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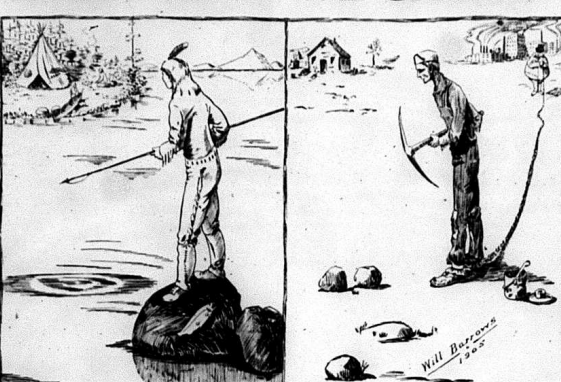

THE WOMEN'S PROCESSION

This article in the London "Clarion" is therefore of great interest. The committee received by Premier Balfour received little satisfaction and the interview only increased the discontent throughout England. It is encouraging to note that the Socialist vote materially increased in the municipal elections just held in England.
