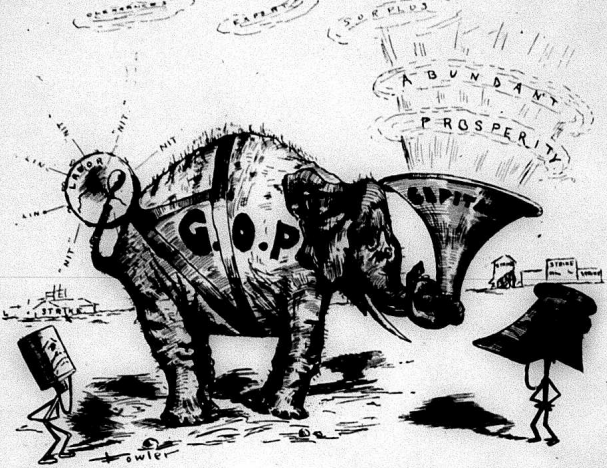

REPORT FROM THE BATTLE FIELD

Washington, Wash., Oct. 15, 1902.
Editor Socialist:
Dear Comrade: On Monday evening the Salvation Army again held forth on the streets of Hoxham, having carried away our box. The comrades, however, secured another box and after getting the army due time to take their collection, we began operations on a nearby corner, and the army moved to their barracks because the average man is beginning to desire somewhat of a heaven while he on earth and realizes that the Socialist Party is the only organization that will secure it for him.

This was shown by the crowd of several hundred that gathered to hear the talk. In showing that the interests of the laborer and capitalist were antagonistic, I was interrupted by a Republican, who proved his point by saying that a brother of his had been injured in a mill, the workmen raised \$25 and that the boss put in \$2 and told him he could come back to work whenever he recovered. After this it would have taken more than "Sunrise" and "Cushman" to have convinced that audience of the identity of interests of these two warring classes, but our friend could not see the point and he gave up in disgust, saying that he was a Republican because it was right.

Comrade Fenelon was called to the box, and his remarks were well received. An Illinois comrade then gave a short talk and yet the people wanted to hear more, so Comrade Fenelon again mounted the forum and closed the meeting. At midnight a large crowd was still there arguing Socialism and the next day the teachers in the public schools were kept busy answering questions concerning Socialism. Riding with a drummer to Cosmopolis the next day, he said he never saw such a place where everyone from the kindergarten to the bank were talking Socialism.

At Cosmopolis I found one of the prettiest town sites on the harbor, but the grip of the Grays Harbor Commercial Co. the owners of the largest lumbering plant on the Pacific coast. Here 600 men work from 10 to 13½ hours a day, and are compelled to eat at the mess house or have \$5 a month deducted from their wages, which are \$26 to \$35 a month, and a plate in the mess house. One man told me that every house in town had a history of blighted hopes. The city hall had been secured and

with the aid of Mr. Patterson, the editor of "The Enterprise," I was enabled to partially advertise the meeting and was hampered by the fact that a good portion of the men worked until 9:30 while others work on the night shift.

At Centralla we were able to secure a good audience, which would have been larger but the lightning plant was out of order and I could not hold a street meeting. Lewis county needs some work very bad and I believe it is ripe for agitation.
In order to reach Skamokawa on time I had to leave Centralla the next day, so I held an impromptu street meeting at Kalama, where a Socialist was a curiosity. At first some politicians in the crowd were inclined to disturb the meeting, but as the people became more interested they told those "servants of the people" (?) to move on if they did not like what was being said.

At Skamokawa I talked to the high school as I have done everywhere I have had time and an opportunity and in the evening to a filled hall. The next day I walked six miles up in the hills to where Comrade Winters lives, and in the evening held a meeting in the schoolhouse, in the west valley, which was well filled.

Bumday afternoon another meeting was held at Skamokawa, which was well attended, showing that we have some hard-working comrades who are trying to eke out an existence on the hills facing the Columbia River.
Returning to Portland, I engaged in conversation with a wholesale leather dealer, and in discussing strikes he said the liberties of the people were being destroyed by these strikes and that it should not be allowed as the constitution should be obeyed regarding the rights of property. I called to his attention the fact that the coal carrying roads of Pennsylvania were violating the Constitution of that state in their coal and operating companies. "Then," said he, "the Constitution of Pennsylvania should be abolished." It was then very easy for me to show the large crowd that had gathered around us that there was a class struggle in society and that my friend was conscious of being a member of the capitalist class and was willing to go to any extreme in the struggle with the working class.
Arriving in Clarke County, I found that the comrades had succeeded in holding a good convention and have a ticket. My meetings here are as follows. Wednesday, Oct. 15,

Washington; Thursday, La Cunas; Friday, Lewistville; Saturday, Orchard; Sunday, Manor; Monday, Glenwood; Tuesday, Aberdeen; Wednesday, Oct. 22, Hoquiam; Thursday, Olympia; Friday, Tumwater or some suburb of Olympia; Monday, Oct. 27, Lyman; Tuesday, Oct. 28, Anacortes, and the remainder of the time until election in Skagit County.

Was glad to see Local Seattle take an initiative in calling for a national convention. The more I hear of the condition in other states, the more I am convinced that a convention is necessary. Yours for Socialism,
