WHY TEDDY LEFT THE BEARS SO SOON

Chicago, May 14. -Gradually during the past week the strain of batti between organized labor and organized capital in Chicago has grown tighter, until there is now every indication that within the next few days the strike of teamsters will extend to greater proportions with results that no man can

strempt to forese. With the reliasal of the Joint Teamsters Council (representing all the teamsters unions with 37,000 members) to accede to the request of the Team Owners Association that its wagons be allowed to deliver to the strike bound houses came the understanding that the teamsters had determined upon an advance and not a retreat.

The Team Owners Association represents teams doing the major portion of the hauling in Chicago. It has heretofore managed to keep out of the struggle, but the Employers' Association has not been astisfied with this and has pressed the team owners to deliver goods to boycotted houses in order to precipitate a general strike.

TEAM OWNERS IN PREDICAMENT.

The team owners are in the predicament of being between the Employers' Association on one side and the Teamsters' unions on the other. I the team owners insist upon yielding to the pressure brought by the employers, the union teamsters will refuse to hail goods to the houses represente by the Employers' Association, and if the teamsters so rejusing are discingred, all the other teamsters, will be called out. This means that over 8,000 will probably be added to the strikers ranks before Wednesday ucx: The team owners will do the bidding of the Employers' Association will fear and trembling, not of bodily injury, but because they know they canno fill the strikers places with any degree of success.
