Mr. Lloyd, author of "Wealth and Commonwealth" fectured in Seattle last Wednesday evening. He lauded New Zealand as an advanced country, a blessed "Newest England." He fails to see that New Zealand is not typical of modern life as developeed in Europe and America. It is a land of small agriculturists, where there is no large proletariat. The revolution accomplished there in 1890 was a small proprietor revolution against the large landed proprietors. Here is the typical field for the single tax, which is an admirable method for the prevention of land monopoly in primitive conditions, bit out-of-date and helpless in the capitalistic modern world. Mr. Lloyd testified explicitly that in New Zealand the class of small farmers was the dominant class numerically and hence, of course, politically.

Zealand the class of small larmers was the dominant class numerically and hence, of course, politically. In Europe and America, on the other hand, the economic development has proceeded so far that the wage working class, the propertiless class, including the most of the so-called farmers also, is the dominant class numerically, and hence will soon be dominant politically. The Single Tax is the proper thing for New Zealand at its stage of economic development, as it would have been good for America half a century ago, when the class of small property holders was the dominant class in America.

Just so, and for the same reason, that it represents the dominant class, produced by economic conditions, So-cialism is the proper and inevitable gospel for today.

It was the constant effort of these foul sheets to stir up an unreasonable pas-sion over the death of the chief execuson over the death of the chief exces-tive in order that the way might be paved for the establishment of a strong government. Organizations of all finds were encouraged to pass illy con-sidered and rashly worded resolutions calling for legislation. To the credit of the trade union movement it may be of the trade union movement it may be said that only a few labor organizations were trapped into passing anything more than mere expressions of sym-pathy. The Building Trades Council of St. Louis was one of the few except-tions. This body is unfortunately untions. This body is unfortunately un-der the influence of a few politicians who seek to make the labor movement an aid to their own aggrandizement. These politicians must of course always be on the popular side in order to reach the pie counter and in the present exthe pie counter and in the citement it was an easy matter for them to induce the Building Trades Council to pass a resolution which to many people appeared harmless, but which will act as a boomerang against trades unions. The last clause of the colution reads as follows:
"Resolved, That we, as union men

This is the kind of legislation the workingmen of this country will get as "measures to suppress anarchy," and resolutions like those of the B. T. C. resolutions like those of the B. I.-C. will be used as a pretext for its passage. When the B. T. C. asks the trades unions to suppress the discussion of anything "even suggestive of the tenets of anarchy" it is affording the capitalist class who control the government today ample excuse for the passage of laws against the promulgation of anything "even suggestive of anarchy." Once these laws are passed it will soon be found that, to the capitalist class, who are in office and do the interpreting of laws, nothing is more "suggestive of the tenets of anarchy" than a laboring man who goes on strike. How easy it will be to haul a member of the Building Trades Council off to jail, when he tries to induce a scab to leave his work, on the grounds that his action is anar-

Wake up, wake up, you members of the Building arades, and see what your corrupt leaders are doing! Can you not see that they are only using you as a tool to advance their individual interests? What do they care for you, or for trades unionism, as long as they can curry favor with your enemies by beaying you?
