CALL FOR FUNDS.

To the Locals of the Socialist Party:

Dear Comrades:—You are hereby called upon to contribute funds for the purpose of assisting the Chicago Daily World to buy a large press and equip the office sufficiently to issue 300,000 papers daily.

To acquaint you with the situation, the following letter written by Charles Edward Russell is quoted:

"Are you informed of the actual situation in regard to the Chicago Daily World?"

"This paper now has a circulation of more than three hundred thousand copies a day, having attained the largest circulation ever reached by any Socialist daily in the world.

"Its audience is the working class, which now for the first time we have an opportunity to address.

"The sudden and enormous increase of the circulation has strained to the utmost the resources of the paper and of the comrades that support it.

"The great danger that confronts the paper and threatens to overwhelm it is that because of its total lack of means it cannot meet the requirements of the present situation, and will, therefore, fail to hold these new readers. In that case they will return to scab newspapers; the Daily World will be back where it was when the fight began, and a great blow will be dealt to organized labor.

"We ought not to allow this to happen.

"We cannot afford to miss this opportunity.

"A general impression is abroad that because of the great increase of circulation and the apparent increase of advertising, the paper is prosperous and does not need our help. The actual fact is that the increased circulation has enormously multiplied the expense, and there has been no adequate increase of revenue. The conditions of newspaper publishing at present are very severe. The expenses are huge and are insistent every day. The revenues are largely in the future. Because of its convictions the World can get none of the usual credit at the bank. It must meet its paper bills every day. Eventually, if it can hold its present course and circulation, it will have sufficient revenue, but there is the greatest danger that for lack of immediate means it will lose its circulation and defeat all the hopes that have been raised for it. I regard it as a sound business proposition at present, in strong, capable hands, intelligently managed, and, if it can be tided over its present straits, it will be firmly established with a great working class constituency.

"Come to its help if you possibly can."

CALL FOR FUNDS.

To the Locals of the Socialist Party:

Dear Comrades:—You are hereby called upon to contribute funds for the purpose of assisting the Brotherhood of Timber Workers to win the strike. The following extracts from letters from Jay Smith, Secretary of the Brotherhood, will acquaint you with the situation:

"For years the southern forest and lumber workers have been ground down until today they are practically in a state of peonage, a condition that will grow much worse if we lose this fight, while, if we win, hope will flame up in the hearts of the southern mine and other workers, and the entire labor movement will be benefited, for a fighting army will have gained a foothold in the heart of the enemy's country. That you may have some idea of the conditions we are fighting against: We are forced to labor ten to twelve hours a day under the most killing conditions, while our average minimum wage, including skilled and unskilled will not exceed \$1.50 per day. In many places thousands of workers are toiling twelve hours a day for the princely income of \$1.25 per day.

"On top of this infamous wage we are forced to pay for all sorts, kinds and breeds of graft, such as premiums for so-called accidental insurance, fees for imaginary fees to support alleged doctors, and then to pay for all medicines at outrageous prices and to pay whenever we are graciously sent to a public hospital. Then we are forced, under the time-check system, with pay days a month or more apart, to trade in the company stores, where the prices would shame the soul of Shylock, or to have our checks discounted as much as ten to twenty per cent by outside merchants, many of whom are, we believe, secretly working with the local managers and superintendents of the lumber companies. Some companies actually have the gall to force the men to pay 'exchange' on their own bank checks when cashed by their cashiers.

"All civil rights have already been or rapidly are being taken away from us, white as well as colored, the local 'Democratic' authorities considerably deputizing any gunmen nominated by the Lumber Trust for this purpose, so that now we are fighting with our backs literally to the wall, and you must help us or we will lose.

"Knowing our extreme poverty, the Lumber Trust is counting mainly on starvation to whip us back into the mills and forests, and what we appeal to you for in this great hour of need is for funds to keep our forces on the ground until the fight is won, for we have the MEN—all we need is supplies."

National Executive Committee

July 1, 1912. To the National Executive Committee. Dear Comrades: I herewith submit a motion by Hillquit, as follows: "I move that the action of the National Executive Committee disapproving of Mary O'Reilly as a speaker on the Lyceum Lecture Course be reconsidered and that her name be placed on the list of approved speakers for that course. Comment: I was not present at the meeting of the N. E. C. when the action upon the application of Comrade O'Reilly was taken and do not know upon what grounds it was based. I believe Comrade O'Reilly is as well qualified to speak under the auspices of the Lyceum Bureau as any speaker on the approved list."

July 3, 1912. To the National Executive Committee. Dear Comrades: Reporting action taken on communication of June 20, Spargo approves the assignment of circuits; O'Hare approves it with a few suggestions of change. Berger, Harriman, Haywood, Hillquit and Irvine not voting. No action taken. In the absence of definite instructions the tentative assignments of lecturers and subjects will be followed as nearly as practicable. The vote on Tom Clifford and Caroline A. Lowe, whose names were submitted as additional speakers, was as follows: Clifford-Irvine voting yes; Berger, Hillquit and Spargo voting no; O'Hare not voting. Not approved. Lowe-Berger, Hillquit, Irvine, O'Hare and Spargo voting yes; Harriman and Haywood not voting. Approved. I also submit motions by Irvine, as follows: "I move that the National Secretary call the attention of the locals to the fact that for the next few months Everybody's Magazine will publish a debate on Socialism between representatives of the Roman Catholic Church and the Socialist party. Also, that the Metropolitan Magazine, beginning with the July number, takes a decided stand on the side of Socialism. Comment: It has employed a group of Socialist writers to give of their best literary talent. The magazine will be a fine medium by which we can reach hundreds of thousands of people who never see a Socialist publication."

July 6, 1912. To the National Executive Committee. Dear Comrades: I have the following lettergram from the editor of Everybody's Magazine, bearing upon one of the Irvine motions: "Everybody's Magazine earnestly desires that no announcement of Socialist-Catholic debate be made at this time. Since details are not completed and entire plan uncertain, announcement would be premature and might affect arrangements unfavorably. Please regard this request with assurance that first word of release will be forwarded you."

July 10, 1912. To the National Executive Committee. Dear Comrades: I submit the following motion by Harriman: "I move that the National Executive Committee call upon all the locals in the country to contribute funds to the Chicago Daily World for the purpose of buying a large press and equipping that office sufficiently to issue 300,000 papers daily and that the enclosed letter by Charles Edward Russell accompany the appeal. Comment: During the pressmen's strike the Chicago Daily World, formerly Socialist, became the organ of the unions of Chicago. It has made a tremendous fight for labor against capital during the strike and by so doing has won the confidence of the working class of that great city. If the Socialists of the country will equip the office with proper presses and other machines there is little doubt but that a Socialist daily will go into the hands of the vast majority of the organized workingmen in Chicago. The circular letter by Charles Edward Russell is as follows: "Are you informed of the actual situation in regard to the Chicago Daily World? July 15, 1912. To the National Executive Committee: Dear Comrades:—Reporting on Hillquit's motion in regard to placing the name of Mary O'Reilly on the list of approved Lyceum speakers, Harriman, Hillquit, Irvine and Spargo voted yes. Berger, Haywood and O'Hare not voting. Carried. I submit the following motion by Irvine: "I move that a call be sent out to the party membership for funds for the Brotherhood of Timber Workers. Comment: This is the Socialist party's opportunity to do something big for the South."

July 19, 1912. To the National Executive Committee. Dear Comrades: Reporting on Irvine's motions in regard to calling the attention of the locals to the proposed Catholic-Socialist debate in Everybody's Magazine and to the fact that the Metropolitan Magazine takes a decided stand on the side of Socialism, Irvine votes yes; Harriman votes yes in regard to the Metropolitan Magazine and no in regard to Everybody's; Hillquit votes no in regard to Everybody's Magazine and does not vote in regard to the Metropolitan; Berger, Haywood, O'Hare and Spargo not voting. No action taken. I also submit an amendment by Hillquit to the motion of Irvine in regard to the strike of the Brotherhood of Timber Workers, as follows: "I move as an amendment to the motion of Comrade Irvine, submitted under date of July 15, that the letter of Jay Smith addressed to the National Executive Committee and describing the condition of the timber workers in the South, be published in the Bulletin and in the party press. Comment: I do not believe we can afford to issue a direct call for funds during the campaign, no matter how worthy the cause. I think, however, the condition of these timber workers in the South and their needs should be brought to the attention of the Socialist and labor movement at large, and I have no doubt that some good will result from such publication."

July 23, 1912. To the National Executive Committee. Dear Comrades: Reporting on Harriman's motion in regard to issuing a call for funds to buy a printing press for the Chicago Daily World, Harriman, Hillquit and Irvine voted yes; Spargo voted no; Berger, Haywood and O'Hare not heard from. Carried. Comment by Spargo: "I vote no on Harriman's motion to send out an appeal for the Chicago Daily World. I do this with the greatest possible reluctance. If we had the funds available I should offer an amendment to donate a substantial sum from the party treasury. It is very unfortunate that the paper keeps chronically dependent, but it is perhaps unavoidable. However that may be, I feel that to issue at this time two different national appeals for funds, with other appeals pending, would simply mean that neither appeal would command any considerable amount of support. For the moment, in my judgment, preference must be given to the appeal from the striking timber workers."

July 24, 1912. To the National Executive Committee. Dear Comrades: In the State of California there is a contest over the office of State Secretary, F. B. Meriam and T. W. Williams each claiming to be the incumbent of that position. Five members of the State Executive Board have directed me to transact all official business with N. A. Richardson, and I am accordingly doing so.

July 27, 1912. To the National Executive Committee. Dear Comrades: The Branon proposed referendum was the first of three proposed referendums of similar import to receive the required number of seconds. Those proposed by Locals Portsmouth, Ohio, and Poplar Bluff, Mo., have now received the required number also. This raises a new question not covered by constitution or precedent. Each referendum costs the various party organizations, for printing, express, postage, wages, etc., several hundred dollars. To send out two or more of the same intent would be superfluous and confusing, as well as an unnecessary duplication of expense. If those who also seconded the Branon proposal were deducted, the Portsmouth and Poplar Bluff proposals would not have a sufficient number. It seems quite certain that those who seconded all three did so in order to make quite sure that one of them should receive the required number. Under these circumstances, common sense dictates that only one should be submitted, and I shall not submit the last two unless otherwise directed.

Woman's National Committee

Chicago, July 8, 1912. To the Woman's National Committee: Dear Comrades: At the Indianapolis convention I stated to the committee that it was my intention to give up the office of the general correspondent some time before the expiration of my term, perhaps after the fall election was over and the work of the campaign was entirely finished. For various reasons I have decided that it will be best to make the change at an earlier date and therefore I have presented my resignation, to take effect Saturday, August 3. It was with a feeling of deep regret that I give up this work, which, as you all know, has been a deep source of happiness to me. There is no phase of our movement of more vital importance to our cause, and certainly none more dear to me, than that included in the term "Woman's Department." Wherever I may be it will have my most active support.

During the two years, lacking one month, that I have been in charge of this department in the National Office, every assistance has been given our work, both by the National Secretary and the National Executive Committee. Absolute harmony has prevailed and the progress of the work among women has grown steadily to a well organized department of the party work. It is now on a firm basis and is a recognized factor in the local, state and national organizations.

Careful, sympathetic supervision is the main requirement to its continued well being. The eagerness with which the general membership has responded, when its attention has been called to the need of increased agitation and education among women is sufficient guarantee of the necessity for carefully organized effort along this line. With the continuation of the present spirit of harmonious activity in the work among women, untold good to the cause of Socialism and to the party organization must be the result.

July 9, 1912. To the Woman's National Committee. Dear Comrades: The action taken on motions submitted June 26 is as follows: Action taken on Comrade Stern's plan for carrying on the work of International Correspondent: Yes—Simons, Twining, Berger, Brewer, Carr, Branstetter. Not voting—Lewis. Plan adopted. While Comrade Lewis is in Alaska the time allowed for voting upon reports will not permit her replies to reach this office in time for her vote to be counted.

Motion on devising ways and means for procuring Prof. Shedd's services: Yes—Twining, Simons, Carr, Brewer, Branstetter. Not voting—Lewis, Berger. Motion adopted.

Comment by Berger: I cannot vote upon Prof. Shedd's services, or, rather, upon Comrade Twining's motion to secure his services, as I do not feel sufficiently familiar with what he is to do. Comment by Lewis (in answer to report of June 10): I am in favor of Comrade Shedd being appointed General Organizer of Sunday school work. Action on Comrade's Levinger's Plan of Work: Comment by Twining: I approve of Comrade Levinger's Plan of Work for cities. Think it too complex for small towns. Comment by Carr: Adopt it as far as possible. Comment by Brewer: I am not in favor of the Levinger Plan of Work as it seems too complicated to me. Comment by Berger: Comrade Levinger's report is elaborate, but I believe workable where the party is already organized upon a good basis. Much of the work proposed in her outline is in vogue here in Milwaukee. I suggest that the plan be submitted to the different state organizations for their use and information. No one can submit an iron-clad working plan for any locality. Motion by Simons: That Comrade Levinger's and Comrade Wattle's plans be placed together with the committee's old Plan of Work in the hands of Comrades Twining and Branstetter and that they submit a Plan of Work to the committee within two weeks. Action on Comrade Wattle's plan: Comment by Twining: Comrade Wattle's plan is good. I disapprove, however, of Socialists voting to co-operate with woman suffrage societies. We Socialists have always stood for woman suffrage and we can carry on a campaign for it as Socialists. I think, however, we can accept invitations to speak for woman suffrage societies as Socialists. Comment by Berger: I heartily endorse the plan as submitted by the State Committee of the women of Indiana.

Nominees to write campaign leaflet: May Wood-Simons, Mila Tupper, Maynard, Theresa S. Malkiel. Comrade Kate Richards O'Hare has kindly offered to donate the proceeds from ten meetings to the work of the Woman's National Committee, upon the condition that the committee can secure meetings upon dates that will not conflict with those for which she has contracted. For instance, suppose she had a date in Chicago and the day either before or after was vacant. She will fill either of these dates if the committee can arrange for a meeting within easy reach of Chicago. She will ask nothing but her expenses, all the proceeds going to the Woman's National Committee. I am requesting Comrade O'Hare to submit a written plan, so that your committee will have a clear understanding

of the best course to pursue in taking advantage of this generous offer. Comrade Whitehead begins her work in Kansas on July 8. The enclosed circular letters have been sent out to the secretaries of the locals where she is to speak. As soon as Comrade Twining's dates are received, similar circulars will be sent over her route. July 24, 1912. To the Woman's National Committee. Dear Comrades: The vote upon motions submitted July 9 is as follows: Motion that Comrade Levinger's and Comrade Wattle's plans be placed, together with the committee's old Plan of Work, in the hands of Comrades Twining and Branstetter and that they submit a Plan of Work to the committee within two weeks. Yes—Branstetter, Brewer, Carr and Simons. Not voting—Berger. Motion carried. Comment by Twining: As I leave for Ohio the 19th of July, I shall not have time to help with the Plan of Work. Am sorry. Comrade Branstetter, with her children, is in the country and will not return until August 3. As we are out of the old leaflets and are in daily need of the new ones, I shall combine the three plans as suggested in the above motion and submit it to you within a few days. I do this upon the request of Comrades Branstetter and Twining. Comrade Simons is elected to prepare the campaign pamphlet. She received three votes, Comrade Malkiel one. Comrade Simons is herewith notified of her election. Comrade Lewis' vote on the motions submitted June 26 reached here July 22. She votes in favor of each motion.

New Business. Comrade Ethel Whitehead is meeting with good results from her work in Kansas. She reports the organization of local committees at Dodge City, Garden City, Lakin and Nickerson. The enclosed outline of Socialist school work has been suggested by Comrade Shedd, at my request. According to this plan, a new department in the National Office should be opened, having in charge the organization of Socialist schools and Young People's Socialist Leagues. I do not believe it will be feasible to do this until after election, as all available funds are being used for the regular work of the office, the Lyceum, and the campaign. But Comrade Shedd can be routed, as our women organizers are being routed—to do regular lecture work but to concentrate their efforts along one special line. Our women organizers concentrate in trying to reach the women. Comrade Shedd might specialize in directing the sentiment for systematic educational work among children and young men and women. If the Woman's National Committee desires to place him in the field for this work the National Office will endeavor to secure work for him under the direction of the various state secretaries, working a few weeks in each state. After election it may be found advisable to open up this department in the office. Comrade Shedd will have placed his plans for the work before the locals he has visited and all will be in readiness to obtain results in organizing Socialist schools and leagues. In Comrade Work's report to the Indianapolis convention, he says: "Consideration should be given to the matter of creating departments in the National Office for the furtherance and development of the work of the Intercollegiate Socialist Society and of the Young People's Socialist Leagues. These excellent activities ought to be carried on as integral parts of the organization." If you desire to recommend that Comrade Shedd be sent out by the National Office as a special organizer to develop the work of Socialist schools, a motion to that effect is in order. The committee having in charge the collecting of slides for stereopticon views will appreciate your co-operation. Any pictures of social conditions, the industrial struggle, charts and diagrams, cartoons, etc., should be sent to John Soargo, Nestledown, Old Bennington, Vermont.

Lowe having, I regret to say, resigned the position of General Correspondent of the Woman's National Committee, I have appointed Winnie E. Branstetter to fill the vacancy. As you know, Comrade Branstetter has been a member of your committee ever since its origin in 1908. For the first two years of its existence she acted as secretary of the committee without compensation. She is in close touch with the work and, I believe, well fitted in every way for the place. The provision now in force regarding the appointment of the General Correspondent is that she shall be selected by the National Secretary, with the approval of the Woman's National Committee. Dear Comrades: Reporting on the appointment of Winnie E. Branstetter to fill the vacancy made by the resignation

of Caroline A. Lowe as General Correspondent of the Woman's National Committee, the appointment has been approved by Comrades Brewer, Carr, Simons and Twining. Berger, Branstetter and Lewis not heard from. Action confirmed. Fraternally submitted, JOHN M. WORK, National Secretary.

Proposed National Committee Motion. By John R. McKeown of Pennsylvania. "I move that the wages of all speakers and organizers sent out by the National Office or any department of it shall be \$6.00 per day and railroad fare; they to pay their own hotel bills and other incidental expenses."

Rules of National Committee. 1. (National Constitution, Art. IV, Sec. 5). No motion shall be submitted to a referendum of the National Committee by correspondence unless supported within thirty days by not less than five members of the National Committee from three different states. 2. When a National Committeeman makes a motion by correspondence it shall be published in the next weekly Bulletin. Before the ballots for the said motion are sent out any National Committeeman may send in his comment on said motion. If the comment exceeds one hundred words it shall be filed for reference, but not published. Otherwise, it shall be sent out along with the ballots. 3. The National Secretary may declare a motion out of order if the same is in conflict with the Constitution of the party or the rules of the National Committee. 4. A motion to lay a motion on the table shall be out of order. 5. Motions to amend, defer, postpone or declare a motion out of order shall be, with the exception of the comments by the originators of such motions, not commentable, must reach the National Office before ballots of original motion are sent out, and the ballots for such motion, with comments, shall be sent out with the ballots of original motion. Should more than one amendment be submitted, which, if adopted, would be conflicting, the one receiving the most votes shall be declared adopted. 6. In order that all states securing additional National Committeemen may have an equal opportunity to acquire their additional representation at the same time, the call for nominations for the election of National Committeemen in each state shall be issued after the apportionment of National Committeemen has been made by the National Secretary. 7. No motion declaratory of the principles or the policy of the party shall be submitted unless seconded by one-sixth of the members of the National Committee. 8. A National Committeeman may withdraw a motion made by himself before it is submitted, provided it is not seconded. 9. A motion ordering an inquiry into the state of the organization in any state or territory shall also set a date for the termination of such inquiry. If such motion is adopted, no other motion relating to such inquiry shall be in order before the determination of such inquiry unless seconded by one-sixth of the members of the National Committee. 10. All elections of officers, delegates, committees, etc., shall be by preferential ballot. Each National Committeeman may nominate as many candidates as there are positions to be filled. The names of candidates shall be placed on the ballot in alphabetical order. Each National Committeeman voting shall write the figure "1" opposite the name of his first choice, the figure "2" opposite the name of his second choice, the figure "3" opposite the name of his third choice, and so on, indicating his relative preference for each and every candidate on the ballot. If he fails to vote on all candidates his ballot shall not be counted. The candidates receiving the lowest sum total of numbers opposite their names shall be elected. In case of a tie, the same shall be decided by lot between the candidates, under direction of the National Secretary. 11. Whenever a protest is lodged with the National Secretary against any comrade holding any position under the jurisdiction of the National Committee or against any comrade nominated for any such position, the National Secretary shall before submitting a protest to the members of the committee for their consideration, give the comrade against whom the protest is directed opportunity to submit a statement in his or her behalf should he or she desire to do so. In case of protests against nominees for any position, this right shall belong to the nominator, whether such nominator be a party member, National Committeeman, or division of the party duly recognized as having the right to nominate candidates. 12. Whenever any motion is submitted to the National Committee which affects the standing of an organization or member of the Socialist party, reasonable opportunity to make a statement shall be granted to such organization or member before the ballots are sent out to the members of the committee, and such statement shall be sent out together with the ballots. All evidence must be sent through the National Office. 13. If, when the ballots for any motion are sent out, any state shall be three months or more in arrears in its reports or dues, the committeemen from that state shall not be entitled to vote on such motion. 14. The granting of a charter in Los Angeles County to the Typographical Union I regard as entirely unconstitutional.

Minutes of the National Campaign Committee

SESSION OF SUNDAY, JULY 7, 1912

Meeting was called to order by Campaign Manager Barnes at 11:20.

Motion: That the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting be postponed until later. Adopted.

A communication from Comrade Debs to Comrade Barnes was read.

Motion that Comrade Debs be asked to be present at this meeting. Adopted.

Motion: That the Campaign Manager be instructed to wire Comrade Debs asking his attendance at this meeting, and also that an endeavor be made to get him on the long distance telephone. Adopted.

Motion: That similar efforts be made to secure the attendance of Comrade Seidel. Adopted.

The question of editing the manuscripts for the pamphlets to be issued during the campaign was taken up.

Motion: That all literature prepared by the Campaign Committee be duplicated and one copy sent to each of the members of the Editing Committee of the National Executive Committee at the same time it is sent to the members of the Campaign Committee, with a statement that the same is under consideration by the Campaign Committee according to the motion passed at the joint meeting of the committees, and saying that unless an objection is heard within ten days the same will be considered as approved by the Editing Committee. Adopted.

Comrade Thompson brought to the attention of the committee a manuscript for a pamphlet containing a story of Comrade Berger's work in Congress, as told by newspaper clippings.

Motion: That we request Comrade Thompson to prepare his manuscript on the Congressional pamphlet provided for at the joint meeting and present the two pamphlets for consideration at the same time. Adopted.

Motion: That the manuscript submitted by Comrade Kate Richards O'Hare take the regular course. Adopted.

A communication was read from the Library of Original Sources.

Motion: That they be informed that it is impossible for the Campaign Committee to take part in any proposition to officially endorse the sale of any literature other than that directly connected with the party. Adopted.

Comrade Caroline A. Lowe was granted the floor and made a report of the plans laid out and the material so far secured for the Campaign Book.

Motion: That a reply to the speeches of acceptances of the old party candidates be written by Comrade Simons. Adopted.

Motion: That the secretary of the Campaign Committee send to the Superintendent of Public Documents ten dollars and ask for catalogues and census reports. Adopted.

Adjourned at 1 p. m. to meet at 2 p. m.

Afternoon Session.

The committee reconvened pursuant to adjournment.

The minutes of the meeting of June 17 were read and approved.

Discussion of the Campaign Book was resumed.

Motion: That Comrade Berger be asked to supply a comparative study of the platforms of the old parties. Adopted.

Motion: That Comrade May Wood-Simons be asked to prepare an article for the Campaign Book on the subject of education. Adopted.

Motion: That Comrade Kirkpatrick be requested to gather for the Campaign Book a collection of quotations from Ward's works, to be used as fillers. Adopted.

Motion: That the question of compensation to authors be left in the hands of the Campaign Committee. Adopted.

Theodore Debs was granted the floor on the question of the route of Comrade Debs and requested that the dates beginning about August 27th be divided into three sections, allowing about four days for rest between each and that only six days a week be required for speaking.

Motion: That the Campaign Manager be instructed to arrange as nearly as possible to give Comrade Debs two periods of four days each for rest, dividing the campaign into three periods. Adopted.

Pursuant to request of Comrade Debs, the following motions were adopted:

Motion: That the Campaign Manager be instructed to have a provision in all contracts for Debs meetings that there shall be no more than one speaking place in an evening. Adopted.

Motion: That all the contracts provide that all net profits of the meetings from admission or collections, shall be divided pro rata thirty per cent to the state organization. Adopted.

Adjourned at 6:15 to meet at 7:15.

The committee reconvened at 7:30.

Comrade Barnes read copy of his letter to Comrade J. Keir Hardie, containing an invitation from the Campaign Committee and National Executive Committee to make a tour of this country during the present campaign.

Communication from Ellis B. Harris, of Superior, Wis., relating to a campaign song.

Communication read from the Italian Section. Comrade Corti, National Translator-Secretary, was granted the floor, and reported as to the activities of the Italian comrades and requested \$250 to assist in carrying on their plans for routing a speaker.

Campaign Manager Barnes reported on finances, showing the amount received and expended since opening the headquarters, up to and including June

30, also the amount on hand Saturday, July 6.

Motion that in response to the request of the committee from the Italian Section, the committee be informed that it is the sense of the Campaign Committee that it does not have the power to make the appropriation requested. Adopted.

Comrade Frank Petrich, National Translator-Secretary of the South Slavic Section, was granted the floor and requested financial assistance toward bringing a lecturer from the old country.

Motion that this matter be postponed until the next regular meeting. Adopted.

Comrade Sigurd Russell was granted the floor and spoke on the subject of organizing the French people. He stated he had been appointed for this work by the National Executive Committee, but needed literature for distribution, and requested assistance from the Campaign Committee in publishing some leaflets in the French language. He stated that the platform should be translated into French, also that one other leaflet should be at once prepared. He recommended that Comrade Bassett, National Committeeman of Louisiana, be routed in the South for work among the French people.

Motion: That \$50.00 be appropriated for the printing of a leaflet in the French language. Adopted.

Motion: That compensation for a stenographer and publicity men to accompany Comrade Seidel begin July 21. Adopted.

Motion: That the publicity man be allowed \$5.00 per day and expenses. Adopted.

The question of routing national speakers was taken up and discussed in connection with the elections in Arkansas, Maine and Vermont.

Motion: That two speakers for two weeks each be supplied to Arkansas, and that one speaker for two weeks be supplied each to Maine and Vermont.

Campaign Manager reported that there were some protests regarding the terms for dates.

Communications from S. Liberty, of New York City, relating to stereopticons. Postponed until next meeting. Adjourned at 10:30.

Monday Afternoon Session.

Meeting called to order by Comrade Barnes at 3:30.

Comrades Branstetter, Rodriguez, Thompson, Simons and Debs present. Comrade Thompson elected chairman.

Comrade Barnes reported that it was decided to have Comrades Debs and Seidel, together with the resident members of the Campaign Committee, meet at headquarters on Saturday, July 20. He also reported concerning correspondence received concerning a Microcosm, prepared by J. W. McCaskey, of Pittsburgh, Pa., which Comrade Debs has seen in part and highly recommended.

Motion: That Comrade McCaskey be invited to bring a part of his Microcosm here on the 20th. Adopted.

Communication from Local New Castle, Pa., relating to the payment for the Debs meeting held there.

Motion: That the charges for the Debs meeting in New Castle be \$70.00. Adopted.

Comrade Barnes reported that a number of insistent letters and telegrams has been received from Local New York City, requesting that immediate assignment be made of Comrades Debs and Seidel for September 29th, and that \$350.00 had been set as terms.

Motion: That the price of \$350.00 for the New York City meeting be maintained. Adopted.

Report was made that all states had been circularized with the exception of Illinois, in which state the Campaign Committee was not permitted to circularize for funds.

Motion: That the route as prepared by Comrade Branstetter with the cooperation of Comrade Debs be endorsed by the committee as a tentative route. Adopted.

Motion: That Comrade Louis Kopelin in addition to his work on the Campaign Book, be asked to prepare a leaflet giving the record of the present Congress. Adopted.

Motion: That a card be prepared, the substance of which will be a question as to why the Republican and Democratic members of Congress did not enact in legislation the things which they demand in their platforms. Adopted.

Motion: That information be obtained concerning Woodrow Wilson's education policy at Princeton.

Comrade Debs excused at 4:30.

Communication from N. Juel Christensen, National Translator-Secretary of the Scandinavian Section, reference a tour for Comrade Fritjof Werenskiold.

Motion: That Comrade Werenskiold be sent to North Dakota. Adopted.

The question of literature taken up and discussed.

Motion: That the speech of Comrade Debs at Riverview Park, Chicago, be made into a leaflet at the earliest possible date and furnished for free distribution. Adopted.

Motion: That the Campaign Manager be instructed to write to Isador Ladoff, saying that the committee has already made arrangements for all speakers that can be handled, but that if opportunity affords to make use of his services the committee will be glad to do so.

Communication from T. Russell Williams, of England, relating to a tour of this country. Referred to the Campaign Manager.

Communication from Gordon Nye relating to the news and cartoon service of the Labor Syndicate.

Motion: That the Campaign Manager be instructed to communicate immediately with the manager of the Labor Syndi-

cate informing him that the committee has taken no action looking to the furnishing of cartoons free as yet. And that final action be deferred until the next meeting, at which meeting the Syndicate manager be asked to be present, with all necessary data and information. Adopted.

Motion: That the next meeting of the Campaign Committee be held August 3rd, beginning at 10 a. m. Adopted.

Communication from Mary W. Ovington, relating to a leaflet for the negroes. Received and filed.

Adjourned at 5:20.

Gentlemen:—We submit you herewith report of our examination of the "Books of Account" of the Socialist Party for the three months ended June 30, 1912, including the following exhibits and schedules:

- Exhibit "A"—Statement of Condition, National Office.
- Exhibit "B"—Statement of Condition, Lyceum Department.
- Schedule No. 1—Accounts Payable, National Office.
- Schedule No. 2—Accounts Payable, Lyceum Department.
- Schedule No. 3—Appropriations Unpaid.

We have endeavored to display on Exhibits "A" and "B" under the proper classification of Assets and Liabilities, the condition as disclosed by the Books of Account at the end of the period under review.

Owing to the absence of an inventory at June 30, 1912, it was necessary for us to accept the published estimated inventory of June 30, as shown in the July, 1912, Bulletin.

The item of Accounts Receivable in the Lyceum Department of \$8,431.35 due from locals, represents, in the main, subscription cards for last season. As the season is closed and the cards now have no value to the locals, we consider there is some question as to their collectability.

The item of Subscription Cards, New York Call, of \$851.00 is subject to a possible revision, owing to their realizable value being considerably less than shown by the books.

SCOPE OF SERVICE.

National Office—We verified the footings of the cash records; verified the entries of cancelled checks on cash records; reviewed the signatures of all cancelled checks and verified the authority for such expenditures, accepting the authority of John M. Work, Secretary, for payments to organizers for the amounts as published in the Monthly Bulletin. We verified the bank reconciliation at June 30; the disbursements of \$12,282.21 from the Mileage Fund for delegates to the Indianapolis convention; examined the journal and determined the accuracy and authority for all entries, including appropriations for various special funds as published in the Monthly Bulletin; examined the payments from the petty cash fund and reconciled the balance on hand at the date of audit; verified the accuracy of distribution of items charged through the journal and cash book; verified the postings from the cash book and journal to the general ledger.

Lyceum Department—We verified the footings of cash records; verified the entries of the cancelled checks on cash records; reviewed the signatures of all cancelled checks and the authority for all expenditures; verified the bank balance at June 30; examined the petty cash fund disbursements and verified the balance of petty cash on hand at the date of audit; verified postings from the cash book and journal to the general ledger; examined all journal entries and compared same with authority therefor. An error in the posting of an item of \$50.00 to the wrong account was detected and the proper correction made, under the supervision of our accountant.

We are pleased to state that we found the books in good condition, with evidence of every effort being made to properly record the transactions of the National Office and Lyceum Department. On receipt of an order a complete set of these blanks will be made out at one writing on the typewriter. The first two going to the Shipping Department; the Shipping Clerk will note the necessary memoranda on the second copy and return it to the office, at which time the Third, Fourth and Fifth sheets will be removed from the current file; the Invoice being mailed to the customer, the Ledger Sheet going to the Bookkeeper, and the Collection Record Clerk, who will file it in its proper order. The Shipping Record will be filed by date shipped as a ready reference in tracing a lost or damaged shipment.

Attached to this set of forms is a memorandum as to the quantities we would recommend, also Binders and Indexes necessary to the convenient handling of these forms.

NATIONAL OFFICE.

This record constitutes a set of four forms, as follows:
1st—Label.
2d—Shipping Record.
3d—Invoice.
4th—Ledger.

At the time an order is received the entire set will be made up on the typewriter at one operation. The Label and Shipping Record being sent direct to the Shipping Department. When shipment is made and proper data noted on the Shipping Record, it will be returned to the office, at which time the Bookkeeper will remove the Invoice and Ledger copies from the current file, sending the Invoice to the customer, and filing the Ledger Sheet in the permanent binder with the Unpaid Accounts. The Shipping Order will then be filed by date shipped in order to provide a ready reference for tracing lost or damaged shipment.

In order to provide for the proper credit of returned items or allowances which you may at any time find it necessary to make, we suggest the use of a duplicate set of forms, the original of which is similar to the Invoice Sheet in each set, using a different color of paper and substituting the word "Credit" for "Charge"; the Duplicate to be a plain sheet, which will be filed in the Ledger as a Credit—this being on a different color paper will be readily distinguished by the Bookkeeper from the Charge Sheets.
