

SECOND PARTY ON WAY TO 'KUZBAS'

Results of the First Day of Police Terrorism Against Chicago Labor

ATTEMPT TO ENFORCE LANDIS AWARD BY TERRORISM AGAINST BUILDING TRADES ORGANIZATIONS

Over a Hundred Workers Make Up Second Contingent That Sails For Kuzbas Basin to Participate in Co-act Industrial Work for So-

On last Saturday, May 13, the second contingent of workers, to leave the United States for Kuzbas Basin in Russia sailed on the S. S. Rotterdam. It sailed a trifle over a month after the first group left New York on April 8. There were over a hundred workers and they hailed from almost every section of the United States and some of them from Mexico. The work of arranging for the passage and for the care of the workers after they get to Russia is continuing and here before the second group sailed there were a number of people in New York City, having arrived from various parts of the country, waiting to go with the third group which will leave about June 11.

These were men, women and children in the group and they were all happy in the thought that they were going to be in a country where wages and hours are better and where the spectre of unemployment does not terrify them. Just as the first group was greeted as welcomed and understood to assist in merely in conducting a great industry, but in building one of the second group seemed to be efficient, and all of them had been workers all their lives. They are going to live on 50 cents a day.

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N. Y. State Troopers Act Against Strikers

Invasion Haverstraw on First Day of Strike of Bricklayers and Proceed to Custodial Intimidation, Prohibiting of Meetings, and Other Oppressive Tactics.

On Friday, 1,500 bricklayer workers in Haverstraw, N. Y., went on strike of a few days the town was under control of state police. The village streets are being patrolled by the police, who ride through the village intimidating everyone who is not in favor of supporting the workers. They have been ordered to withdraw, and no talk of disorder except from the five village police, who thought "disorder" would break out, and therefore called for state troopers.

There are thirty-five brick yards in the area front and the rear, and they have forbidden any meetings and even dispersed small groups of men for congregating on corners to discuss the strike.

Chicago Police Chief Is Tool of Enemies of Labor

Conspiracy of Judges, Police and State Attorney's Office to Keep Labor Men in Jail Illegally, While Official Thugs and Gunmen Pillage Office Files of Unions.

CHICAGO, May 12.—Raids and wholesale arrests of officers of labor unions have followed the shooting of a number of policemen on the same night that an explosion occurred at a couple of buildings where Landis wage awards have been in effect.

Papermakers Split by On Part of Leaders

The International Brotherhood of Paper Makers, representing the skilled and semi-skilled workers in the paper making industry signed an agreement with the manufacturers of print paper last Friday, as a separate organization, without taking into consideration the demands of the other union in the industry, the International Pulp, Sulphite and Paper Mill Workers' Union.

The agreement was a compromise, as the manufacturers withdrew their demand for a ten per cent reduction after it was determined a referendum vote of the union. It is in reality a victory for the manufacturers as the acceptance of the agreement by the leaders of the skilled workers, without taking into consideration the unskilled, is tantamount to an act of treachery to the workers in the industry, and will enable the employers to defeat them as separate organizations.

Tendency of Labor Against Separation When John P. Burke, President of the International Pulp, Sulphite and Paper Mill Workers, was asked what action his union would take in accepting the conditions of the agreement, he said: "I will not commit the union at this time." Commenting on the action of the skilled and semi-skilled men, he said: "The tendency now prevailing in the organized labor movement, if the manufacturers can use the skilled workers against the unskilled workers this year they will undoubtedly play the unskilled against the skilled next year and will be the means of destroying the solidarity which is necessary for the workers if they are to meet with success."

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THE PROLETARIAN CHALLENGE TO THE BOURGEOISIE

SOVIET RUSSIA

Soviet Russia is fully aware of all dangers threatening it. Soviet Russia is going to Genoa free from all illusions. It knows very well that not a single capitalist power is able to approach the work of reconstructing the world fearlessly and honestly. It knows too that all of these are rebuffed by a solid aim when they speak of reconstruction, and that aim is in the benefit of the expense of the weaker ones. In spite of this, however, Soviet Russia is going to Genoa with the conviction that no matter how diplomatic the negotiations at Genoa may be, Soviet Russia will emerge from the new struggle stronger than she went.

The capitalist governments feared most still more that the diplomatic forms might be used for Communist agitation. They were mostly afraid of the Communist propaganda. Soviet diplomats shall spare them from such propaganda. Not for the sake of compromise, not to spare the diplomats, but because they would not wish to have been seen from the Communist point of view. A variety of reasons, however, are important: by the fact of the accomplished fact of Allied policy in Europe, and since the new world is being shaped since the conclusion of peace. The capitalist press infamously announced to the world the Communist Government, because the proletarians of Russia, isolated as they were as an agrarian power, were left to their own resources, attacked by the whole of the capitalist world, supported to war and the blockade, and defending their own interests with arms, were not able to realize a form of society whose foundation is high technical development.

Well, capitalism ruled the entire world with the exception of Russia. The gens have been ruling for three years, and the capitalist governments and the bourgeoisie of the world have had ample opportunity to show us how completely they have failed. They have had the world on the basis of the capitalist system, and the world which they laid out for us through their wars. But the results are before our eyes. The war rules.

Capitalism Doomed

The capitalist system is doomed by the events of the past and by the events of the present. But perhaps the capitalist rulers have not yet seen this. On the eleventh hour, perhaps they will now retreat a plan for the world's reconstruction. They might restore "order" to the world on the capitalist point of view, and which would pay the worker for his work labor at least as much as he gets for his sufficient food. We say beforehand: capitalist economists and capitalist "thinkers" will not do this. In their place, not the bourgeoisie as a class will pull the world by its ears, and turn a deaf ear to their capitalists in the same manner as the American Government disregarded the counsel of its financial adviser in Versailles. My dear Krysers, and you, the American Government, regarded the counsel of its adviser in Russia, Mr. Bullitt. And should the Soviet Government be in a position to take these far-sighted bourgeois economists before the capitalist world, it would receive one and the same answer: "We cannot carry out these bourgeois plans."

The bourgeois world in Genoa will be like a redoubtable capital driving the boundless sea only to be shattered by the storm. The fact that at Genoa capitalism will appear redoubtable, by virtue of its sense of direction and lacking any plan, will draw its own shoats about the bankruptcy of Communism and will announce to all countries: "Give us all love in the capitalist world; give us all hope that it can bring new life and order to the world!"

All the time at each other's throats and enter up by mutual distrust, the capitalist governments will reach out their capacious hands for the property of the Russian working people. All of them will do it in the hope that the famine in the fields will be a means to compel the Soviet government to capitulate. With the knowledge contained in these articles, as a key to the situation at Genoa, it is easy for the worker to comprehend the significance of every move made by the diplomats in their efforts to bring about a settlement that will be acceptable to all parties involved.

The articles also show the futility of hoping for an impartial solution of the present chaotic condition in the world as long as capitalism exists. The only way to bring about a settlement which is not a mere concession to the capitalist class is through the dictatorship of the Proletariat. All conflicts arising from clashes of class interests will be destroyed for the simple reason that all classes themselves will be abolished.

We fought for the life of the dictatorship of the Proletariat, and we were supported only by the Communist workers who agreed with us on the great questions of history and the way to solve them. They were supported by the whole English working class, who were Communist, and by all those whose hearts were not so cold as to see the masses of human sacrifices made by the Russian workers for the cause of their liberation. GERMANY

The Wirth-Rathenau Government has landed in a ditch because of its policy of compromise because it grasps at Genoa as a drowning man grasps at a straw. As is well known the German government did not even clearly accept the latest decree of the Reparations Commission; indeed it declared itself opposed to a number of the essential demands of the Genoa treaty, it subjected to Allied control over taxes and finances, to the cash payments desired for the remainder of the year, and to the demand that new taxes to the value of 40 milliard paper marks be imposed. As for the other Allied demands, the Wirth Government was not in a position to enter into discussion. Although this last note of the Reparations Commission was not in the nature of an ultimatum since it set no time limit in which an answer must be made, nevertheless it may be taken as the final date because the German taxes amounting to at least 40 milliard paper marks must be provided. There is the fact that a fourth of the Wirth-Rathenau-Bauer Government hopes to fill this vacuum with Genoa. The economic and financial condition of Germany, and the extent of the Genoa decision for reparations (the payment) has again registered a heavy loss. As the last Reparations note is due, the 200 milliard measure of Germany's financial and economic condition, is now above 300. The wholesale and retail prices follow the dollar rate more closely than at any time in the past. An immense wave of rising prices is sweeping through the land. The cost of the most important articles of food is increasing almost daily; the scattered attempts of the workers to make wages meet the higher cost of living is met with stubborn resistance on the part of the employers. Hand in hand with this resistance is the offensive launched by the employers against the

eight-hour day, which is one of the last constants of the November Revolution of 1918. The prices of various goods to be necessary for the needs of the world market. But until the world market level is reached, the cut-throat competition of Germany will be unworkable.

Another characteristic feature of Germany's economic situation on the eve of Genoa is the fact that the big industries and big firms are taking advantage of the tight position in which the government at present finds itself. Some firms are taking advantage of an attempt to acquire the most important government industries, like the railway, the post-office, etc. The railway and post-office rates are constantly being raised, but the prices which the united heavy industries demand for the supplies that furnish their government industries are rising still faster. Thus the democratic petty-bourgeois government is backed more and more against the ropes and is isolated almost by the heavy industry.

One might actually think that under these circumstances only Germany's government would take a clear and determined stand at the Genoa Conference. The only way that it could play a role in the world, which is the only role it could play, is as a neutral. Only then would there be a possibility that its independent participation in the reconstruction of the world would go to the credit of German economy instead of going into the war-torn pockets of the Entente.

But as the capitalist policy, which is both brazen and characterless, which keeps along from day to day and seems at the first moment to be very delicate, has made an Entente colony out of Germany, has turned the German Government into an English or French vassal, and has subjected the German masses to unendurable war-torn, it directly supported by the Scheidemann government, and indirectly supported by the Independents whose expert in the matter affairs, Herr Brüning, has just as any other special adviser of the Entente world. Aside from the fact that the railway rates, which the German government owed its existence directly to the Parliamentary fraction of the Independent Socialists, every day is being raised, and without the support of the Social Democratic Party and the trade-union bureaucracy, this government could not live another day.

Workers Alone Can Solve Problem

The mystery of this inconceivably stupid and cowardly policy, whatever the fact be that at Genoa Germany will be treated as an altogether negligible and absolutely dependent power, is nothing more than the blind obedience of the German bourgeoisie; this class-interest is encouraged by the Social Democracy of the German bourgeoisie in the name of the working class. An independent and self-conscious policy towards the Entente, which is supported by the overwhelming majority of the German working class. But the support of the great masses is to be won only through the most energetic and uncompromising demands upon the bourgeoisie and the submission of the bourgeoisie to the most rigorous control of the working class. The Social Democracy does not venture into this struggle; instead it substitutes itself continually in the office of the bourgeoisie, and by means of the small clique of capitalists who are still the real masters of Germany, and who went to Genoa not as representatives of the German people, but as the representatives of the same small capitalist clique, which is so brutal and so cowardly in Germany and so scoundrelously slavish outside of Germany. In the view of all this it becomes clear that the only way to solve the Genoa problem will be by the workers of the Genoa table (mistakenly covered as it will be) will be the crumb. The key of the German situation is not to be found in Genoa; it is to be found in the hands of the workers.

Hence the name, "Umbrella Mike," who has been the principal pet of the Chicago Tribune and the Citizens' Committee and is no longer regarded with the epithet of degradation, "Umbrella Mike," but is now the eminently respectable J. Boyle.

No matter how vile Murphy and Shea are they can never sink as low as the creatures who comprise the "Citizens' Committee." If it were a choice between "Tim" Murphy and Donnelly, the editor of the Tribune, we would unhesitatingly choose Murphy.

In the eyes of the revolutionist there is no crime that is more heinous than the capitalist class. The only crimes we consider are those crimes against the workers themselves. The officers of the building trades unions in Chicago have never been guilty of anything other than endeavoring to maintain the condition of the membership of their organizations a trifle above the level of Chinese coolies which, of course, was in violation of the Lands award.

When the red raids occurred we warned the workers that other raids would follow and we now warn them again that the only way to prevent further raids is to have every organization of labor in welded union unless we arise in our might and call a halt to this criminal conspiracy of the enemies of labor.

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
