MUNICIPAL REFORM

Of Socialist Party of Toledo...Basic Principles and Local Issues Defined.

The Socialist Party of Toledo reaffirms its allegiance to the national and state platforms and to the program of the International Socialist movement.

We declare our object to be the establishment of a system of industry under which the people will own the means of production and distribution and operate them for the benefit of all.

The present system is one of ownership by capitalists and operation for their profit. The working class, who produce all the wealth, are exploited to enrich the capitalist class.

A conflict of interests exists between the capitalists who exploit labor through ownership of production and the workers who own nothing but their labor power which they must sell to the capitalists to obtain their livelihood.

This industrial struggle expresses itself on the political field through parties representing the opposing interests of the two classes of capitalists and workers.

The capitalists maintain their power and prolong the present system through controlling the governmental powers. The workers can only abolish the capitalist system by securing possession of legislative, executive, municipal, state and national, and using them for working class interests, as the capitalists now use them for capitalist interests.

The real issue in this as in all other campaigns is therefore the conflict between the capitalist class and the working class for possession of the powers of government.

The Republican and Democratic parties are controlled by the capitalist class. The Socialist Party is controlled by the working class.

We therefore call upon all the working people and those who sympathize with them, to ally themselves with the Socialist Party and assist in establishing the system of common ownership which will abolish wage slavery and insure to the worker the full product of his labor.

Realizing that in this election the Socialist Party cannot hope to achieve more than the capture of the municipal powers of government, we present the following

MUNICIPAL PROGRAM.

Public Service. The Republican and Democratic parties are controlled by the capitalist class. The Socialist Party is controlled by the working class. THE CHINESE BOYCOTT

The capitalists of the United States are worrying a good deal these days about the Chinese boycott of American goods.

"The Socialist has received from a reader in Peking, China, a translation of an address issued by Peking scholars appealing to residents of the capital to boycott American products."

"The same thing is taking place in England, France, Germany and other countries. The reason why the capitalists of these countries are also seeking for the means to get their hands on the wealth of these countries is that while the Chinese capitalists are doubtless interested in selling their goods in America, they are also interested in keeping the home market to themselves."

"The result has been immediately, and last year our export of cotton cloth to China amounted to only 76,886,534 yards, valued at the export price of \$4,000,952."

"We have dropped back to the industrial level where we held just prior to the Spanish war. All prestige in the world has been lost."

"All reports received by the state department from China are that the country is extremely serious. The great commercial societies of China, to one of which the Chinese laboring class is affiliated, are at the head of this movement, which makes it all the more dangerous."

Slugging vs. Decency. Two weeks ago The Socialist told how the persons responsible for the slugging scandal in the Chicago Federation of Labor were being punished under the control of one 'Skinner' Madden, who holds his place in the Federation by the use of his muscle with Republican and Democratic machines.

# FROM NATIONAL HEADQUARTERS

Comrade W. E. Trautmann, National Committee member of Ohio, has presented his resignation to State Secretary Gardner and notified the National Office. His reasons for resignation is that he has transferred his membership from Cincinnati to Chicago.

Charters were granted by the National Office to Ada, 13 members; Ravia, Indian Territory, 12 members. Referring to the action taken by the National Executive Committee in the following motion: "Motion by Beryl Feigenbaum, that the National Executive Committee set aside \$100 to assist the State of Nebraska in the matter of the primary election law in Douglas County, Nebraska, Secretary J. P. Roe, of Nebraska, says: 'The announcement of financial aid from the National Committee at our county convention was joyously received. It will have the effect to revive discouraged and drooping spirits who had declared "Woe's" the order.'"

The primary law of Douglas county provides for the payment of a fee by candidates as follows: County Treasurer, \$60.00; Sheriff, \$50.00; Clerk and Judge, \$50.00; each Surveyor \$40.00. The ticket nominating the Socialists was refused for the reason that the above fees were not tendered. An appeal has been taken to the Supreme Court and a decision is hoped for before August 20th, the last day for filing nominations.
