To the National Executive Committee.

Dear Comrades—I herewith submit a motion by Comrade Goebel, as follows:

"Moved, That the National Secretary call a meeting of the National Executive Committee at some date not later than March 19th."

I also transmit motions adopted by the Woman's National Committee, as follows:

1. "That the National Secretary be asked to assign Anna Maley, National Organizer for women, to New York City."
2. "That a National Conference of women be called in conjunction with the National Party Conference to be held next summer."
3. "That each local secretary be requested to send in to the National Office information concerning the activity and membership of women in their respective locals."
4. "That an investigation be made concerning the charges uttered at a public meeting by Mrs. Catt, president of the international suffrage movement, to the effect that in a number of localities where the suffrage for women was voted upon in general elections the Socialist party proved traitor to the women."
5. "In view of the fact that Gompers and a number of society women have opened war upon the Socialist women in the trade unions, the statement concerning our women's activity in the shirtwaist makers' strike, issued by the New York members of the Women's National Committee be published in the Party Bulletin and the Socialist dailies."

COMMENT.

Regarding the first motion, would say I deem it inadvisable to transfer Comrade Maley from her present field—South Dakota, where special work is needed, owing to the fact that the question of woman's suffrage will be voted on in November.

I have suggested to the Woman's Committee that the purpose of Motion No. 3 might easily be carried out as a matter of administration by the National Office, and that information is being sought along the lines suggested in Motion No. 4.

I have also advised, regarding the proposed address on the shirtwaist strike, that it would be well for the National Executive Committee to have an opportunity to consider it in session when a much more deliberate statement might be produced.

Dear Comrades—I herewith report the action taken upon the motion submitted under date of February 18th:

MOTION

"I move that we at once issue a special appeal to the party membership, calling for funds to assist the Milwaukee comrades in the approaching municipal election."

Comrades Goebel, Hillquit, Hunter and Spargo voted in the affirmative; Comrade Carey in the negative; Comrades Berger and Lewis not voting. The motion is, therefore, adopted.

The comment of the members is herewith transmitted:

LETTER OF COMRADE CAREY, DATED FEBRUARY 22d.

"I am opposed to the National Office sending out an appeal for funds in aid of a municipal campaign."

LETTER OF COMRADE GOEBEL, DATED FEBRUARY 21st.

"While voting yes on this motion, I wish to say I shall probably vote no on any further motion that may mean a direct appropriation from the National Treasury—not because I do not appreciate the tremendous opportunity and struggle the Milwaukee comrades have at hand, but because I do not believe in the concentration policy. At present the capitalists can concentrate with far more ease and effectiveness than the Socialist forces seem able to. And again, if we are to help one special case we establish a precedent that can easily bankrupt the party treasury."

Chicago, Ill., March 5, 1910.

To the National Executive Committee.

Dear Comrades—I herewith report the consideration given to the motion submitted under date of February 21st, and providing for a meeting of the committee on April 23d:

Comrades Hillquit, Hunter and Lewis voted in the affirmative; Comrades Carey, Goebel and Spargo voted in the negative; Comrade Berger not voting. Therefore, no action has been taken. Letters of Comrades Carey and Goebel have previously been published.

LETTER OF COMRADE HUNTER, DATED FEBRUARY 24th.

"I can attend a meeting of the National Executive Committee on April 23d, at 10 a. m. I wish it were possible to hold the meeting on the even of the National Convention, as it seems to me an unnecessary expense to have us all come there, return home again and then go back to the convention at the expense of the party. However, if the decision is made to have the meeting on the 23d, I shall attend."

LETTER OF COMRADE SPARGO, DATED FEBRUARY 23d.

"On the date for the next meeting of the National Executive Committee I think we should wait to learn the result of the referendum on the convention. If it is not carried

we should meet as soon thereafter as we can. If the convention is to be held our meeting ought to wait until a few days prior to it."

The motion by Comrade Goebel for "a meeting at some date not later than March 19th" is pending. Comrade Spargo submits the following:

MOTION.

"I move to amend Comrade Goebel's motion that we meet on March 26th."

Comrade Spargo suggests that replies be sent by wire.

In the matter of fixing dates for committee meetings, the members should bear in mind that two of their number are affiled as organizers and lecturers, and that time must be allowed in advance for the arrangement of release dates so as not to cancel assignments already made to locals.

Chicago, Ill., March 7, 1910.

To the National Executive Committee.

Dear Comrades—A controversy arose in the state organization of California, the nature of which is disclosed by the following correspondence and statements:

Telegram: "Oakland, Cal., Feb. 17, 1910.—Comrade Tuck suspended. Jennie Arnott temporary secretary. Address, 591 23d St., Oakland. (Signed) Jennie Arnott."

Telegram: "Oakland, Cal., Feb. 18, 1910.—Disregard telegram and letters from Jennie Arnott or Grist. (Signed) H. C. Tuck, State Secretary-Treasurer."

Orders for thirty dollars' worth of dues stamps were received from Comrade Tuck, Feb. 19th, and a like order from Comrade Arnott on Feb. 25th.

On Feb. 19th I sent copies of the above telegrams and the following letter to Comrades McDevitt and Richardson, National Committee members for California:

"Also this day I received a rather lengthy letter from Comrade Tuck, dated the 15th, stating that Local Oakland for the past ten days had been considerably disturbed "by a bunch of bogus revolutionists"; that within the movement there has developed a considerable faction of direct actionists who denounce the ballot as a bourgeois institution and oppose political action; that this element packed the business meeting of Branch Oakland on February 4th, whereupon those opposed to such policy withdrew in a body and protested the entire proceedings; that he (Tuck) and about a dozen more members were suspended by those who remained in the meeting."

"Comrade Tuck further states that the parties left in possession of the hall attempted to remove the furniture and other property of the local, but were prevented; that now the matter is in the hands of an investigating committee of the County Central Committee, by which a report was to be made on the 16th."

"Comrade Tuck also states that a few members of the State Executive Committee held a rump meeting Sunday, the 13th, without his (Tuck's) knowledge, and while he was attending the meeting of the aforementioned investigating committee; that Comrade Tuck is declared disqualified by the said assembled members of the State Executive Committee and another member of that committee was appointed to take charge of the state office."

"There is more to the same effect, but this will give you the general trend of the letter and reported facts. I would be glad to receive any information you have upon the subject, or suggestions as to the proper course to pursue in the premises."

"Recognition should be given to one of the two claimants at the earliest possible moment, so that the general movement within the state will not be affected by a lack of dues stamps and confusion as to the proper party from whom they should be received."

Under dates of Feb. 17 and 21st Comrades Arnott and Grist report that Branch Oakland of Local Alameda County had suspended Comrade Tuck for a period of thirty days, incapacitating him for the office of State Secretary-Treasurer. Upon notice by the said branch the State Executive Committee met in special session and suspended Comrade Tuck as State Secretary-Treasurer until such time as he is again in good standing in the branch to which he belongs.

The state constitution provides that the State Secretary-Treasurer of the party shall be elected by a referendum vote of the state party membership. He may be removed at any time by a majority vote of the party membership of the state on a referendum.

Under date of Feb. 24th Comrade C. H. Stocking, chairman, and Comrade J. W. Loomis, Secretary of the County Central Committee of Local Alameda County, report a meeting of that committee held Feb. 16th, at which the following action was taken:

"The investigating committee, composed of five members of the County Central Committee, one from each of the five branches in Alameda County, outside of Oakland, present the following report: 'In view of evidence presented at our meeting, held February 13, 1910, we recommend: First, That the County Central Committee declare the meeting of Branch Oakland, held Feb. 4th, 1910, irregular, and any action taken at that meeting to be void,' and reported the adoption of the above without a dissenting vote.

The state constitution defines certain powers of the County Central Committee and



adds: "It shall have such other powers and duties as may be imposed upon it by the local, or locals jointly, of the county."

The constitution of Local Alameda County gives the County Central Committee control over all propaganda, political and business affairs of the Socialist party in the county, subject to a referendum to the general vote of the local.

An adjourned meeting of the Alameda County Central Committee was held February 25th.

Telegram: "Oakland, Cal., March 5, 1910. County Committee, Feb. 25th, decided Branch Oakland meeting Feb. 4th irregular and void. Tuck not suspended. (Signed) H. C. Tuck."

Telegram: "San Leandro, Cal., March 6, 1910.—County Central Committee declared Tuck a member in good standing. (Signed) J. W. Loomis."

The State Executive Committee is composed of seven members elected by the State Central Committee. The latter are elected by the membership in the respective senatorial districts.

Pending the further consideration of the subject by your committee, I have supplied Comrade Tuck with dues stamps and nomination blanks for delegates to the International Congress.

The question submitted is: Shall Comrade Tuck or Comrade Arnott be recognized as State Secretary-Treasurer of California?

Under date of March 7th, a majority of votes being at hand, I advised the New York Call "to proceed with the special edition." A check for \$150.00 has been forwarded to carry out the purpose of the motion.

Dear Comrades—I herewith report the consideration given to the subject matters submitted under date of March 1st, namely, for a meeting of the committee on or before the 19th inst., and motions by the Woman's National Committee:

Upon the question of a meeting Comrade Carey voted in the affirmative and Comrade Spargo in the negative. The latest word from Comrade Goebel is that he accepts, in lieu of his motion, the amendment by Comrade Spargo. No action has, therefore, been taken.

Copies of the letters of the members are transmitted herewith:

LETTER OF COMRADE CAREY, DATED MARCH 4th.

"I vote 'Yes' on Comrade Goebel's motion for Executive Committee meeting no later than March 19th.

"On Woman's Committee motions I approve of your course which covered parts 1, 3, 4, 5. On No. 2, if the women comrades wish a meeting, I can see no reason why it should not be called, although the matters might be attended to by the regular Congress, if such be held. Record me as voting 'Yes' on No. 2."

LETTER OF COMRADE GOEBEL, DATED MARCH 6th.

"I vote yes on my motion concerning meeting of National Executive Committee.

"As to the motions of the Woman's National Committee, I endorse your position concerning not sending Comrade Maley to New York City. I would say I do not think Comrade Maley should be kept an undue length of time in South Dakota. There being but one woman's organizer, I believe she should get into as many states as possible to get things in motion. I do not think she should be kept in any state more than one month. It would seem better to keep her working to the Pacific Coast, as I assume is your general plan."

LETTER OF COMRADE HILLQUIT, DATED MARCH 5th.

"I can hardly vote 'Yes' or 'No' on the last two propositions submitted by you. As to Comrade Goebel's motion, it would be very inconvenient for me to attend a meeting of the National Executive Committee on March 19th, but if such meeting is called for March 26th, or any subsequent Saturday, I shall be ready to attend.

"As to the motions adopted by the Women's National Committee, I would say that

I would consider it best to defer consideration of the subject until the next meeting of our committee."

LETTER OF COMRADE HUNTER, DATED MARCH 5th.

"In regard to the motion submitted by Comrade Goebel I have only to repeat what I have previously written, that I cannot attend a meeting in Chicago in March. If there is any pressing work to be done I certainly do not desire to stand in the way of a meeting being held, but as I have no suggestions of my own to urge at this time, and as I have not heard from Comrade Goebel concerning any work that he feels important to be considered immediately by the National Executive Committee, I am at a loss to understand why this early meeting is necessary.

"In regard to the motion submitted by the Woman's National Committee, I think if Anna Maley is needed for the very important work in South Dakota that she ought to remain there. Second, I don't see how we would be empowered to call a national conference of women. We have no authority for backing such an act so far as I can see. Third, as you said that you can do this as an administrative measure, I suggest that it be carried forward along with the gathering of information suggested in motion No. 4. I am opposed to motion No. 5 because I believe that it is better not to blow our own horn. Good, serious work by Socialists will receive commendation without our boasting of it."

LETTER OF COMRADE SPARGO, DATED MARCH 4th.

"I vote 'No' on the motion of Comrade Goebel that we meet on or before March 19th. The time is too short. Most of us are not in the position of Comrade Goebel. As a paid organizer for the party his engagements are under party control. No matter where he may be scheduled, Comrades Barnes must relieve him to attend the meeting of the National Executive Committee.

"Those of us who are not so placed have important engagements which cannot be broken, and are compelled to arrange our plans much further ahead. It will be impossible for me to attend within the time specified. I am willing to attend on the 26th, and suggest that date as a compromise, though I must say that I am not aware of any business of sufficient importance to necessitate a meeting until after we know the result of the pending referendum to do away with the party congress.

"I cannot refrain from expressing my disapproval of the tone and spirit of Comrade Goebel's letter of February 24th, issued through the Party Bulletin. His strictures upon the act of the majority in voting against the date of meeting suggested by the National Secretary evinces a petulant and quarrelsome spirit not at all likely to promote harmonious working in the committee.

"Personally I should have respected him more if he had come out and stated his real reason, as he did to me recently in private conversation. He might have said: 'Comrades, I have won a prize contest which gives me a trip around the world, having gained the largest number of new subscribers for "Wilshire's Magazine." I shall be away for the greater part of the year, and unless we can meet soon it is likely that I shall not attend a single meeting during the year. That will look bad, and I, therefore, ask you to meet at an early date to save me from a very awkward dilemma.'

"That would have been manlier than his pharisaical criticism of comrades who did not have that personal motive for holding an early meeting."

To the National Executive Committee.

Dear Comrades—In the call for the nomination of eight delegates to represent the party at the International Congress it was stated that three years' consecutive membership shall be necessary to qualify for the position, which is in accordance with Section 2 of Article 3 of the National Constitution.

Since the present is the first instance in which such delegates have been elected by popular vote, there is no precedent or law regarding nominations, unless the present law, which provides for the election of national officers, applies. Said law was adopted as National Party Referendum "E," 1909, on February 9, 1910, and provided that "Nominations from five locals shall entitle a candidate to be placed on the ballot."

The question is therefore submitted: Shall the present law apply, or shall one nomination suffice to qualify a candidate for delegate to the International Congress?

Dear Comrades—I herewith transmit a motion submitted by Comrade Berger:

MOTION.

"That if the National Party Referendum closing April 6th decides favorable to the holding of a Party Congress, May 15th, the National Secretary shall issue mileage assessment stamps of the denomination of twenty-five cents each, and apportion them according to membership to the respective state organizations and locals in unorganized states. The National Secretary shall also send out a circular to the locals and members urging them to voluntarily pay said assessment to cover the assured deficit on delegate mileage."

Chicago, Ill., March 16, 1910.

To the National Executive Committee.

Dear Comrades—The result of the vote of the National Committee upon the choice of the city of Chicago and May 15th as the date for holding the National Party Congress was announced February 18th. That is

less than three months in advance of the day set for the Congress. The subsequent letter to the State Secretaries containing the call for nominations reduced the already limited time allowed for the election of delegates.

National Constitution, Article X, Section 7, in part:

"The election of delegates to the national conventions shall take place not later than sixty days preceding the national convention and the respective state secretaries shall furnish the National Secretary not later than thirty days preceding such convention with a list of the accredited delegates to the convention.

"The National Secretary shall prepare a printed roster of the accredited delegates to be sent to each delegate and forwarded to the party press for publication. That such list shall contain the occupation of each delegate and his office or employment is the party. That all official reports required to be presented to the national convention shall be printed and sent to each delegate elected at least fifteen days before the date of the conventions and furnished to the party press for publication."

Many State Secretaries have reported that it is impossible, according to their respective state laws governing referendums, to comply with the provisions of the National Constitution and transmit a list of their delegates to this office thirty days in advance of the congress. One State Secretary in his state call says: "Constitutions have to submit to the law of necessity."

It will be possible to reach all delegates with the required documents from this office if they are mailed from here May 4th, and they can be prepared in the interim if the last date for the receipt of the necessary information from State Secretaries is fixed for May 2d.

It is absolutely impossible to carry out the exact letter of the constitution. To cover the spirit and intent and allow the State Secretaries seventeen additional days, I submit the following motion:

MOTION.

"That the respective State Secretaries shall furnish the National Secretary not later than May 2d with a list of the accredited delegates to the National Congress."

Because it is also advisable and necessary that the respective State Secretaries should be informed at the earliest possible moment of the number of delegates to which the respective states are entitled, I submit the following motion.

MOTION.

"That the representation from the several states of delegates to the Party Congress be based upon the membership for the year 1909."

To the National Executive Committee.

Dear Comrades—I herewith report the consideration given to the amendment submitted by Comrade Spargo to the motion by Comrade Goebel—that is, instead of March 19th a meeting of the National Executive Committee shall be held on March 26th:

Comrades Berger, Goebel and Spargo voted in the affirmative. No expressions were received from the other members of the committee. A quorum failing to vote, no action has, therefore, been taken.

I enclose herewith another copy of my communication of March 14th, also a copy of National Party Referendum "E," 1909, and I desire to restate the question.

Comrade Hillquit has called to my attention the possibility of a misapprehension of the subject upon the part of the members in the absence of the text of Referendum "E," 1909.

The point Comrade Hillquit raises is that if Referendum "E" expressly relates only to the election of members of the National Executive Committee and the National Secretary, then its provisions should not apply in the case of nominations for delegates to the International Congress.

Please disregard any vote you may have sent based upon my communication of the 14th, and kindly vote by return mail upon the following:

Shall one nomination suffice, or shall five be required to qualify a candidate as a delegate to the International Congress?

Dear Comrade—I have your communication of March 13th, addressed to the National Executive Committee, in which John Spargo, in answer to my urging an early meeting of the committee and the planning out of an aggressive campaign of education, comes back with the suggestion that my real reason for desiring this early meeting was (as alleged to be said to him) that "having won a trip around the world I should be away the larger part of the year, it was likely I could not attend a single meeting of the committee, which would look bad," and that I therefore "asked him to agree to an early meeting to save me from an awkward dilemma."

I have found the best way to meet a barefaced lie like this that Spargo tells is to tell the exact truth. So I will tell it, and, fortunately for me and unfortunately for John Spargo, there was a witness to the conversation referred to, which occurred just after it was known who were elected to the National Executive Committee.

Spargo himself began the conversation by alluding to my election. I asked him how often the committee usually met, and he answered quarterly, and that it had been suggested (by whom?) a meeting be held March 19th.

In the talk that followed I spoke of the fact of being in a contest for a trip around the world, which I hoped to win because of my physical condition, due to the strenuous life of an agitator, and that if I won it I would be away from the fall meeting of the committee, which would be unfortunate, but that I thought the membership would excuse my absence from that meeting and be glad to have me get my health back. If further proof were needed that Spargo does not tell the truth, it is found in the fact that the contest which he says I spoke of having won will not have ended until June 2d, hundreds of comrades being at this moment engaged in striving to win it! The trip itself, no matter who wins it, will not begin until July 18th, yet he, to cloud the issues, makes the statement he does.

Now that Spargo brings up this conversation, I am free to tell of other portions of it, in which he boasted he had gone into three states to influence the vote, how he sent for one State Secretary who wanted Comrade Carey on the committee, and attempted vainly to induce this secretary to forego his support of Carey lest it defeat Simons, etc. He also regretted my election, as it "made an organizer the boss of his own job." I notice that John was "boss-enough of his job" to allow the entire membership to be called on to read a list of books that included John's handiwork, and put the Communist Manifesto under the stove.

I did not seek personal controversy—I simply called attention to the fact that the four hold-over members of the committee find it inconvenient to have a meeting and thereby deprive the new members of a chance to do what they were elected for. No matter how Spargo feels, I take pleasure in the fact that comrades all over the country, including Eugene V. Debs, have commended the position of Comrade Carey and myself in this matter. I did not ask for a quarrel. I asked for a meeting of the committee. Let us meet the issue. What is the issue? This—a steadily increasing social unrest, great labor troubles, a universal agitation over the meat question that does not seem to have been met with a single piece of literature from the National Office. Money pouring into the national treasury, and relatively not as many speakers or organizers out as a one-horse lecture bureau could keep busy.

I do not profess to know it all, but I say it is our business to meet and by studying the entire situation together plan as best we can for an aggressive forward movement all along the line. If there's nothing for the committee to do, let's abolish it and give the rank and file a chance.

I ask for this letter exactly the same measure of publicity given to Spargo's letter.

We recognize Tuck as hopelessly unfair, as more intolerant than Titus, more desperate



than Sladden, and we insist on a full and fair referendum.

The State Executive Committee at its Sunday meeting will set this call in motion, I believe, as the members favor it, and see no other way out.

Local San Francisco, Local Los Angeles and the big branch in Oakland, these being three largest locals in California, are all bitterly opposed to Tuck. And yet he is expected to count himself in—once more.

I believe that, while the party has not definitely decided upon this matter, the election is similar in nearly all respects to the election of members to the National Executive Committee and that it ought to be conducted as nearly as possible along the same lines. Certainly it is a precedent which should be followed as the delegates to the International Congress are really for the moment very similar to the executives of the party."

"On question of delegates to International Congress, in absence of explicit law, I feel it is better to allow one nomination to qualify a candidate."

ARTICLE XI.

Referendum.

Sec. 1. Motions to amend any part of this constitution, as well as any other motions or resolutions to be voted upon by the entire membership of the party, shall be submitted by the National Secretary to a referendum of the party membership upon the request of 50 local organizations in ten or more states or territories, or any smaller number of local organizations in three states having four thousand members in the aggregate, provided that the proposed amendment receive sufficient endorsement inside of ninety days after the first publication in the National Bulletin.

Exceptions to this rule are proposed amendments which reach the National Office not less than six weeks before any congress or convention is held and be submitted to such congress or convention for debate, and such congress or convention shall send the amendments to referendum."

National Notes

In the recent election in Allegheny County, Pa., thirty odd comrades were elected as inspectors of election on the Socialist ticket. Whittaker Borough elected a Socialist auditor and three councilmen.

The Scandinavian Socialist Agitation Committee by resolution recommends to the National Executive Committee action relating to the May Day celebration, as follows: To work out a strong resolution for use at the meetings on the following lines: The abolition of the injunction against labor unions; for a law for the eight-hour day, and better protection for workers in shops, mines and factories and favorable to the reduction of military expenses to the nation.

By a proofreader's slip in the February Bulletin the name of Comrade Geo. H. Goebel as a member elect of the National Executive Committee failed to appear under the tabulation of votes cast for national officers. Comrade Goebel, with 129,615 votes, ranks as sixth choice among those elected.
