Socialist Party, Peirce County, Washington, February 26:
"Moved, That Article II of the National Constitution of the Socialist Party be amended so that a husband and wife may become members in good standing by the presentation of one red card or by payment of one assessment for dues."

Comment: "The aim of the Socialist Party is to secure votes, not dues. Those who join a local are pledged to vote for Socialist candidates. Those who do not join may talk for Social-

who do not join may talk for Socialism and vote for capitalism.

"All money raised by dues is used for organization or propaganda work.

If we can secure more votes right at home by cutting down the expense of joining to new members, it answers the same purpose as if the state and national offices had received more dues and used the money in some other field.

"We want the women in the locals, and they are not coming under the present dues system. We want farmers and their wives, and must make a special effort to secure them."

## **National Executive Committee on Kidnaping Case**

In session beginning April 29, 1911

Decided action on the conspiracy against the Bridge and Structural Iron Workers has been taken by the National Executive Committee of the Socialist Party, meeting in Boston, Mass.

This action is embodied in the following statements, which were adopted and signed by the entire committee, consisting of Victor L. Berger, Robert Hunter, Morris Hillquit, James F. Carey, Lena Morrow Lewis, George H. Goebel, John Spargo and National Secretary J. Mahlon

To Frank M. Ryan, President International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, Indianapolis, Ind.:

The National Executive Committee of the Socialist Party, in session, offers the entire power of its 4,000 organizations and its press, consisting of ten dailies, over one hundred weeklies and ten monthlies (in all languages), to be used in the defense of the McNamaras, and any other help within our power.

To John J. McNamara, International Secretary of the Bridge and Structural Iron Workers:

Greetings and good cheer to you in your prison cell. Your kidnaping and the sensational stories in the capitalist press suggest that, as in the case of Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone, there is a foul conspiracy against you. No such conspiracy will succeed.

With its 100,000 dues-paying members and its press in many languages, the Socialist Party will rouse the American people and insure to you a fair trial.

To Mrs. Mary McNamara, Mother of John J. and James B. McNamara, Who Lives at Cincinnati, Ohio:

At this time, when your heart must be wrung with grief and oppressed by anxiety for the safety of your sons, we, the National Executive Committee, in behalf of the members of the Socialist Party, extend to you our heartfelt sympathy, and cheer.

Remembering the foul conspiracy of the capitalist class to railroad Moyer, Haywood and Pettibone to the gallows upon trumped-up evidence, we are impressed by the striking similarity in the kidnaping of your sons, and the sensational stories spread in the capitalistic press.

Rest assured, the Socialist Party of the country, with its 100,000 dues-paying members and its press in many languages, will rouse the American people and assure a fair trial for your sons.

To the Locals of the Socialist Party:

Comrades-John J. McNamara, the secretary-treasurer of the Bridge and Structural Iron Workers' Union, and J. B. McNamara, a member of the union, have been arrested on the charge of murder in connection with the recent explosion of the Los Angeles Times building.

To all fair-minded persons, and especially to those who are familiar with the objects and methods of the labor movement, the charge seems so absurd on its face as to suggest a deliberate plot.

The Structural Iron Workers' Union had no controversy with the owners of the Los Angeles Times, and had no motive for the commission of the inhuman crime, even if it possessed the moral depravity ascribed to it by its enemies, and there is not a semblance of probability that a national organization of a large body of workers could be engaged in systematic destruction of life and property, paying for such diabolical work from the treasury of the organization.

The prosecution of the accused was inspired by the National Manufacturers' Association, and conducted by a private detective agency in its hire.

The arrest was encompassed in defiance of all fundamental principles of law, justice and fairness. The defendants were kidnaped and abducted from the state of their residence without a hearing or an opportunity to consult counsel.

Immediately after the arrest the entire press of the country, with the exception of the Socialist and labor papers, set to work poisoning the minds of the people against the accused and against the entire labor movement by publishing gruesome stories of alleged fiendish crimes of the Structural Iron Workers' Union and condemning the accused in advance of trial.

The methods employed in the case bear such a close resemblance to those employed in the recent prosecution of the officers of the Western Federation of Miners that it must be considered as a continuation of the same dastardly conspiracy on the part of organized capital in this country to crush organized labor by crime and violence.

The conspiracy must be frustrated, comrades, and there is no power in this country to carry on the battle except the organized forces of Socialism and labor.

In view of these facts, the National Executive Committee of the Socialist Party call upon all locals of the party:

1. To forthwith form joint committees of Socialists and labor unions in their respective localities for the purpose of raising funds for the defense of the accused and carrying on a campaign of enlightenment to counteract the infamous campaign of the capitalist press.

2. To raise funds for the purpose of carrying on an aggressive and extensive campaign for Socialism in the State of California, and particularly in the city of Los Angeles, and let the reply of the Socialists and workers to the assault of the California capitalists be the election of a Socialist Mayor and City Council of Los Angeles, and perhaps of a Socialist Governor and Legislature in the State of California.

To work, comrades; the fight is on. It is a tremendous fight. Every man to his post.

The newspapers are printing sensational stories of alleged confessions and doing everything possible to inflame public minds. The whole affair hourly takes on a stronger aspect of a gigantic conspiracy.

Meanwhile the work for the establishment of a Milwaukee Socialist Daily is steadily going forward, \$15,000 having been subscribed for bonds for the daily.

In Marshalltown, Iowa, the Socialist candidate for mayor, in a poll of more than three thousand, was defeat-

ed by only 184 votes.

In Belle Plaine, Iowa, the Socialist candidate for mayor was defeated by five votes. Comrade E. L. Swinny was elected alderman.

In Colfax, Iowa, Comrade Frank L. Evans was elected councilman at large by a majority of one, and Thomas Hind was elected a member of the School Board.

If it can be called a setback to lose the election, but to gain 4,000 to 5,000 votes over our vote at the last by-election two years ago, Milwaukee Socialists received a setback in the by-election held here last Tuesday.

The candidates voted for in this election were one alderman-at-large to fill a vacancy, judges and school directors. The Republicans and Democrats, and, in fact, all the forces of

directors. The Republicans and Democrats, and, in fact, all the forces of capitalism, superstition and reaction combined against the Socialists.

But worst of all, the capitalist daily papers of Milwamkee constantly poured forth the most venomous attacks, calumnies and lies against the Socialists and the Socialist administration. On the other hand, the Socialists had no means of replying to these assaults except through their weekly paper.

Now it is easy to figure out that nine papers grinding out lies seven days in the week cannot be neutralized by one paper telling the truth once a week.

The Milwaukee Socialists have accordingly resolved to start a Socialist daily. Within one hour of the news of our defeat on Tuesday night the workingmen of Milwaukee had subscribed \$4,500 to start this daily. All together \$10,000 have now been subscribed. The Milwaukee comrades will do their part.

But we have no millionaire Socialists in Milwaukee. Our Movement is composed almost exclusively of work-

In order to start our daily on a sound basis and make it a live newspaper we must have \$100,000. It cannot be expected that the Milwaukee workingmen can raise this entire

workingmen can raise this entire amount.

Nor should it be expected of them. Our Milwaukee movement is a matter of interest to the entire membership of the Socialist Party of America. From the time that we elected the first Socialist congressman in the United States, our movement ceased to be merely a local movement. It now belongs to the Socialists of America. America.

now belongs to the Socialists of America.

There can be no question that the Republicans and Democrats and all the forces of capitalism will unite against us next year, in the mayoralty and congressional elections. We can hardly expect to win against this combination without a daily paper.

But we must win. We must hold Milwaukee. We must keep our one Socialist congressman. We cannot afford to lose the one voice we have in the National Congress.

Therefore, comrades, we appeal to you. Milwaukee will probably raise \$50,000 for the daily. The balance must be raised by the membership outside of Milwaukee. We believe that you can raise \$50,000 to hold our largest Socialist city and the one Socialist member of Congress.

The funds for the daily will be raised by the sale of bonds. Each bond will cost \$10. These bonds will bear 4 per cent interest after December 1.
