### Minutes of the National Executive Committee of the Socialist Party Session Held at New York, Rand School, Aug. 7th and 8th, 1910

The National Secretary called the meeting to order at 2:40 p. m.

Present: J. Mahlon Barnes, National Secretary; James Carey, John Spargo, George H. Goebel, Mrs. Lena Morrow Lewis, Robert Hunter and Morris Hillquit. Comrade Carey was elected chairman, and Comrade M. M. Bartholomew was elected secretary of the meeting.

The chairman called for the report of the National Secretary.

National Secretary Barnes reported on the organized states, giving a review of the conditions in each state; the same being supplemented by reports by Comrade Carey on conditions in Maine and Massachusetts, Comrade Hunter upon the state of Connecticut, Comrade Hillquit for New York, Comrade Goebel for New Jersey, and Comrade Spargo for Vermont.

Secretary Barnes suggested that a committee of two be appointed to read the correspondence on Arizona.

Comrades Spargo and Lewis were appointed such committee.

Regarding Oklahoma, the secretary reported that the grandfather's clause (the disfranchisement of negroes) was adopted last Tuesday, and that its adoption was due to a trick of the Democratic party in the matter of arranging the ballot so that all were counted favorable to the amendment unless the word "no" was written on the ballot, those not voting at all on the proposition being counted in the affirmative.

MOTION.—That Comrade Hillquit be appointed a committee of one to advise as to the legality of an election conducted in this manner. Adopted.

Comrade Barnes suggested the feasibility of the state organization conducting night schools to qualify working people as voters in accordance with the new law.

Regarding encampments mentioned in the report, the following was adopted: MOTION.—That Comrade Barnes as-



certain the number of encampments held in the various states during the year and the attendance at same, and transmit this information to Comrade Goebel, who is appointed a committee of one to report at a future meeting upon better methods for organizing and conducting encampment meetings.

Upon the question arising as to the list of locals filed in the National office from the various states, the following was adopted:

**MOTION.**—That the National Secretary write to the State Secretary of Wisconsin again requesting the list of local secretaries.

**UNORGANIZED STATES.**

In Delaware we are assured of a congressional ticket. A new local has recently been organized.

**GEORGIA:** State convention has been held. Congressional candidates will be nominated in some districts. Comrade Max Wilk is acting as temporary organizer.

**MISSISSIPPI** is making some progress in organization. Will have a state convention, date not yet determined, and will have some congressional candidates.

**NORTH CAROLINA** has had a state convention. Will nominate some congressional candidates later. Dues are on the increase. Several new locals have been organized.

**SOUTH CAROLINA** has held a state convention and adjourned it to a later date. Will have state ticket and perhaps some congressional candidates. Comrade Max Wilk is also acting as temporary organizer in this state.

**VIRGINIA:** The movement is going rapidly forward in this state. A number of new locals have been organized. A state convention is being held today at Richmond which will probably result in the establishment of a permanent state organization. Several districts will have congressional candidates.

**MOTION.**—That a committee of two be appointed with instructions to submit at the next meeting, if possible, definite plans for propaganda in the South. Adopted.

Comrades Goebel and Lewis were appointed as the committee.

**FINANCES.**

The Monthly Financial Report ending July 31 is before you. As previously reported, the ordinary funds were conserved in order to meet the liabilities for the expenses of delegates to the International Congress. This will leave us a liability of about \$500 for printing in excess of cash on hand, it being understood that the mileage reserve shown in the last report is kept intact. Our ordinary resources will admit of an expenditure of six or seven hundred dollars per month for speakers, but for any campaign work or expenses in excess of that we must depend wholly upon the responses received to the recent call issued under your direction for a Congressional Campaign Fund.

**ORGANIZATION AND AGITATION.**

As you notice, we have increased our force of organizers. Comrade Brown is in service now in Maine. We made a few dates for Comrade Reynolds between Chautauqua engagements in the territory of Western Nebraska, North and South Dakota, Minnesota and Northern Michigan. It will occupy him about a month.

Comrade Snyder is in New Mexico, and Dan A. White is now in Vermont, and we expect to place him in Missouri after a short connecting trip across the country.

Comrade Goebel will start out the middle of this month, taking in Kentucky, probably Indiana, Ohio, Western Virginia, or some territory in that neighborhood, in the immediate future, and prior to election.

Dates for Comrade Maley in the Western Pacific Coast States are arranged up to election.

**LITERATURE.**

The Secretary reported fifteen leaflets or pamphlets now in stock in the National office, ranging in price from 15 copies for \$1 to 50 cents per 1,000 copies, the total number of pieces being 1,450,000. Announcement has been made of a new leaflet to be published each month during August, September and October. The booklet containing a reprint of the Study Course Lessons will be issued during the present month.

**MOTION.**—The National Executive Committee being desirous of publishing the best possible leaflet on the subject "Why Socialists Pay Dues," respectfully request the editors of the party papers to institute a discussion on that subject in their press, the articles not to exceed 1,000 words. Adopted.

**MOTION.**—That the National Executive Committee publish a leaflet on the Political parties of the United States, that the leaflet should take the Republican Party, the Democratic Party and the Socialist Party in the order named, briefly summarizing the program of each, the records of their actions towards the working class movement in particular, classes represented by them; brief mention to be made also of the Prohibition Party and the Reform Parties coming up from time to time, this to be the closing leaflet for the campaign. Adopted.

**MOTION.**—That Comrade Ghent be requested to prepare this leaflet. Adopted.

The Secretary reported that the best terms received from publishers for cheap editions of books previously considered

was for the reprinting of "Socialists at Work," the price being 13 cents per copy.

**MOTION.**—That orders be solicited for the same at 25 cents per copy in lots of 10.

**SECRETARY BARNES:** If our campaign funds warrant it I believe we should issue a uniform campaign leaflet, with the names of individual candidates and their district number printed thereon.

**MOTION.**—That the National Secretary be authorized to publish a uniform campaign leaflet for the different congressional districts in lots of 10,000, each lot bearing the name of the candidate of the particular district, such leaflets to be sold at fifty cents per thousand, provided that the campaign funds do not warrant a free distribution of the leaflets, but if they do, then the first lot of 10,000 is to be offered to candidates free of charge except for expressage. Adopted.

Leaflet to be prepared by Comrades Berger, Spargo, Hunter and Hillquit.

Communication from certain comrades of Local Kings, N. Y., relating to the systematic distribution of literature, submitting text of one proposed leaflet for approval; signed by Max Fruchter, Solomon Schwartz, and others; and two of those comrades were given the floor in support of their proposition.

**MOTION.**—That the Committee decline the proposition. Adopted.

Adjourned at 6:30 to meet at 8 p. m.

**EVENING SESSION.**

Comrade Hillquit was elected chairman. Comrade Schlesinger of New York was given the floor and presented the matter of the establishment of an international news service. No action was taken, it being held that this committee has no power to act on the matter presented.

Relating to the action of the National Committee in adopting motion No. 4 by a vote of 38 in favor, 6 against, and 14 not voting, the following action was taken:

**RESOLVED,** That the National Executive Committee takes cognizance of the resolution of the National Committee declining to withdraw the charges of James H. Brower and others against National Secretary Barnes from the jurisdiction of this committee. The National Executive Committee appreciates the fairness and propriety of this action. While the members of the National Executive Committee were and are quite satisfied as to the efficiency and integrity of the National Secretary, they were and are quite ready and willing to make an impartial investigation of any charges properly presented to them. But in view of the fact that the complainants, in making their charges, first demanded the summary suspension of a tried and trusted party official within a few hours of an important party congress, and then because the committee refused to act in this illegal and unjust manner, declined to appear before the committee to which they had presented their charges, and proceeded to heap insults upon its members, we are forced to the conclusion that the complainants acted in bad faith and that the charges were prompted by personal spite and malice.

The National Executive Committee deems it to be its duty to call the attention of the party members to the fact that the organized enemies of the movement desire, above everything else, the promulgation of dissension and suspicion in our ranks, and those who within our ranks systematically attack the character and impugn the motives of trusted party workers and officials, going to the extent of publishing regular periodical sheets for that sole purpose, are consciously or unconsciously playing the enemy's game in the most effective manner. The authors of the charges against Comrade Barnes having repeatedly refused to appear before this committee and substantiate their charges, we consider the incident closed so far as this committee is concerned.

An adjournment was taken to Monday, August 8, at 10 a. m.

**MORNING SESSION, AUGUST 8TH, 1910.**

National Secretary Barnes called the meeting to order at 10 a. m. Comrade Lewis was elected chairman.

Present: Goebel, Hillquit, Hunter, Lewis and Spargo.

Comrade Hillquit, as per action of the committee by correspondence, submitted draft of proposed constitutional program for the states of Arizona and New Mexico.

**MOTION.**—That the same be approved by this committee. Adopted.

As to the Arizona situation: Comrade Spargo reported for the committee to which was referred the matter of the Arizona situation.

**STATEMENT BY THE COMMITTEE.**

The National Executive Committee is in receipt of several communications from party members and officials in the state of Arizona, from which it appears that in the pending campaign for election of representatives to the Constitutional Convention of the new state the members of our party are divided on the question and the propriety of supporting the newly formed labor party of Arizona or conducting an independent Socialist campaign. Some members of the Arizona party organization also take exception to the action of this committee in preparing a constitutional program for use in the pending campaign, and characterize this action as an unauthorized interference on the part of this committee with the affairs of the party in the state of Arizona.

The National Executive Committee has taken upon itself the drafting of a constitutional program for the states of New Mexico and Arizona upon the suggestion of the National organizer who had been working in both states, and upon the assurance that such action would be heartily welcomed by the comrades in both states. The drafting, printing and furnishing of the program were considered by the committee as an act of assistance to the Socialists of the two new states in their campaigns similar to the assistance rendered by the committee to other states in the way of furnishing to them literature, organizers or funds. The program elaborated by the committee is by no means forced upon the state organizations and not binding upon them unless it meets their full approval. The committee desires to add, however, that the constitutional program drafted by it was very carefully prepared and, in the opinion of the committee, represents the Socialist attitude fully and correctly; whereas the program adopted by the Labor Party of Arizona is entirely inadequate and inconsistent, not only from the point of view of the Socialist philosophy, but from the point of view of any progressive labor movement. It fails to include such vital demands of the International modern labor movement as old age pensions, state insurance of workmen against sickness, invalidism, accidents and unemployment, the unrestricted right to use the weapons of the strike and boycott, and similar substantial demands, and is composed of an inconsistent and unsystematic collection of Socialist, Populist and Bourgeois reform measures.

The regular organizations of the party in both states have requested the National office to send them copies of the constitutional program drafted by it for immediate distribution, and have expressed themselves as highly appreciative of the effective and the timely assistance extended to them by this committee.

Whether an alliance between the Socialist Party and the organized labor movement in Arizona for the purpose of electing joint delegates to the constitutional convention could be justified under any circumstances is a purely theoretical question, upon the discussion of which we cannot enter in view of the express prohibition of such alliance contained in our national constitution.

Article XII, Sec. 3, reads as follows: "The platform of the Socialist Party shall be the supreme declaration of the party, and all state and municipal platforms shall conform thereto; and no state or local organization shall, under any circumstances, fuse, combine or compromise with any other political party or organization or refrain from making nominations, in order to favor the candidate of such other organizations, nor shall any candidate of the Socialist Party accept any nomination or endorsement from any other party or political organization."

In allying themselves with the Labor Party of Arizona and refraining from making independent nominations for delegates to the constitutional convention certain comrades in Arizona are clearly violating the provision of the constitution quoted. The National Executive Committee cannot and does not approve such gross violation of the constitution, but condemns it unreservedly. The integrity of our party and our movement depends very largely upon the proper discipline of our party members and their observation of our self imposed laws and rules. If any provision of our constitution should seem unreasonable or not in the best interest of our movement, the remedy should be in amending such provision and not in violating it. Adopted.

**MOTION.**—That our press be requested to give full publicity to the appeal made by the United Mine Workers' Union of Illinois for funds. Adopted.

**MOVED.**—That \$50 be contributed to the expense of securing Comrade DeLara's services for the state of New Mexico. Adopted.

**MOVED.**—That the following be telegraphed to Comrade Job Harriman: "Can you go to Arizona and try to harmonize Socialist factions, also speak for party for two weeks if possible, one week at least? **MOTION.**—That Comrade Hillquit be asked to draft the procedure on this matter and submit it at the first meeting after election. Adopted.

Resolution No. 12.

**MOVED.**—That Comrades Steadman, B. Berlyn, Barnes, Chase, Work, Bentall, William Bross Lloyd, Thompson, Adolph Germer, of Illinois, be a committee, with power to fill vacancies. Adopted.

**MOVED.**—That the program drawn up by the above committee be submitted to the National Committee for approval, with an explanation from the National Secretary that it was impossible for the National Executive Committee to carry out the strict letter of the instructions of the congress and have the program available for use in the coming congressional campaign. Adopted.

Communication from the State Secretary of Wisconsin, protesting against the action of the Appeal to Reason in sending Comrade Debs into that state on the Appeal subscription plan; letter from Comrade Warren in reply to the same.

**MOTION.**—That the Executive Committee declines to act upon the protest, not having any jurisdiction of the subject matter thereof. Adopted.

Communication from Local Havana,



Cuba, as to delegates of United States to the International congress using credentials from Cuba and representing them.

**MOTION.**—That the offer be declined to elect a representative for them at the International congress, on the ground that we hold that each party should be represented by its own members, familiar with the conditions and situation of the movement represented by them and competent to speak for them. Adopted.

As to Article XIX. (recent referendum).

**MOVED.**—That the committee interpret the section as follows: In view of the fact that Article XIX, relating to foreign speaking organizations, seems to have been misconstrued by one or more foreign speaking Socialist organizations affiliated with the party, the National Executive Committee believes it appropriate at this time to give its construction of the article. The provisions of Article XIX do not deprive any foreign speaking Socialist from exercising all the rights of party members in the same manner as they are exercised by the English speaking Socialists. Every foreign speaking Socialist may become a member of the organization of the Socialist Party, and as such take part in all votes and in all activities of the party. In addition to that, foreign speaking Socialists may also form a separate organization of their own, principally for the purpose of carrying on the propaganda of Socialism in their native language. If they choose to do that they pay additional small membership dues, for which the national office furnishes them with a special Translator-Secretary, and they also have advisory representation at the conventions and congresses of the party. Thus every foreign speaking Socialist has three options: He may be a regular member of the Socialist Party only, or he may also be a member of the special organization of his language group, if he cares to pay the requisite additional dues, or he may limit his membership to the foreign speaking organization, in which case he will have to pay but small dues, but will not enjoy all the rights of party membership. As the National Executive Committee sees it, this provision was adopted in order to enable all foreign speaking Socialists to work within the sphere in which their activities may be most useful, and at the same time to prevent double voting and double representation. Adopted.

**MOTION.**—That the salary of the Finnish translator be increased to \$21 a week. Adopted.

**MOVED.**—That the thanks of the Executive Committee be extended to the Rand School for the use of their rooms. Adopted.

**MOVED.**—That the next regular meeting of the National Executive Committee be held in the city of Chicago on the 26th of November, 1910, and that a prior meeting be held in the city of New York at the call of the National Secretary. Adopted.

**MOVED.**—That a sub-committee be appointed or elected to consider the question of systematizing the work of the National Executive Committee. Adopted.

The Socialists of Milwaukee have again shown in a clear manner the difference between a capitalist and a Socialist administration in a recent hearing in the South Side track elevation case. At former hearings the capitalist administrations have invited the big business men and have consulted them only. The Social-Democratic administration last week made a strange innovation by calling in the workmen and asking their opinions on track elevation. The workmen and business agents of the unions testified that the railroads blocked long lines of cars containing working men going to and from work at the rush hours. The business agents also testified that complaints were constantly being made in the unions by working men who were docked in their wages because of the delay caused by the railroads. The hearing consequently resulted in a decision for track elevation on the South Side of Milwaukee. For thirteen years the citizens of Milwaukee have fought for this, but

the interests of the railroads and the big business firms outweighed the voice of the public. Less than four months of a Socialist administration has achieved this victory for the people.

The new constitution of the National Finnish Socialist Organization has been adopted by referendum vote and went into effect July 1. Under the new constitution the Finnish organization is divided into three districts, known as the Eastern, Middle and Western Districts. Each district has its own executive committee and secretary. The committees are to take charge of all agitation in their respective districts and hold their own conventions, etc.

The Middle District convention will be held in Hancock, Mich., August 20, at the same time the annual meeting of the Tyomies Publishing Company takes place. The delegates are being elected by district referendum. This convention will elect a district executive committee and secretary and decide upon the seat of the executive committee and all plans for agitation and propaganda in the district.

The National Executive Committee and the translator's office will remain the same as before. The duties of the National Executive Committee will be to supervise the work of the whole organization and send out special organizers.

The leaflet issued during August is entitled, "Barbarous America." The price is 50 cents per 1,000. This leaflet deals with accidents incident to the industrial pursuits engaged in by the workers of America and presents a striking comparison of facts as to the treatment by the governments of such workers in this and other countries. In fact, no compensation is provided by the American government, which is an indictment of the brutality of the employing class, which is also as yet the governing class. This is likewise an indictment against the workers for their failure to lay hold of the civic powers for their own self-protection. Order and circulate "BARBAROUS AMERICA." PRICE 50 cents per 1,000.

The Italian comrades report that some of the agents of capitalist Italian publications issued in Altoona, Pa., and Pittsburg, Kans., are soliciting subscriptions under false pretenses and representing the said papers to be the official organs of the Italian section of the Socialist party. Italian comrades should be informed that the only paper supporting the Socialist party and printed in the Italian language is "La Parola del Socialista," published at 874 Blue Island Avenue, Chicago. Subscription price, \$1.00 per year.

The Executive Committee of the Italian Section of the Socialist party has decided to negotiate with some prominent comrade in Italy to make a six months' tour of America. A referendum will be held to select one from several names to be suggested by the National Office of the Socialist party of Italy. A referendum will also be held for the election of an Italian secretary-translator.
