers, makes the whole place seem like a mad-house.

The majority of the workers are sick, or nearly so; their faces resemble those of consumptives, in short they look like the workers of the world. They cannot walk straight from overwork. When the sound of the whistle is heard, there are many sounds of relief coming from the mouths of overworked slaves, who seem thrilled at the thought of several hours of rest, after a long, long day of tireless labor.

The workers who should ask for \$18 a week are getting \$12.50 to \$14.50 a week, that is if he is lucky to get his machine in good shape, otherwise he makes less.

In the shops where glass is cut, the worker who works more than two years and maintains his glass, gets incapacitated, and should be get sick and not able to keep up the speed, he is discharged to start with. The odor and heat in the shops makes them think an unlimited quantity of water.

"The boss has a fine system to get the workers up. As there is a great demand for workers, all three of the factories work. When a worker is discharged can no longer stand the rotten conditions, he quits, thinking he will find them better in one of the other factories; but when he applies for a job, finds that the man who is in charge of the job has deserted. He is of every worker, and if it is found that he has quit, he is refused employment. In this way the workers are kept in constant terror and they are asked for a raise in wages. Furthermore, the losses of the glass factories make their workers believe that they should ask for a raise in wages and more rest, the boss will have to shut down his factory. To quote some of these multiplexes: "The boss has enough money with which to live, without this factory, but he is very kind and allows slaves to make a starvation living, while the boss is making his small profit."

Many of the workers walked to lunch. However, the writer was welcomed with the Big Lion staff. The majority of the workers are Swedish, but they are all in a state of protest in behalf of our murdered fellow worker, Joe Hill. They also told the writer that they wouldn't join that kind of a union. But when the writer explained that the Big Union, they listened with great interest.

If any fellow worker wishes to do something for industrial unionism, he should drop in at Corning, New York, and let the boss see what the workers can do.

It is really too bad that we will be unable henceforth to obtain any copy of the Virginia H. G. They are all of the time telling us work, and if we will be peaceable and industrious we will be all O. K. and no employer will care to hire us. Do you see the point? They hope and prepare for us on the military field, thinking that we will be foolish enough to oppose them there. Our move is to push preparedness of workers to take the work. Instead of a military organization, we will have a militant labor organization, and instead of the sword we will use sabotage.

Bradstreet's for March 11 says: "Labor is in scant supply; jobs are more numerous than seekers, wages are high, and the companies find it more profitable to placate their employees than to resist their demands." Wages have been too long too low, let's raise them a few notches so that we need the money, but just to see how the bosses act when he has to talk turkey.

It matters not what action Congress takes or fails to take, the business men of the U. S. will have preparedness in a military way whether or no. During the coming summer there will be scores of "camps of instruction for business men" while the workers are in the barren fields and the business men want a vacation anyhow. These steps are being taken by the army officers at a direct part of the Government program. An advertisement recently appeared in a Spokane paper asking business men to state where they could attend a camp in the summer of 1916, and let the commanding officer of Fort George Wright know as soon as possible. No patriots asked for, only the noble business men.

The high schools of Chicago have instituted military training for the pupils, and many other schools are considering plans for military training. Throughout the United States

there are less than one pupil in a thousand who complete high school, so there is but little danger that the sons of the workers will have much of this beautiful training, as they are compelled to go to work too young. And even if they are caught they will be so hedged about with patriotism that they have but little chance to see the workers' viewpoint of life.

They're off! The stage has been properly set, and the grand stand play is now under way. After five years of fighting in Mexico by hundreds of factions and by tens of U. S. by thousands of the ill-fated press "we" are finally going to receive "we" are finally going to receive Mexico. And oh, how good it will be for having Mexico, which made slaves in the machines instead of to the land.

The president has very diplomatically said that the move is "entirely for the benefit of the Mexicans in Mexico." The day probably says that "whether the movement will mean intervention is to depend on the attitude of the Mexicans." The moment the declaration of war, but anything will do a pretext, and at any time some Mexican may plan a rooky's face, and that of course will need to be stamped by exterminating Mexico City and confiscating the mines and gold. Preparations are being made to field an army of 30,000 Mexicans, of course for the good of Mexico. Stock Exchange went bounding upward, and there was general rejoicing. Every stock company, whether in Mexico or the world at large, is listed on all stock exchanges according to the ability of the company to appease some value out of the slaves who perform the labor. Most of the time for the past five years there have been grave doubts in the minds of the American investors as to whether the companies organized to exploit the peonies would be able to make good, and that has had a bad effect on the investors' standpoint.

There is no aid in any official position in the government who thinks for a moment that the U. S. will withdraw the soldiers from Mexico until a capitalist government is firmly seated in control of Mexico. Col. E. F. Glenn recently said in speech in New York: "Do you think Mexico is going to stand for it? Would you respect her if she did? I have made a study of the Mexican situation and I have figured that if we are going in there stabilize the government it will take five years at a minimum, and from 400,000 to 500,000 men to do it properly."

"Any one who thinks the army will be used for more humane purposes in Mexico than they have been using in Chicago, Ludlow, the Coeur D'Alenes, and a score of other places, will be sadly mistaken when the military censorship is finally broken through. Even will be, so long as it remains a capitalist institution—a means of control and of defeat the armed force control by meeting them on an equality, but must rise above them by organizing and controlling the industry, and they will then be subject to the will of the workers."

THE PREAMBLE

Of The Industrial Workers Of The World

The working class and the employing class have nothing in common. There can be no permanent peace between the two classes. The trade union of the working class has no other aim than to help the workers to organize to overthrow the capitalist class and to abolish the wage system.

Therefore, we hold that the interests of the workers are opposed to those of the capitalist class, and we declare our adherence to this principle: "The only interest of the workers is in the abolition of the wage system."

It is the history, however, of the working class to do away with capitalism. The class of the capitalist has no other aim than to help the workers to organize to overthrow the capitalist class and to abolish the wage system.

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
