In return for financial support, the Republican party gives the trusts—always predatory and usually illegal—full protection, the right to dictate law and name legislatures.

The Democratic party must join with the laboring citizenship of the nation—the backbone of the nation. The Democratic party must give to the man who works the encouragement, support and the legal protection which the Republican party gives to the trusts.

In the fight against the trusts the sole hope of the people is in their own power of union.

The power of the trusts is in united action, in organization, financial and political. The Democratic party must find its strength and combat the trusts through united and compact organization of the people.

In the great FINANCIAL unions which we call trusts, the Republicans have built their strength and found victory.

In the great LABOR UNIONS the Democrats must find the foundation of popular organization and a weapon which shall enable the people to combat the trusts and control them.

must, therefore, have now quite different social effects than it had formerly.

To this must be added the fact that the means of power at the disposal of the modern State have enormously increased. The technical revolution produced by capitalism extends also to the technical development of the weapons of war. Since the time of the Reformation the weapons of war have steadily grown more perfect, but at the same time also more expensive; they have now become a privilege of the State. By this alone the army has become separated from the people, even where universal service exists, so long as it is not supplemented by the arming of the people, which is nowhere as yet the case in any great State. And everywhere are the leaders of the army professional soldlers, separated from the people, and confronting it as a privileged casic.

But the economic power of a modern centralized State is enormous, too, in comparison with the former States. It keeps in its hands the wealth of an economic place of a modern centralized businesses where the highest civilizations of antiquity a long way behind posal a centralized bureancray such as was possessed by no State before. So enormously have the duties of a modern State grown that it is impossible to discharge them without fare-reaching division of labor and highly developed specialization. The capitalist method of production deprives the ruling classes of the lesiure which they at one time had. capitalist class precisely from its social functions, and is part of its very researce.

With the help of such an enormous political power a class can maintain its position long after it has become superfluous, nay, even mischlerous. And the stronger the power of the State, the more will a ruling class rely upon it, the more obstinately will it cling to its privileges, the less will it be inclined to make concessions. The longer, however, they assert their supermacy in this fashion the sharper must the class antagonisms become, the more tremendous must the political catastrophe turn out when it finally proceed from it, the more readily must the conquest of political power through an oppressed class become a social revolution.

Simultaneously, however, the contending classes become more and more conscious of the social consequences of their political struggle. Under the capitalist mode of production the pace of the economic transformation which the epoch of discoveries and inventions unhered in was carried further on by the intro-

duction of machinery in the domain of industry. Since that time our economic conditions have become subject to constant change—not simply to the rapid decay of the old, but also to the quick building up of the new.
