

FOREST SLAVES AROUSE!

Loggers, Lumber-Jacks, Saw Mill Hands, Timber Men and Woodsmen This Will Interest You.

Whether you are a woodman in California, a logger of the Pacific Northwest, a lumberjack of Minnesota, a sawmill worker of the South, this leaflet will be of interest to you.

In the camps we work in the mud, rain and snow. We suffer from bad housing and bad food. Thousands of our fellow workers are injured and killed each year.

In the saw mills we work day after day, and year after year amid the deafening roar of machinery, always for a very small amount of money.

Some few men in the woods and mills receive high wages, but with improvement in machinery and efficiency in production the great army of low paid laborers is growing among the timber workers all over the world.

Picture in your mind the effect of minimum wage of \$3.00 per day, and an eight-hour day in the woods and mills. This would mean a higher standard of living and at the same time protect those who are now receiving the better wages.

Look at the conditions in the Company owned towns, with their Company owned stores, company owned streets, company owned houses, etc. Men with families get into debt, and naturally become slaves to the company and are unable to get away.

If one hundred men go out on strike it is easy to get 100 scabs to fill their places; but if 100,000 go out on strike, there are not enough scabs close to hand. If one hundred men go out on strike it is easy to get guards for the property, but if 100,000 go out on strike it would take many deputy sheriffs and militia men to guard the larger territory.

What we must do is to organize. How shall we organize? We shall we organize to trade unions like the International Shingle Weavers Union of America.

Or shall we organize into Industrial Unions and amalgamate all the workers of all industries into One Big Union, like the Industrial Workers of the World?

In order to carry out the work of education, the Industrial Workers of the World publish working class newspapers in nearly all languages. There are now printed newspapers in English, Swedish, Hungarian, Norwegian, Danish, Lithuanian, Finnish, Italian, Spanish, Yiddish, Chinese, and others to name.

To spread the doctrine that "an injury to one is an injury to all."

Lohrville, Wisconsin, Result In Good I.W.W. Growth and Progress.

The Quarry Workers' Industrial Union No. 44 of the I. W. W. have to report that their membership is increasing rapidly. Recently they had something like four hundred members at the present writing.

On Sunday, June 17, at Lohrville, Wis., a few weeks ago seem to have given it up as a bad job, as the strikers are getting on their feet, and something more up to date, and so the increase membership of No. 364.

On the 27th and 28th of May, Fellow Worker Flynn held two very successful meetings in Lohrville and Red Granite, the attendance at each meeting was more than a thousand.

After the meeting quite a few members were invited up. It is no doubt that the result of her meetings will mean the adding of a hundred or more members to the ranks of the quarry workers local 364.

Before court convened we determined on demanding a collective trial, and ordering the strikers to a trial, in order to save the fellow worker from a sapping, which would have been the result.
