## ARTHUR H. WILKIE

#### Socialist Party Candidate for Judge of the Seventh Judicial District of Idaho

Born at Syracuse, N. Y., 1873. Parents settled at Dale, Idaho, 1883. when "Art" was 10 years old. He is thus by long residence in Southwestern Idaho thoroughly familiar with all local conditions and fitted to pass judgment in that large class of litigated cases which involve a thousand details peculiar to irrigation districts, land titles, sheep ranges, timber claims, mining rights, etc.

Mr. Wilkie learned the printer's trade in Boise, being four years in

ture. He stumped the county and carried every precinct in which he spoke except Weiser and lacked only a few votes of election, receiving, with one exception, the highest vote on his ticket.

In '98 he was permanent secretary of the Populist State Convention, as well as delegate to both county conventions and Secretary of nominating convention. But he bolted from the latter when a resolution was passed indorsing the Democratic-Silver-Republican State ticket, which he considered an unholy alliance.

After '98, Mr. Wilkie was not active in Populist politics, though he was made a member of the executive committee of the Middle-of-the-Roaders in 1900 and was placed on the County ticket for representative.

Since 1901, he has been identified with the Socialist Party and was its nominee for county attorney at the last election.

Comrade Wilkie writes: "I am very anxious to see our party make a strong and permanent growth, and believe all that is necessary is to inform the people in regard to the principles of Socialism.

"I find that those who criticise Socialism most are the ones who know least about it, and in nine cases out of ten, they denounce it for something which we do not advocate."




