EXPLANATORY

Though we receive nothing but commendation for the paper, it is possible our comrades and friends may look on the growing scarcity of reading matter and the continued encroachment of ads with the apprehension that soon there will be nothing to the paper but the advertising.

There may also be some uncertainty caused by the irregular appearance of "The Socialist" and by the sometimes incoherent jumble of its contents.

So, this explanation.

On our arrival in Seattle we thought-and so announcedthat the financial problem which had always hitherto bothered the paper had been solved by the formation of a stock company which would put in a printing plant, do a job printing business as well as print our own paper, and use the money which the working class would otherise give to capitalist printers to maintain their own press.

After about nine months of faithful attention to the affairs of the Trustee Printing Company, Comrade Wagenknecht, who was Business Manager, felt that he could no longer shoulder the burden, and resigned. There being no one else ready at the time to do the work, Comrade Ault accepted the position and added its duties to his already well-filled day's work as Managing Editor, Circulation Manager and Printer. The income was not sufficient to justify the employment of any additional help at that time, as payments on stock had almost entirely ceased and Comrade Ault struggled along as best he could. The paper naturally deteriorated some, as all attention had to be concentrated on getting enough from day to day to get out each issue. Our editor, Comrade Titus, on his return from Boise, was immediately involved in financial difficulties, due largely to his devotion to the movement and the paper, and as a result of which he has recently lost practically all he had in the world. In addition to this his incarceration in Seattle's vile jail has physically incapacitated him from giving much of his time to the paper.

Hence names have not been put on the mailing list promptly: letters, many of them important, have not been answered promptly, if at all; the paper has hardly appeared on the same day of the week two weeks in succession, orders for books have not been filled on time; orders for printing have not been filled on time; in fact, hardly anything has been done when it should have been done, and many things which were important to do have been left entirely undone.

Notwithstanding this the paper has appeared each week, and by pinching here and saving there the bills have been met and something paid each month on the accumulated indebtedness. Comrade Al Ball, a practical pressman, volunteered his services and has helped to build up a job printing business. This has made it possible to add to the office force Comrade Lulu Ault, who is rapidly systematizing the work on the mailing list and gradually overcoming all errors in that important part of our work. In the latter part of the past year Mr. F. C. LaPine, a Socialist sympathizer, and an expert advertising solicitor, tendered his services-the result of his work you see.

The combined efforts of these workers have finally put us in a position where we can'at least breathe freely. The financial problem has been solved. The current bills are met promptly every month and a respectable showing is made on old accounts The paper for the first time in years pays its entire mechanical expense. The job printing pays the rent and the wages. have an opportunity to secure a good press—one that will print the paper—at a bargain, and we are practically assured that an old friend of the paper will lend us the money to secure it. We are almost free!

We ask our comrades to wait but a little while longer and we will increase the size of the paper, so as to give as much reading matter with the ads as we used to when the ads were not so numerous. We will soon answer your letters promptly; get your the same week they are sent; mail your book orders the day they are received; send your printing with as great dispatch as is compatible with good work; get out the best Socialist paper in the country—in fact, do all the things we should like to do, but have not been able heretofore to do because of lack of funds

But all this work will require workers-and machinery. We need a first-class bookkeeper and stenographer, and a good, all-around printer, both Socialists, who will be willing to work for what the rest of us in the office get-a mere living. And a mere living means a mere living with us. We need, in order to supplement and make profitable the work of the big presswhen we get it-a paper cutter and a wire stitcher. The first for trimming and cutting paper books, and its name implies, and the latter for binding books and pamphlets. We need more type to set up the great number of ads we are getting. We need labor saving office devices.

These things cost money. We have done our part—with your help—in making the paper-financially secure. We are carrying all the burden our shoulders will bear in settling up the accumulated indebtedness of the company. In order to make our work further effective, in order to do the work we started out to do in the first place, we will have to have more assistance

Many of you are stockholders who have never finished paying for your stock. Has it ever occurred to you that you OWE us that much-that we started in business trusting in your pledge to put up that much money? Some of you are capable subscription hustlers, who have hesitated to send in subs, think-ing the paper would not live; others of you can lend us money in sums ranging from \$10.00 to \$100.00; many of you ought to be stockholders, but are not; and some of you can dig down in your pockets, even if it is a time of panic, and DONATE anything from a dollar to \$10.00.

We want to thank those comrades who have answered our calls for assistance in the past. We appreciated your help, even if we could not find time to write and tell you about it. And we make this explanation to our readers, trusting they will forgive us for our shortcomings in the past, and assist us in doing the things we want to do in the future.



AS TO HATRED

By Tom Sladden

Comrade John M. Work, in National Weekly Bulletin, dated February 22nd, comes forward again in defense of his brotherly love proposition as against that nasty philosophy of hate. We will skip over his explanation of mental and manual work which he says is used to "disarm our critics" and take up his proposition: "Class consciousness is not class hatred. I do not see how a believer in industrial evolution can hate auybody for being in position he is bound to be in. To do so is entirely

Let us see who is unscientific? We hate a coyote, a rattlesnake, a skunk for one and the same reason. They interfere with our material well-being and the degree of hatred we bear for these different animals and reptiles is determined entirely by the amount of harm they do or danger they engender to the individual or community. The coyote in a Zoological garden is not an object of hatred to the visitor to, the park. But to the farmer whose chicken coop he exploits, whose lambs he appropriates, he is an object of hatred. Yet the coyote is like the capitalist, ne is what he is bound to be. He is hated by the farmer because his interests and the farmer's interests are diametrically opposed.

To be a successful coyote and to perpetuate his race and species he must have certain characteristics and a peculiar nature especially adapted to getting a farmer's pullets and getting away again. Otherwise he would become a rug or a mink boa.

Likewise with the capitalist. He must have certain characteristics and a peculiar nature especially adapted to getting in his own possession material wealth which is the result of someone else's labor or he might become a blanket stiff, and he is hated by the working class for the same reason that the coyote is hated by the farmer. His interest and the wage worker's interest conflict the same as do the the interest of the farmer and the coyote. It is useless to tell me that I would do what I would have to. Certainly if I was a capitalist I would plunder wage workers and if was a coyote I would plunder hen houses.

As a coyote and a plunderer of hen houses of the farmer I would get what was coming to me if the farmer and I ever came together, and as capitalist and a plunderer of wage workers I would get what was coming to me if the wage worker and I ever came together. But this hatred can be expressed and acted upon in different ways. The farmer may froth at the mouth and abuse his family because some coyote has swiped his chickens, or he may set about it systematically to build strong fences and hen houses and get a good dog. But he will do no good going around the country telling about the brotherly love that should exist between coyotes and farmers, and that the coyote was a very good animal but had a bad instinct, and what we should do was to change the instinct. If the farmer gets a good dog and attends to his fences and hen houses he will orce his hated enemy to move away or find some other means of gaining a livelihood. The working man may froth at the mouth and do material damage to some individual capitalist, or he may build a strong fence against him. He may so organize his forces on the economic and political field that the species of human coyote known as the capitalist will be driven away and this hated enemy of the working class driven to ne other means of gaining a livelihood.

The capitalist is a capitalist because he is fitted to be a capitalist. He is the survival after society has been sifted. There are exceptions, many, of them, but in dealing with abstract questions we must deal with the general with the understanding that exceptions exist.

The capitalist becomes a capitalist because he is peculiarly adapted to succeed in a scheme of plundering his fellows. His morality, his religion, his code of ethics are simply reflections cast from his method of gaining a living. He is best fitted to survive as a capitalist who puts and in your sugar, who robs the cradle and the grave to obtain labor power for his factory, who drives your sons to penitentiaries, your daughters to brothels, who sits in an office and cold-bloodedly schemes to cause a great war that will drench a land with blood and fill a nation with widows and orphans. He makes honor and virtue a commodity. He subsidizes your press, prostitutes your pulpits and fills your schools and colleges Murphy Wine & Liquor Co. with infantile brained intellectuals whose teachings lead astray the feet of

The slave will always be a slave until he hates his And when that hate of masters becomes general the wage slave class will smash the chains which bind them like the tide washes away the sand house which the little children have built upon the shore. No sentiment, no brotherly love, no golden rules, but stern necessity. Some capitalists will desert their own class, but they will find that their own class will hate them as traitors to their class far more, if anything, than did the working class ever hate them as upholders of the capitalistic class. In concluding I will quote stanzas of a poem by Mrs. Hulse which was written

> > "His face bears the scars of life's battle-They were made by privation and care; Yet shines through his eyes the brave spirit That fears not to do and to dare.

Would you trace the deep tide of his courage? I can show you the source undefiled; In the soiled, grimy hand of the toiler Is the little white hand of the child!

No rings on the thin little fingers On the wrist shines no glittering band; Yet dearer than diamonds and rubies, The touch of the little white hand.

He thinks, as more fondly and closely The delicate fingers are pressed, Of tiny white hands that lie folded And still on a cold little breast.
