In Massachusetts the Socialist candidate for governor has just polled 34000 votes, or about one in every dozen cast in the state. His party has scored a gain in a single year of about 300 per cent. It has shown more strength than any other minor party ever did since the civil war.

One fact should never be lost sight of in computing the Socialist vote. The recorded vote, the vote cast, is at least 50 per cent of the Socialist votes. At least 50 per cent of the Socialist voters are disfranchised by reason of residence qualifications. It is a rank discredit to all appearance of fairness to require one year's residence in the state as a qualification for voting. This provision of the statute is aimed directly at working men, who are obliged to travel constantly in search of jobs.
