It can be readily seen that the measures of this state are running wild in order to suppress ONE BIG UNION. That is the proposition. The Story of Fellow Worker Patterson.
Fellow Worker John Patterson was arrested in Everett on the 9th of November. He was held for several days. During all this time he has been in the Everett County Jail with the 74 I. W. W. men who were charged with the murder of Deputy Sheriff Beard, on November 6th, 1916. Patterson was in the restaurant on November 10th. Fellow Worker Patterson was in the restaurant at that moment in charge. The couple of men inside the hall and followed them into and asked them.

They showed him their official stars and told him to get out of the hall. He asked to be allowed to finish the meal he had ordered but they refused. They then came in to the county jail and locked him up.

The next morning the acting sheriff called Patterson, this man appeared to Patterson, this man appeared to be a fairly decent fellow; quite different type from his boss, Melan. He asked Patterson whether he would sign a statement. Patterson said he would. "Well," responded the deputy, "you don't get out of town."

Patterson asked how this was. The acting sheriff told him that there was an organized committee of Commercial Club members in town who had sworn they were going to do in the I. W. W. members.

"You are in great danger," said the deputy, "your life isn't safe on the streets."

Patterson told them that it was up to them as officers to protect him from assault and if they were unable to do so, they should issue him a permit to carry a gun.

They refused to do this but, acknowledging that they could not protect him for his participation to protect him, they locked him up again, "for safety."

After Patterson had been in jail for about two weeks, he has had one day in the court house and charged with being "lewd, disorderly and vagrant." He refused to plead guilty, he was a lawyer engaged to defend cases in Everett of members of the organization who were being allowed assistance of counsel.

He was released on bail but where he remained without further trial until released through the efforts of a fellow worker Patterson reports that the spirit of the boys in jail splendidly over the day the song of the revolution resound through the iron corridors and the members are prying by their enforced leisure by trying the aims and methods of the organization. The boys are working on the side to secure victory for free speech and free press.

W. in Australia, as one of the members of the first I. W. W. club formed in Chicago to secure a charter in which respect we were unsuccessful; and as one of the foundation members of the I. W. W. in this state--what its objects are. I do not wish to absolve myself of any complicity whatever in the foundation and institution of the I. W. W. as they say again with pride that I do."
