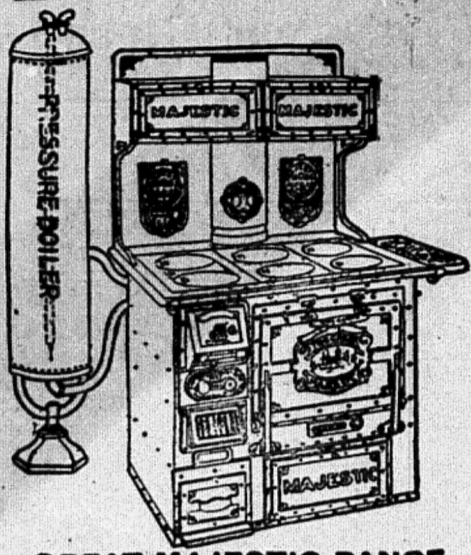

HEADQUARTERS BULLETIN.

National Headquarters, Socialist Party, Chicago, Ill., July 9, 1904.
The California state convention will be held at Oakland September 5-Labor Day.
Reports from Indiana, Iowa, Nebraska and West Virginia state conventions, held July 4, show these to have been well attended, successful and enthusiastic.

National Organizer Wilkins reports encouragingly about his work of getting the West Virginia organization into good shape, and predicts substantial progress for the future.

The printed report of the national convention proceedings has been unavoidably delayed beyond the time it was expected to be ready. However, it is assured that another ten days will see the book out of the bindery, and all orders will then be promptly filled. Local Hudson County, New Jersey, has ordered and paid for fifty copies of the report, and also ordered five sets of books for branch organizations. This is a model for other locals to try to follow. Knowledge of details in methods and party history makes for firm and solid organization.

The national quorum met at national headquarters July 9, and a full report of the meeting will be sent to all organizations, as usual.

The referendum upon the platform and trades union resolutions adopted by the Chicago convention closes at national headquarters July 20, and the result will be immediately announced. The vote upon the constitution closes in the locals July 25 and at national headquarters August 4.

Hereafter receipts for the campaign fund will be reported in the campaign bulletin.

Contributions to the national campaign fund are not confined to the United States, for within a few days there came amounts from Canada and Alaska, showing how widespread is the interest in the Socialist campaign in the states.
Eugene V. Debs, presidential candidate, will formally open his campaign at Indianapolis, Ind., early in September. It will be a notable occasion as Comrade Debs can be depended upon to do justice to it.
Ben Hanford, vice-presidential candidate, begins his work as a vice-presidential candidate on July 17, at Rockland, Me., afterward filling the following dates: 13, Bath; 19, Lewisburg; 20, Portland; 21, Biddeford; 23, Brockton, Mass. (Socialist carnival); 25, Nashua, N. H.; 26, Manchester, N. H.; 27, Concord, N. H. From July 30 to August 4 he will be in Vermont, and then go to Danville, Ill., for August 7, speaking at a Chautauqua that afternoon. Hanford will then tour in southern Illinois, Tennessee, Missouri, Iowa and Minnesota.

John Spargo will begin a Western tour, beginning the end of August, which will take him to Montana. Applications for dates should be made direct to the national secretary.
Franklin H. Wentworth has placed himself at the disposal of the national headquarters for lecture dates from September 1 until November 7. From September 1 to 15 he will work under the direction of the New York state committee. Wentworth will give at least a month in the Western states, and applications should be filed at once.
There are requests for John W. Brown from the Middle Western states, and dates during the campaign will be arranged by the national secretary.
Louis Goziosi, of Charleroi, Pa., will tour the Middle Western states as French organizer, and under the direction of the national secretary. Goziosi is an agitator of experience and ability, and it is desired that he be brought into contact with the French workmen during the campaign. Address the national secretary.

Get Ready for Campaign Work.

All over the country there is an awakening and stirring of Socialist activity. Gradually the state organizers are getting their plans under way and preparing to make the months of August, September and October memorable. And now is the time to prepare. Waiting until the last moment means getting left at the last moment. Locals desiring speakers, and especially certain ones, should notify their state secretaries immediately. The officers should organize their forces for effective literature distribution. Act upon and answer all official communications promptly. Decide upon the exact number of campaign rallies you intend to hold, fix the exact dates, engage your speakers, then work to make the meetings successful. Don't depend altogether upon outside speakers.

There is latent talent in every local that only needs a chance to be proven valuable. If there is a certain outside speaker you think you should have, apply for him at once, otherwise you will have no right to kick if you get no speakers at all. And every local and campaign committee should have copies of the new leaflet gotten out by the National Headquarters "How to Arrange Socialist Meetings." This is what is needed in every local. The leaflet was prepared by Comrade Charles R. Martin, Assistant in the National Office, who is a stickler for system, which is what is needed most in the party.
