

TO BERGER'S DEFENSE

Six Milwaukee comrades send us the communication printed below. They defend Victor L. Berger in his advice to Milwaukee Socialists to vote for a capitalist candidate for judge. We wish to make a few points concerning this communication.

First. We are not concerned with Trautman's argument for his motion in the national committee. Whether there was any "collusion," open or secret, with the capitalists, is not the point at all. We have no evidence on that question. But we do know that Berger advised Socialists to vote for a capitalist candidate for judge. He does not deny it. He defends it and his friends defend it.
